### **Polish Language Instruction Available in Grand Rapids**

Metro Grand Rapids has a large enough population to support a Saturday school for Polish language and culture where children and adults can practice speaking the language on a regular basis and learn about Polish heritage.

That's the assessment of Marzanna Butryn, a recent Grand Rapids transplant who founded a Saturday school for Polish language and culture in Bridgeport, Conn. that now boasts more than 150 students.

"It's possible to do something here," said Butryn, 60, who cofounded the Szkoła Kultury i Języka Polskiego im. św. Jana Pawła II in 1997. "There is a growing interest in learning the Polish language and culture because people want to visit Poland as tourists and share their heritage with their children."

She speaks from experience. Butryn enrolled her two daughters, Jenna and Gabriela, in a Polish Saturday school as children, and now both can communicate fluently with relatives in Poland. Better yet, Butryn said she is now teaching her granddaughters Polish in a fun way "that they don't even know they are learning the language."

A Saturday school can serve students of all ages in a variety of ways, said Butryn, a Polish immigrant who moved to Grand Rapids in the summer of 2021. Such a school could hold crash courses in Polish for adults who are looking to visit Poland on vacation and act as a focal point for instruction on dance, history, geography and cuisine.

"There wouldn't be any discrimination because of age," she said with a laugh. "I now am tutoring four students ranging in age from 9 to 68." One typical session teaches language skills alongside lessons on Polish history and a sampling of foods such as ba-

### PHS Opens Applications for Vocational Students to College Scholarship Program

To those who don't know about the PHS, it comes as a surprise that the society annually gives out scholarships totaling several thousands of dollars to students attending institutions of higher learning as a way of supporting Polish herit-

age.

Even those who are aware of the scholarships may not know that the PHS board loosened requirements at its last meeting to make even more high school and college students eligible for financial assistance.

The board opened eligibility to

students who plan to attend or are enrolled in just about any post high school education.

Effective last month, the PHS board shared the new guide-lines for eligibility on its website and conducted outreach to area schools to encourage as many applicants as possible before the April 15 deadline.

To be eligible, applicants must:

- be of Polish American descent;
- reside in Allegan,
   Barry, Ionia, Kent, Montcalm,
   Muskegon or Ottawa county;
   and,

jaderka cookies and red borsch soup. One of her students, Joe Figurski, is appreciative of Butryn's immersion classes in Polish language and culture.

"Living in America is a blessing and a curse when it comes to culture," said Figurski, 27, who drives from Kalamazoo regularly on Fridays to attend 2-hour classes with Butryn. "We are living in this big melting pot where we can experience all types of culture, but at the same time we can lose the sense of where we come from over the course of generations."

Figurski credits his maternal grandfather with being "a cultural beacon" for his family by preparing Polish dishes at Thanksgiving, but he added that he wanted to expand the cultural ties beyond food. "I've always wanted to

 plan to attend or currently attend an accredited 2year trade/vocational program, 2year community college program or 4-year college or university.

Applicants need to provide:

- the scholarship application form;
- a copy of academic transcripts that show a minimum 2.75
   GPA;
- two letters of recommendation from a teacher, mentor, coach, or advisor;
- a brief statement signed by the applicant that delineates his or her Polish heritage; and,
- a 200-word essay that shares career goals and why they are deserving of a scholarship.

Applicants can provide additional

know a second language, and I thought 'Why not Polish?'"

With growing confidence in his language skills, Figurski is thinking of spending time in Poland as part of a honeymoon when he gets married.

Since starting the classes in September, he said he has worked on reading and pronunciation where -- unlike English -- sounding out words is consistent with how the words are spelled. "But Polish is difficult too," Figurski added. "You have to learn that you can't split up certain letters, you have to move your mouth differently when it comes to pronunciation and the cases of nouns can change depending on the context of the sentence."

Butryn and Figurski agreed that informal conversations in Polish with others is crucial to improv-

ing on language skills -- something that a regular Saturday school would accomplish.

Grand Rapids may have the critical mass necessary to establish a Saturday school, but it would take some foresight and determination to accomplish the task.

During his visit in August to the annual Dozynki Festival in Grand Rapids, the Consul General for the Republic of Poland in Chicago said a number of Saturday schools in the Midwest are associated with Catholic parishes. Pawel Zyzak said he was impressed with the facilities of St. Isidore's after touring the church, opining that it may be an ideal location for such a Saturday school.

He added that it may be possi

Sculpture Park. On Dec. 17 she gave a presentation to an appreciative audience of about 70 people on how craftsmen in Krakow during the 19th century began constructing szopkas -- detailed miniature models of buildings in the city that served as backdrops for the Nativity of Jesus.

She explained that the custom has been handed down through generations, with some crafters starting to build their szopkas for the next year on the day after Christmas. There is a szopka presentation and tournament day of December at the Main Market Square in Krakow. The best szopkas are then displayed in the city's Historical Museum. To give a sense of the work involved in building a szopka, Rich Panek brought his szopka so guests could appreciate its fragility, intricacy and beauty.

ble for the Chicago consulate to provide teaching materials and other support for a Grand Rapids school.

In addition, support can be found from other organizations such as The Polish Supplementary School Council of America, which provides "templates of documents necessary for the proper organization and efficient management of educational institutions, teachers materials, articles and lesson plans inspiring their teaching and educational work."

The website for the Consulate for the Republic of Poland in Detroit lists Polish language schools in four Michigan cities: Orchard Lake, Hamtramck, Sterling Heights and Ypsilanti. All four schools appear to be associated with Catholic parish-

es. Nationwide, there are schools operating in Connecticut, Massachusetts, Illinois, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Texas, Florida, California, Oregon, Nevada, Georgia, and North Carolina.
