Rectors Ramble

Acts 3.12-19; Psalm 4; 1 John 3.1-7; Luke 24.36b-48

Dear friends,

An exciting week ahead with APCM's at St Peter's this Sunday and at St Mary's next Sunday 21st April.

We have so much to be thankful for across both our church communities and yes I know that finances are tight and buildings works continue to be a drain on our head-space and resources, but these things are temporary compared to the Good Works that we seeing happening in both church communities. Please would you find a time to pray this week for the works of the PCC's at St Mary's & St Peter's using the P-R-A-Y method if this helps you.

P= Pause – Be still and know that I am God psalm 46:10

R= Rejoice - Rejoice in the Lord always, I will say again Rejoice Philippians 4:4

A= Ask - "You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it John 14:14

Y= Yield – "Therefore, I urge you brothers & Sisters, to offer yourselves as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God" Romans 12:1

In our scriptures this week we hear that after a lame man was healed, people were astonished. Peter asks the crowds 'Why?'

He explains that Jesus is the long-promised Messiah, rejected and killed but raised from the dead by God. And it is through Jesus that the man was healed. Citing Moses and the prophets, he calls the people to repent of their sins – including failing to recognise Jesus – and to know the refreshing presence of Jesus in their lives.

We all make mistakes – ranging from the silly to the very serious.

In this week's news, we see a German art gallery worker who hung up his own artwork without permission, through to the Post Office staff who ignored tech problems leading to many sub-postmasters going to prison unjustly.

When we look at mistakes we have made, we should not be defined by the mistake itself but how we have responded in the face of it.

In our Bible reading, Peter points out the mistakes that many, including he himself made. Denying that Jesus was the Son of God, the people handed him over to the authorities and demanded his death, thus killing the 'author of life'. But Peter does not simply attack the people, he suggests how to respond to the mistake and make amends. He says that they acted in ignorance but now, having seen signs that Jesus has risen and is truly the Son of God, they must repent and receive God's favour.

Peter himself denied Jesus three times, which was a grave mistake. Yet he owned up and turned his life around, overcoming his ignorance. As a result, Jesus entrusted him with building his Church on earth. The life of Peter shows us how to live after our mistakes — with courage and by making amends. And Peter teaches us that Jesus offers repentance, no matter what we have done.

Failing is not always a bad thing; it can make us want to learn and improve. As Edison famously said about inventing the light bulb, 'I have not failed 10,000 times – I've successfully found 10,000 ways that will not work.'

How do we respond to our mistakes?

Do we learn to live better lives as a consequence?

No matter our mistakes, we can always go to Christ for forgiveness and new life.

We all make mistakes. But do not let the mistake define you – live boldly and confidently through your response.

Take courage to pick yourself up, commit to doing the right thing where you did the wrong, offer your mistakes up to Jesus, and you will find forgiveness and newness of life, in this life and in the next.

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.


International Organ Day 20th April – Open Organ morning

St Andrew & St Mary the Virgin, Fletching, TN22 3SR

From 10am – 1pm there will be displays, videos, organ 'tours', demonstrations and 'hands-on' opportunities. Refreshments will be available.

You can also hear the organ in concert in the evening *(7.30pm start)* at the

Centenary Celebration Concert: 'From 'petit paysan' to Paris Conservatoire Director', the life and music of Théodore Dubois (1837-1924) This year sees the centenary of the death of Théodore Dubois, the French organist and composer, who rose from humble origins to become Director of the Paris Conservatoire. He suffered from a certain prejudice much of his life and some still remains today. His extensive range of choral, orchestral and chamber music, as well as songs, operas and organ works is largely neglected, overtaken in the early 20th century by the new wave of Debussy, Ravel, Stravinsky and Milhaud. It is now being rediscovered and recorded.



This event will recount the life of Dubois

alongside live performances of his organ music and recordings of examples of his non-organ works. It is presented by Peter Bassett, organist, and is based on his MMus research and recital.

Admission is free, there are refreshments available and all proceeds will go to the diocesan charity Family Support Work.



A message from:

The Reverend Vanessa Baron - Canon Treasurer of Chichester Cathedral

2025 is a special year. It will mark 950 years since this Cathedral moved from Selsey to Chichester. It will also be the Diocesan Year of Faith, as it will be1700 years since the Council of Nicea, one of the key defining moments in the Christian faith. Throughout 2025 we will be celebrating our faith, both in the Cathedral and across the Diocese. (There will be more detailed publicity about this later in the Spring and we look forward to sharing this with you).

The Cathedral needs your help. We are planning an exhibition in the Cathedral from February – November 2025 and we would like you, the parishes of the Diocese, to help us tell the story of our faith – what it means to us and why it matters.

We have four questions for you.

- 1) As you think back over the last 950 years of the Christian faith in the Diocese of Chichester, do you have any particular heroes or heroines? Who are they and why do they matter to you? (If your church is an Anglo-Saxon one, you can think back to the arrival of St Wilfrid in 681!)
- 2) Is there anyone or anything commemorated in your church that is unusual or that you find interesting? Who or what is it? How does it speak to you of the Christian faith? (For example, you may have a Bible donated in memory of someone who died in battle. You may have a memorial or tombstone to someone who did something memorable.)
- 3) Do you have any Christian memorabilia in your house or church? (For example, a pocket Gospel handed to a soldier on the beach at Dunkirk or a medieval pilgrim badge. Perhaps you have a cookery book in which someone has written prayers or a child's sampler with verses from Scripture.)
- 4) What makes an exhibition interesting for you? What would it need to include to make you visit the Cathedral?


Finally, if any church has any Medieval manuscripts or missals; if there are any Tudor or Stuart Bibles out there, please would you let us know.
