Apache Gold Casino Resort and the San Carlos Apache riders presented the VI Annual Run to the Rez on the weekend on October 23-24, 209. This Run pays Tribute to All American Veterans.

This event has been hailed as the "Most Spiritual Ride in Arizona," and rightly so. I spoke with a lot of different veterans attending this run. The central idea of virtually all of them was that this run is for healing. James (an Iraqi veteran) told me that when you go to war (or any type of military action) on another soil you leave part of yourself there. Even if you're not physically wounded - WAR leaves you wounded. Each 'Run to the Rez' event allows him to experience a kind of healing that he's never had anywhere else.

That message of Healing has allowed this run to grow larger each year. The first Run to the Rez started with 20 riders. On Run for the Rez III there were 230 registered riders. In 2009, even during a recession - by Friday night there were 200 riders registered. By the start of Saturday's activities there were 345 riders registered.

displays it with reverence, both emotionally and spiritually. Recognizing those who sacrificed their lives for our country has become a tradition for Native Americans.

Montana and I took off and drove up the road a ways to try to find a place to get a good shot of the pack as they rolled by. They were supposed to take off at 10am for the cemetery; but roared out earlier than expected, leaving us to scramble a bit. We took a shortcut – while the pack took the scenic route.

There wasn't a dry eye anywhere near me.

The pack of riders was lining up about 9:30am. The morning was sunny and crisp. You could feel the energy in the air. The San Carlos Apache Tribe supports veter-


