
CONDUCTOR'S MESSAGE: SEASON'S GREETINGS FROM ALAN & JANE

After a pre-rehearsal 'Last Post/Reveille' run-through and recording with some of our friends from our Crumpsall Scout & Guide Band days, under Robbie's baton we setttled down to rehearse in our usual West Stand spot, sharing the space with the BBC's pop up TV studio, erected in readiness for FC United's upcoming televised Remembrance weekend FA Cup 1st Round fixture against Doncaster Rovers.

It was out with the Red Carol Books and a selection of five chosen to record against a backdrop of a suburban firework extravaganza as the local Mostonians determined to get in their salvos ahead of the Bonfire Night lockdown.

During **Victoria's** carol choice, No5, **'A Starry Night**', the night sky, already bathed in the light of a near full moon, erupted with multi-coloured stars and bangs; some coming a little bit too close for comfort at the trumpet end of the band; especially the one that clipped the front edge of the stand roof. The whole episode also unfolded on Zoom and thanks to **Caroline** for capturing some unforgettable images (*below*) and to the band, who, in true Titanic spirit, played on.









Sue's Library Corner: Part 1: Scrawls, Doodles and Adverts:

Let it Snow, Let it Snow, Let it Snow, our first festive lockdown recording, comes out of sorted pad number 489, and after a lockdown surge of cataloguing, our librarian, Sue, is to be applauded as she has now exceeded the milestone of 500 catalogued pieces for our library. Amongst our library there are many very old pieces published decades ago - some being in excess of 100 years of age - and Sue has unearthed some fascinating scrawls by musicians past, pieces acquired from bands long since defunct, some containing fascinating adverts of their day and scores that include unfamiliar instrumentation. This mini-series starts with a selection of doodles and scrawls and a fascinating advert. Enjoy the following selection and thanks again to Sue for all her diligent work on all our behalf and for supplying these pics:





if they are of the artist or subject and anyone good with the history of hairstyles might be able to hazard a guess at when these doodles were inked?

Easier to date is the Eb Alto

Despite the initials CG appearing on the back of an old piece far left, it's unclear

Clarinettist's scripted note 'middle part blown away about 1928' on the Overture 'Stradella' acquired from the Salford Police Band above right. You can imagine the piece being performed by the constabulary's musicians on a Salford Band stand that was subjected to a sudden a gust of wind with the middle part swept away, never to be seen again? 'Hello, 'ello, 'ello! More pegs or magnets required I think'. Robbie, there's a 'find the part' internet challenge for you?

Advert (*right*) from the back of a really old manuscript published circa 120 years ago. Anyone fancy purchasing a student/beginner violin (Norman perhaps?) for the grand sum of One Guinea? A Guinea was worth 21 shillings at the end of the 19th and turn of the 20th Century, so £1.05 in decimal terms. London based J.R. Lafleur & Son published music from 1862 to 1917 when its publishing business was bought by Boosey. They also made musical instruments (strings, woodwind and brass) over the same period. Remembrance Sunday Weekend - 'They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old':

The Poppy: On a sojourn to Lower Crumpsall, dropping off a hardcopy of the October newsletter for Tenor Sax player **Harry**, care of Trumpeter **Les**, on 5th November (first day of Lockdown), I was taken by the determination and resilience of the poppies in Les's front garden, pictured left, flowering well out of season and in radiant defiance of the struggles we are all facing – a flower of remembrance and of future hope if ever there was one.

Some weeks before Remembrance Sunday 2020, I dusted off my silver bugle and contemplated where I might be playing the Last Post and Rouse this year,

the 39th consecutive year of being honoured and privileged to play the evocative bugle calls in Crumpsall. Not playing was not an option, but at that moment of quiet contemplation it was by no means clear if services could be held or the occasion marked within our community, in any meaningful way. At best, I thought, maybe a few of us could gather in uniform to play, socially distanced, outside church to no one in particular but nevertheless marking the occasion?



However, despite the cloak of Covid and National Lockdown, what transpired between the 4th and 8th November 2020 will go down as the busiest and by far, furthest reaching commemoration of Remembrance I have ever had the privilege to participate in. In a probably never to be repeated few days, the spirit, true value and meaning of remembrance embraced the nation and our small slice of England's green and pleasant land was to be no exception.

It all started in earnest on Wednesday 4th November up at our outdoor rehearsal home of FC United's Broadhurst Park stadium. Ahead of the main rehearsal, a bugle party gathered under the West Stand, rehearsed and then recorded Last Post and Rouse preceded by **Dave Lynch** reading the famous words, 'They shall grow not old......'. The bugle calls were separated by a full two-minute silence interrupted only by the loud bangs and bright flashes of multiple fireworks, evocative of thankfully long silent battlefields along mainland Europe's Western Front more than a century earlier.

Next up was the aforementioned televised FA Cup Tie at Broadhurst Park on Saturday 7th **November**. Last year I played alone in front of 2,000 supporters, this year, in a virtually empty stadium (due to Covid restrictions) and thankfully with Victoria alongside me, and both in our band uniforms, we played to a **UK TV audience of circa 2 million** and a world-wide audience of many more as the build up and match was being **broadcast live, to 65 countries**.

Thankfully, it was only afterwards those facts sunk in and our rendition didn't suffer as a result. Marking Remembrance, being founder members of FC United and representing our Band was a multiple privilege for Victoria and I and certainly an occasion we will never forget.

8th November and Remembrance Sunday had arrived. Representing the band, Phil Hilton joined Victoria and I in the bugle party as we played for an outdoor ceremony at St Matthew's that formed part of a wider virtual service covering 7 churches in North Manchester. Stuart did a fabulous job representing the band and coordinating with the technical organisers of the service to ensure that the pivotal Act of Remembrance centred around the 11am silence, was broadcast live. Simultaneously we were appearing on Zoom for the Methodist Churches as prerecorded back on 4th November; all told we reached ten Remembrance Sunday congregations in total. Dave Lynch was also up at the Methodist Church to read those words once more, as a small gathering laid a wreath at 11am. Our faint bugle strains from St Matthew's could be heard at the Methodist Church too. Crumpsall certainly remembered in 2020.









CRUMPSALL CONCERT BAND - Band Heritage Series Part 8: The Mid - 1960's (64/65}:

Around teatime on 10th **July 1964** on a maternity ward somewhere in the labyrinthine sprawl of Crumpsall Hospital, I was born to **Ann and Ray** and it would be another 11 years and 2 months before my banding adventure began. In the meantime as I obliviously approached 6th months of age at No83 Herristone Road, a new band in Crumpsall, **the 191**st **Scout Band**, was about to take its first baby steps on the streets of Crumpsall just a few hundred yards away. This fledgling band would ultimately prove pivotal to the very formation of the band we hold dear today.

The brainchild of RAF Veteran and Group Scout Master **Mr Charles Ashton**, a **Scout Band was formed** under the leadership of **Mr Joe Allen during late 1964**, and the 191st Group first marched to Church (St Matthew's) behind its band from the 401st Headquarters Scout Hut on Willow Hill Road, early in 1965. The 191st Group were very grateful to the 401st for the loan of their Headquarters for band practice, club night and Senior Scout meetings. **Roy Croney** (an ex 191st Cub) re-joined the Troop as a Service Auxiliary to assist **Joe Allen** with the training of the Band. Group accounts from the time show that **bugles at a cost of £2.00 each** were purchased from the St Thomas's Scout Group (Lower Crumpsall) whose band had ceased to operate some years before. It is likely the brass shelled side drums came from the same source whilst the **bass drum, traced back to 1914**, was purchased for the nominal **fee of £1.00** from **Romily Brass Band.**

mustering their ranks in the background (dark uniforms). Further back in the parade formation would be the 209th Scout Band from Crumpsall Park Methodist Church. In those days, the local walks would be stretched over a good distance allowing three well-spaced bands to cover all the participants without distracting each other too much (other than the thud of the respective bass drums). The second picture above, shows the band at the alert and ready to step off with the impressive structure of old **Crumpsall Park Methodist Church** building, in the background. Also pictured is the 191st Group neckerchief that I was privileged to wear during my time and association with the group from 1971 to 1983 and in the band from 1975. The neckerchief was the third incarnation of the group scarf that started off as plain blue, changing in 1917 to plain green before the design pictured that was formerly approved by the North West Association in February 1949 and remained in place until the Group sadly dissolved in the early 1990s.

The walks progressed from the Methodist Church on Lansdowne Road, over the Crumpsall Lane Junction and down past St Matthew's Church. The pictures *right* see the **191**st **Band** heading towards the bend at the end of Cleveland Road before turning back up into Crumpsall to head down towards Crescent Road and St Anne's Church.

The band would then likely have marched back up Lansdowne Road to the 401st HQ on Willow Hill Road for dismissal. The HQ was





built by the 191st Scout Group during the mid-1950's and my Dad remembered, as a 191st Scout, helping on the project. It was opened in May 1957 but by the October of that year the hut was unaffordable due to vandalism repair costs. The 401st Scout Group took over and secured the building and grounds (and still meet there to this day) and the 191st Group resumed their tenancy at the School Room (Parish Hall) on Cleveland Road. The Blue Hut (as the 401st HQ became affectionately known), sandwiched between the Cleveland Hotel and Crumpsall Lane Primary School, remained as a band rehearsal venue into the 1990s and was the traditional starting point for Church Parades for many years.

In Part 9 we chart our heritage to the end of the 1960s, pick up on Derek's business relocation and see how Derek himself influenced the wider development of concert bands like ours almost 30 years before we were formed. Thanks once again for reading.
