2023 Sol Strauss Sol Strauss' Legacy of Fund Grants Philanthropy...


Sol Strauss was once a bachelor gentleman who owned a dry goods store in Paoli. Little did anyone realize that he was amassing a fortune throughout his lifetime to provide for hospitals and charities. A refugee from Nazi Europe, philanthropy was Mr. Strauss' way of giving back to the community that welcomed him.

Since the Sol Strauss fund was, in part, returned to Orange County for management in 2006, it has provided more than \$344,000 in grant funding to the local hospital, charities, and non-profit organizations serving the people of Paoli.

Of each year's payout, four-sevenths (4/7) of the total is designated for the local hospital, with the remainder subject to a grant application process for Paoli organizations for charitable programs and projects.

TEAM OC Orange County Youth Mentoring

In collaboration with Thrive Orange County, TEAM OC Orange County Youth Mentoring tackles issues facing local children each day. They are doing that through the development of a county-wide mentoring program involving both mentors and family mem-

The program is designed to assist youth aged 7-10 years who score high on the Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) test. Adverse experiences such as domestic violence in the home, abuse, neglect, mental health or substance abuse in the home are potentially traumatic when occurring in child-

Through a generous grant from Smithville Charitable Foundation, OCCF has garnered monies for community placemaking projects. The latest beneficiary of that program fund is Orange County Habitat for Humanity. The Foundation was approached with the opportunity to provide 12 hammers for the local building trades class, members of which assist in the building of Habitat homes. The hammers' manufacturer had agreed to supply three free tools for every 12 purchased. How could we resist?
