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## Annual report 2020:

SACSAS Academy is a secular organization dedicated to change in India by focusing on basic education in the belief that education is a critical requisite for socio-economic change. In keeping with this focus, our volunteers are involved with and support projects that are secular and have an education-related component to them. The objectives of this group are:

- To provide education to underprivileged children in India.
- To encourage the formation of various local groups across the world to reach out to larger sections of the population.
- To support and cooperate with persons and groups already engaged in similar activities.
- To raise the required human and other resources to achieve the group objectives.
- To provide opportunities to individuals living outside Manipur and India who wish to participate in Quality Education activities in Manipur.
- To address, whenever possible, other issues affecting human life such as health care, environment, socio-economic aspects, and women's issues.

We will continue our missions and work with the awareness that all our actions and operations must be sustainable and that we must raise awareness to the community. Expressing our gratitude to all our supporters and sponsors, we look forward to continuing to pursue our mission to provide quality education of underprivileged children and doing our part to contribute to uplifting our society and safeguarding our planet.

Since COVID hit us, 2020 was a challenging year. Even though the schools and its surrounding villages were lockdown our dedicated teachers continue to provide education at their homes in small groups. Over 110 kids are making good progress and they were promoted to the next classes.

- 1. Educational achievements in 2020:
- Over 100 students from 4 villages in and around Maojang Village were provided quality education
- Over 96 students from Kumbi village were provided quality education
- 14 students graduated and went to a nearby High School.
- Retention rate: 93%
- Pass rate: 94%

## 2. SACSAS Academy organized six COVID Awareness camps in Moirang region:

We distributed face masks to the public when they came out without the safety gear. Awareness campaigns have helped dispel misinformation about the coronavirus while promoting precautionary measures like frequent hand washing and wearing masks. We communicated to people to refrain from shaking hands, kissing, and hugging for the safety of their loved ones, family members, and the broader community, as

these measures will help us defeat this global pandemic. We distributed the COVID-19 SOP (Standard Operating Procedures)/Guidelines and demonstrated Health and Safety protocols for Reopening of Schools and Learning with Physical/Social Distancing.

We advised the citizens and gave awareness on the latest travel guidelines that was released by the state of Manipur considering the ongoing situation of Covid-19 pandemic.

## 3. SACAS Academy conducted Health Camp at Moirang, Manipur:

SACSAS Academy conducted Health camps with a sacred aim to bring awareness amongst the deprived population in the community who have no access to basic healthcare services or knowledge about the diseases they are suffering from. So, SACSAS provided the importance and objectives of the medical camp free medical advice, medicine to the unfortunate people and refer them for specialized treatment or surgery whenever it is required. These camps make sure people are getting the healthcare at the right time and seeing the doctor early enough before a small health problem turns serious. We focused on the following specialties and made sure that every patient attending the camps are treated similarly and cared for evenly.

SACSAS organized a health camp and awareness program with active support from National Charitable Hospital, Moirang and our volunteer team on the 30th January, 2020.

The medical camp was held in the National Charitable hospital building. There were 4 doctors who provided consultations and prescribed medicines to the camp residents. The doctors include one General Physician, one Pediatrician, one Gastroenterologist and one Gynecologist. Four ODP rooms were setup for patient's visit and one room was used for the medicine distribution. Four volunteers assisted the doctors for keeping patient demographic information and disease record data sheet. Patient's temperatures were checked with thermoscanner before entering the premises. Those who showed raised temperature during screening were isolated first and then with proper precautions they were given treatment and medicines.

Over 150 patients were given thorough consultations and provided free medicines for a week. We really appreciate the support from the doctors, nurses and the volunteer team for their active assistance, local support, hosting, and arrangements for the medical camp.
