




Knights of the Bookcase by Lane Dossett, 33° P.R.






If you've read a Masonic-related book recently, send us a review! In the Fourth Degree we are introduced to the Kabbalah as a system of mystical thought with a note that its influences may be learned only by study, and that a full understanding of Freemasonry is impossible without familiarity with the Kabbalah. This rings true to me after recently finishing an article for the *Tresleboard* on the Brazen Pillars. Unfortunately, it's such a large topic that it is almost impenetrable for beginners. I remember many years ago finding it difficult to locate anyone to guide me, but such is not the case today, as educational materials have become more accessible, almost to the point of choice overload. Here is a review of a few books that I've recently read on the subject and my thoughts. When considering Kabbalist texts, it is important to consider that there are three basic types of literature, the theoretical, the meditative, and the magical.






The Kabbalistic Tree of Life by Z'ev ben Shimon Halevi is an excellent place to start for beginners. It is written from a Masonic point of view and considers the wider application of Kabbalistic thought to everyday life. I would award it one thumb up. It begins with a basic overview of the sefirot and their

application to man. The book excels, in my view, for its wider application beyond theological concepts, and extends to life in general and the universal application of the Tree of Life, which I believe is the Scottish Rite's general purpose for introducing the Kabbalah. Examples include an explanation of time, economics, forms of government, and schools, just to name a few, as shown by the sample graphs below.


The Science of the Kabbalah by Lazare Lenain, translated by Piers A. Vaughn, is a currently trending book in esoteric circles. Originally published in 1823, it has been recently made available in English. It is devoted almost exclusively to magic/magick aspects of the Shem Ha-Mephorash, angelic


sigils, and astrology. I would rate this book one thumb down. While the book contains a very detailed description of these items, in my view, it does little if anything to add to a general knowledge of actual Kabbalah, as intended by the Scottish Rite. Approximately 50% of the book consists of tables and graphs related to the Shem.

The Sefer Yetzirah extends back into antiquity, perhaps beyond the written era into oral Hebraic tradition. While there are numerous versions and interpretations of this text, this version by Kaplan appears to be the current favored edition, as it provides a good, comprehensive



analysis of the multiple versions of the text. I would rate it one thumbs up. This book falls into the meditative group, and is principally focused on the symbolism of the Hebrew letters and gematria. This is very much a scholarly book on linguistics, and should be approached only by those interested in the Hebrew language and its mystical significance. I would not consider this a beginner book.









Like the Sefer Yetzirah, there are numerous interpretations of the Zohar, ranging from a single book to a twenty-three volume encyclopedic set. As a foundational

Kabbalistic text, I embarked on this journey by first travelling to the University of Southern Mississippi library to compare the various texts. The 12 Volume Stanford University Pritzker Edition immediately stood out as the most recent, comprehensive and easy to work with edition (left to right reading vs. Hebraic right to left, back to front). The Pritzker edition is heavily annotated and oriented for the English reader. The Zohar is considered an early mystic Hebraic commentary on the Torah, and the volumes of this text are accordingly organized in this way. In the Kabbalah, there are considered to be four meanings of biblical texts, which are the literal, allusive, allegorical, and mystical. These books, based on the Old Testament, are anything but a

literal commentary. While I have not yet completed the whole set (which can be purchased in individual volumes), it is among the most meaningful books I have ever read. As a lifelong biblical student, this has dramatically increased may appreciation of the Old Testament and the depth of Hebraic mystic thought. I would rate this as two thumbs up, with the caveat that it is a very academic, expensive work for an advanced reader. You can spend weeks on the simple phrase "In the beginning." The first volume will forever change your view of the Masonic initiatic experience of bringing a candidate to Light..

SEC. 7. 
