
PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Winter Storage Tips In case you didn't get around to prepping your Pontiac for winter storage, it's never too late. Here are a few tips on things to do.

Winter sure arrived with a bang this year. Here are a few lastminute winterizing ideas from around the web, in case you and your precious Pontiac was caught unprepared.

Start with your engine. Fuel additive like STA-BIL...some feel it's essential, especially if running a fuel blended with alcohol. Some say alcohol fuels don't break down for years. My take is that it's cheap insurance, so why not? Make your last fill-up an alcohol free one to boot. And keep your tank full for winter. No extra air space in the tank eliminates room for moisture to condense on steel parts and cause corrosion. Check all other fluids, top them off. Test your anti-freeze strength. Fresh oil and filter never hurt. Don't have a Battery Tender or similar device? I'd consider getting one.

Avoid flat spots. Make sure your tires are at the recommended pressure, or maybe a few pounds more. I've read that the rounded base of wheel dollies more evenly supports your tires. And they make your car easier to move if needed.

Keep critters out! Start by blocking paths into the vehicle. Doors and windows tightly closed, vents closed, and tail pipes plugged (I've read that tennis balls or even steel wool work nicely). Clean the interior thoroughly...leave no French fries or other dropped food under the seats which might draw them in. Some prefer strong scented items like moth balls, large shavings of Irish Spring soap, or drier sheets. I hope you don't have any hole in your front-of-dash (aka firewall), but if you do, seal them up.

Control humidity. Companies like Damp-Rid and Arm & Hammer make moisture absorbers which are easy to open and place inside your vehicle to help keep humidity under control.

Protect your paint! A fresh coat of wax and a car cover will protect your paint. Now go settle in for winter, knowing your Pontiac is better protected to start the next cruising season.

Right As Rain By Mike Bartley

In the summer, I take the truck to work because I like the sound it makes at 4:45 am on London Rd in Sarnia and you punch it. The other day, it was raining - not enough to justify having the wipers on low, but enough to have the wipers on a low delay setting. Sounds simple, but guess who does not have delay wipers in his truck?

I got thinking about the car that's sitting in the garage, and how it's similarly equipped. I decided that trying to squint through the windshield isn't even an option. So, if you're like me and you plan on rocking your car in the rain, you might want to call up the folks at New Port Engineering, and they can set you up with a delay wiper motor, switch, and even a windshield washer pump.

After shelling out about \$340.00USD (or \$50,000 CAD), they shipped us a wiper motor, delay switch, and a washer pump for a GM A-body car. The package arrived in a couple days, but there was a problem with the order as they sent the wrong wiper switch. A quick phone call and an email later, the correction was made and the installation could begin.

I could say this project started off by removing the old motor, pump and switch, but since the car is already gutted, ours was simply an installation. But you do you - if you have the luxury of having a fully assembled car, start by taking out the parts you're not going to need. The New Port wiper motor bolted in place of the old one with ease, and the new hardware was spec'd to match the car.



The motor bolted into the stock location and connected to the wiper transmission with ease. Just remember that a 50 year old wiper transmission could use some cleaning and then a light coating of grease.

Next we installed the wiper switch in the car. This switch does not slide like the factory one, but rotates. You will feel the clicks. The first click is the delay, then a second click for the low setting, and a third click for the high setting.



The new wiper switch looks like the old one but instead of sliding to the right, it turns. The first click is the delay setting, the second click is low, and the third is high. Push it in for the washer function.



Installed in the dash you can barely tell it did not come from the factory.

The wiring from the motor was routed into the cabin and connected up to the switch wiring. It was very simple, as all you had to do was match up the wire colours - white to white, etc. The wiring was tucked up under the dash and hidden out of sight.



Connect the wiring under the dash. You will have to feed the wiring from the motor through the firewall and then just connect the matching colours together.

The last install part was to install the windshield washer pump. This little pump is a stand-alone piece that takes the power from the switch and is independently grounded to the firewall.



We went with the New Port washer pump. Instead of having a pulsing washer fluid, this comes out as a spray like a modern car. Later, we will be converting the car to wet. arms.

Instead of just slamming the pump in with self-drilling tek screws, we used nutserts in the firewall to make a nicer looking install.



The pump is now installed in the car. Yes the wiring was eventually hidden in wiring loom.

The final wiring connection was made not to the American Autowire wiring harness, but to a standalone fuse panel that is in the engine bay. Keep in mind that running constant power to the motor does run the risk of the wipers being left on while the car is parked. It's a risk, but I chose to run it to a constant power source because we like to go to the drive-in movies. This will allow for the windshield to be cleared without turning on all the electrical in the car.
