# 1941 Pontiac Silver Streak

We found this 1941 at Norwalk on 2014 and after several years of talking with the current owner, we added it to the growing Pontiac collection in 2017. It is the same model, color, and equipped the same as my father's last car he bought in 1941. He passed in 1950 and I only have one picture of me with the car from 1948. It is a real time capsule and came with all the documentation and I mean all, from its life. Only 66,000 miles and rock solid, near perfect interior, and runs like new. This one with stay in this condition as we do not plan to restore or modify this piece of Proud Pontiac History we have in our collection, after all they are only original once. We don't put many miles on this one, only about 200 a year so far.



# 1964 Bonneville

At the Woodward Dream Cruise in 1999 with our 1978 Bonneville we staging for the Berkley Parade and a few cars behind us in the lane next to ours Jen spotted the 64 and said "is this what you were looking for"? Earlier that day we were in downtown Royal Oak having lunch and parked two cars from us was a 63 Bonneville. I said to Jen now that is something we should add to our garage. Anyway back to the parade, there was a for sale sign being placed by the owner as I walked back to look at it. It looked better as I saw the interior, trunk, and engine and how the underside looked as well. The paint was not original and not the best job in the world, but still a very solid car. We talked with the owner and decided to meet up with him the next day to further discuss to possible sale. Well, we made the deal about noon or so and came back with our friend and his enclosed trailer and it followed us home. When we placed on his lift it looked like is received a lot of care through its life. Still the paint would have to be addressed, perhaps the next year or so. As the paint was not a Pontiac color, we decided to have it put back to Marimba Red, one of my favorite Pontiac 60's colors. In January 2000 on a nice sunny and dry day it was taken to a local body shop and after it was bead blasted under that not-so-nice the body was really in good shape and required only a few repairs, parking lot nicks etc. While it was in the shop we installed the remote mirror on the driver's side, (that was in the trunk when we bought the car), replaced package shelf from Ames. We got the car back five months later a very nice straight original color better than ever left the factory with. We have upgraded the eight lug brakes and trim rings, and found a NOS set of center caps, also a NOS gas filler door guard trim piece and a few other things. The engine 389 w/4bb it has 110,000 miles and the only repair was a new intake gasket, other than that it has never been apart, leaks a bit in the spring, but that goes away as we drive it a few times. We did replace the slim jim transmission with a turbo 400 and the performance and mileage increased. Still gets a solid 14 mpg. The interior is front bucket seats with the console that contains the Pontiac vacuum gage, and the factory tach on to the left of the driver under the dash pad. Original rear bench seat, the front buckets covers are from Harry Samuel Interiors. We have enjoyed this car for over 25 years, and drive it about 2,000 miles each year.



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# 1968 LeMans

We found this car at a lot owned by a friend who had traded it for a Harley a few days before in 2006. Seems the owner's son bought it in the 80's with intentions of restoring it. His father took over the project and in 1989 changed to color from Verdoro Green to Red Flame Poly, (a 1989 Pontiac color), replaced the 350 engine with a 71 400 and added a pretty aggressive cam, bored 70 over, hooker headers and a few other performance options. Jen was very pleased with the color and really liked the way it sounded. A nice straight paint job that has held up pretty good for the age, as did the replacement vinyl top and a solid car. We have added a new exhaust system from the headers back with Flowmaster 40's and a few other items over the years, A nice cruiser and fun to drive despite the gas consumption... We drove this one more than any of the others, about 2500 miles each year.



# 1978 Bonneville Brougham

We bought this car new from Somerset Pontiac on Maple Road in Birmingham Michigan in April 1978. It replaced a 1976 Bonneville Somerset Edition. Ordered most all the accessories they had to offer. Drove it one year as my daily ride and on our honeymoon in 1979. Then it became a Sunday dinner and special occasion car at that point. We put it in storage after we moved from the area in the early 1980's. In 1994, we had all the mechanicals checked and replaced brakes and all the other things that were needed to put it back on the road again. It returned to dealer fresh condition. Began going to car shows with it 1995 with the Woodward Dream Cruise and has been used for that and Norwalk since, along with "Special Occasion" events, anniversaries and so on. It has a REAL Pontiac 400 motor and rides and handles like a new car.

# 1956 Starchief Convertible, Junior

This latest addition to the fleet was acquired at an antique auction in Shipshewana Indiana in the winter of 2023. It is a 13 promotional car with a fiberglass body, and heavy steal boxed frame, a GM started motor with a 12 volt battery mounted in the front of the car. GM had arranged for a company in Chicago to manufacture one for each of the Pontiac Dealers to promote the new 1956 models. From what I understand after the introduction period ended most of the dealers raffled them off for a local charity. After the dealers cars were delivered the company was able to build a limited number them for them to sell. The one we have, although 95% completed was never finished, it retains the original gray primer and is missing the plastic chrome trim pieces. The dimples in the body where those would have been have never been punched through, the same for the head and tail lights. We had a heavy duty custom shelf built and it commands a prominent place in what we call our Pontiac Garage, aka "Wide Track West"

**The 41** is the same exact model and color as my father's last car he bought, in 1941. He passed in 1950 and I came home form it the hospital in it in 1944. A pair of baby booties hang from the i/s rear view mirror.

**The 64** was built the year after I graduated from Shrine High School in 1963. With my first job didn't have near enough for a car like this one. My high school tassel hangs from the mirror.

**The 68** was built the year I was drafted, my US Army dog tags along with a grenade safety pin hangs form the mirror

**The 78** as mentioned was our honey moon car in 1979, thus the wedding garter hangs from the mirror.

**The 56**, well that was just so cool had to bring it home from that auction on a cold windy February day!




