

National Walking Horse Association Dressage Horse of the Year Program

PURPOSE: These annual awards are for the horse and riders who compete in the discipline of dressage. *Text in red denotes new changes for 2021

Eligibility:

- Owner must be a current member in good standing by the last day of the NWHA National Championship Show
- Rider must be a current member in good standing by the last day of the NWHA National Championship Show
- Test scores must be submitted to the NWHA office by November 1
- Awards are announced during the Annual Awards Banquet
- Competition and accrual year will follow same dates as High Point
- There is no cost to participate.

Rider Categories: Open, Amateur, and Youth – You can only compete in 1 category

Horse of the Year Categories:

- Intro Pleasure Champion (Intro A&B only, no canter)
 - o May not sign up for any other traditional level
- Musical Freestyle Champion specify level
- Traditional Champion-specify level
- Western Dressage-specify level
- Working Equitation-specify level
- Cowboy Dressage-specify level

Requirements:

- Each horse and rider team may submit scores for 2 consecutive levels
- Submit Score Report Form with a copy of the cover page of each test by November 1. Do not send originals
- Submit 5 scores from the same level test from 3 different competitions
- Must be from 3 different USDF, USEF, WDAA, Cowboy dressage, Working Equitation, and/or NWHA Dressage judge
- One of the top 3 scores must be from a USDF, USEF, WDAA, Cowboy dressage, or Working Equitation Judge
- Musical Freestyle requires 3 scores from 3 different judges and 3 different competitions
- Pages must include horse and rider name, name and date of competition, Judge's name, and final score percentage
- A horse must complete a ride in the highest test offered in the level

- At least one of the submitted scores must be from the highest test of the level
- The highest median percentage score of each level is awarded the Dressage Horse of the Year Champion
- 2 scores can be from NWHA virtual shows. All other requirements apply.

To find the median of the scores, list in order of the percentages earned, from highest to the lowest. The top 3 scores must be from 3 different judges. The middle (or 3rd) score is the median. The highest 5 scores from 3 different judges must be submitted to be eligible.

EXAMPLE:

- 1. Training Level Test 1; Show 1; Judge-Jane Smith, "R"; Score 68.370%
- 2. Training Level Test 1; Show 2; Judge-Robert Moore, "r"; Score 65.462%
- 3. Training Level Test 2; Show 3; Judge-John Taylor, "L"; Score 62.246%
- 4. Training Level Test 2; Show 2; Judge-Robert Moore, "r"; Score 59.755%
- 5. Training Level Test 3; Show 1; Judge-Jane Smith, "R", Score 52.364%

The median score is #3-62.246%
