His answer was, "When you see a Porsche 911 in my driveway." The question of earthly success has become very appealing to many who promote the 'good life' over 'godly life.' There is nothing wrong with success if it's kept in its proper perspective. The Lord did not call us to be successful, but faithful to His will and purpose. **E. Stanley Jones** showed much wisdom when he wrote, "I do not have to succeed. I have only to be true to the highest I know--success or failures are in the hands of God." **Jewish Scholar Martin Buber** was profound when he said, "God has many names but success is not one of them."



In our popular culture, many seem to be successful as far as earthly things are concerned. Christians need to be very careful about how they perceive success as a rule of thumb. Let's consider the life of our Savior. Was He a success? Suppose our Lord had measured His life by the current evangelical standard of success, He would have been laughed out of court. To many people, He was a 'stone of stumbling,' His own did not believe in Him, and His nation rejected Him. To them, He was a vagabond, a social outcast and had no ministerial ambition. In

fact, Jesus was "wounded in the house of His friends and they all forsook Him and fled."

He knew perfectly well why He came; He came to do the will of His Father, and shouldn't we also long for such a desire in our life—doing the will of God!



HOW would you respond to the question of success? What's true success? Lebanese Scholar Charles Malik showed profound wisdom when he said, "True Success is not fame, wealth or power; rather it is seeking, knowing, loving and obeying God." The more I allow the Word of God sanitize my carnal thinking, the more fruitful my life becomes in God's sight.
