The small version of the Sea Turtle (pictured) is an exact copy of the life size Turtle which is 36" from nose to tail. The life size bronze turtle will be made available to all participating Caribbean countries to be use as an underwater diving attraction. WFCRC is proposing a “**Caribbean Ring of Hope Sites**” in the Caribbean. (see attached map) To add a geologic component to the selection process for Hope Sites creates a strong synergy of cooperation for between sites that produce a combined effect greater than the sum of their separate effects.

From a long term management perspective, to link Hope Sites together geographically makes a great deal of sense, in that it creates a continuous flow of support and knowledge sharing in areas with similar threats and similar solutions. By selecting other Hope sites along the flanks of the Caribbean basin establishes a network of knowledge



based data over a very large area and has an effect on a very large stakeholder base that is affected by similar events.

The socioeconomic aspect has long been a cohesive factor in any development for the Caribbean. For centuries there has been competition for trade and tourism. The development of **The Caribbean Ring of Hope Sites** will allow for equal participation in resource and information sharing. Plans are underway to create an underwater dive attraction by the way of a life size bronze sculpture to be placed at a site determined by each participating country in the Caribbean. (see ring of sites above). WFCRC is a member of and participates in [The United Nations Ocean Conference](#) held this year in New York City.

The Ocean Conference shall adopt by consensus a concise, focused, intergovernmentally agreed declaration in the form of a "Call for Action" to support the implementation of Goal 14 and a report containing the co-chairs' summaries of the partnership dialogues, as well as a list of voluntary commitments for the implementation of Goal 14, to be announced at the Conference.
