Anesthesia for your horse at Cornell:

Demystifying the Hospital Experience.

On Thursday February 22, Dr. Stephanie Hon, DVM, DACVAA, Assistant Professor in the section of Anesthesiology and Pain Management, Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine presented a very interesting and informative talk to members of the CVCA. Dr. Hon began her talk by explaining what a board-certified anesthesiologist is. After completing 4 years of vet school, to become board certified in any veterinary related discipline, there is a requirement of additional training: internships, followed by 2-3 years of a specific, discipline-related residency program. Once the residency is finished, individuals are eligible to sit for a very rigorous exam. In the US, there are approximately 300 board certified Anesthesiologists. World-wide 500. It is a pretty exclusive "club". Most board-certified anesthesiologists work in academic or research settings. However, there are board certified anesthesiologists in private practices.

When your horse comes to Cornell requiring a surgical procedure, there is a step-by-step process that is gone through before your animal actually has surgery. There is a team-work approach, involving the vet student, surgical resident and the clinician to begin the journey. Physical exam and getting an accurate health history prior to surgery is required and necessary. Blood work is done. If necessary, advanced diagnostics, i.e.: radiographs, ultrasound may be performed. Once it is determined that yes, your horse requires surgery, then the anesthesia team becomes involved. More questions may be asked of you, the owner. A pre-anesthetic exam is performed. If it is discovered there are possibly other underlying issues present, such as respiratory or cardiac issues, (as examples), another team is brought in for consult. The beauty of a teaching hospital, such as Cornell, is the accessibility to other experts to become involved, as needed or necessary. Radiologists, Cardiologists, Dermatology, Oncologists, and General Medicine. Experts, all. And, all are all under the same roof, readily available to consult on any case, as need be. The beauty of the University/teaching hospital.

Dr. Hon explained the differences between general anesthesia versus standing sedation. The pros and cons of each. As well as the reasons why one form of anesthetic technique is chosen over the other. She also talked about the different ways to intubate an animal: nasal vs. oral. Positioning of an animal on a surgery table, when under general anesthesia is very important to keep at the forefront. As problems can occur if positioned improperly: nerve paralysis or even tieing-up. She also discussed and explained the post-surgery recovery process and how the anesthetist deals with helping a horse "wake-up" following anesthesia. Slides were shown of the induction process, positioning on a surgical table and of animals in the recovery box. Each step in the process was explained, from walking the horse to the induction room, induction, positioning on surgical table, moving into and out of the surgery room, and finally to the recovery box. It is quite the "journey".

Dr. Hon stressed the importance of, you as the owner, to ask questions of the surgical, as well as the anesthesia teams, in order to become informed and make the best possible decision for your animal. Anesthesia can be a scary thought and certainly isn't without risks. Being informed aids in making the best decision.

Sarah Reitz-Bates:

Sarah is a full-time competitor, trainer, instructor and clinician. Driving is her only business and her passion. Her results speak for themselves, in her domination of the East Coast Combined Driving event circuit, as well as her clients results in their personal competition or recreational driving endeavors. In 2023, she became the first and only driver to win both ADS and FEI Championships at the Intermediate level for Combined Driving in the same year.

Sarah has trained practically every breed of horse and pony. Her methods are solid and permanent. Her philosophy: bonding between horse and driver is essential to the safety and success of the driver and their animal. This is done with positive reinforcement to gain the animal's trust and respect. Sarah's training facility, High Hopes Farm is a "training hub" in Western NY. Clinic Information

The CVCA Cones and Obstacles clinic is for everyone who is interested in learning more about driving cones and obstacles, whether beginner or expert, or somewhere in between.

Clinic is limited to a maximum of 12 turnouts.

All participants will be involved in morning and afternoon sessions both days.

Helmets are required for all drivers and passengers. No exceptions.

Drivers should carry whip in hand. Wearing of gloves is strongly recommended.

All drivers may bring a groom at no additional charge.

Auditors are welcome. Please pre-register.

Hot and cold beverages, snacks and lunch will be provided for clinic participants, grooms and auditors both days.

Coffee and pastries both days.

Current, (2024) CVCA members will be given priority, if registered by May 1st.

Clinic cost is \$250, which includes day and overnight stabling and lunch for both days. A discount will be given for early registration (see registration form).

Overnight stabling is available for both Friday and Saturday night. Driver must provide own bedding and must clean their stall(s) prior to departure on Sunday.

Rough camping (no hook-ups) at Sheffield Farm is available for both Friday and Saturday nights upon request. There is a restroom on the farm.

Drivers are encouraged to bring their equines and equipment Friday night and unload and set up for the weekend. This will ensure a prompt start for the clinic at 9am the next morning.

We encourage everyone to come to Sheffield Farm for a fun weekend of learning and comradery in the sport of carriage driving!



CVCA'S NEWEST FUN DRIVE

The newest CVCA Fun Drive will take place this coming summer on the Finger Lakes National Forest in Hector, New York. This is the only National Forest in New York State. This is a fun Drive/Ride event which will take place on Saturday, June 29 and Sunday June 30. The Drive starts at the Forest Horse Campground on County Route 2 Picnic Area Road leading off of State Route 414, or coming through Trumansburg or Reynoldsville, New York. The Campground consists of 11 truck/trailer sites, each equipped with a fireplace, picnic table, hitching rail and plenty of room for horses and equipment. Some of the sites have lean-to hitching rails with roofs, and there is an enclosed corral where horses can be tied or let loose to relax and roll. There are two composting toilet rooms that are very well kept. The only water available is from a hydrant that is off the site and feeds from a pond. This is not palatable water, so you have to bring your own drinking water and preferably water for your horses needs as well. We are working on having a water truck brought in for everyone's use.

Saturday will start around 9 a.m. with coffee/tea and donuts served before the drive begins. The trail will be driving down Burnt Hill Road. We have driven this route and it is lovely. No hazards and very little traffic of any kind. The dirt road is well kept by the town, but is seasonal use only. You can drive/ride anywhere from one mile to fourteen miles round trip. We will have markers to show you how far you have gone. For those who wish to ride on trails off the road, they can do this. However, carriages cannot fit on these trails; they are only for riding horses. Somewhere between 12 and 1 or so we will gather back at the campground for a dish to pass lunch (more about this later).

For those who wish to go home after the Saturday drive, they can leave anytime. For those who are more adventurous, there is an overnight camping experience being planned. For those staying overnight there is a \$15 camping fee, but there is no day use charge for those coming for a day's drive. Saturday night has campfires with s'mores being planned and lots of stories/fun also still in the planning stage. The next morning breakfast is on your own, which would be followed by more driving/riding if you so desire. Leave time would be at your convenience! Since this is the first every National Forest Drive, we are still in the planning stages. If you have questions, ideas or whatever, please feel free to contact Bobbi Beckhorn or Pam Rumsey.

Note that the entry fees have been waived for the Costume Class along with the Ladies and Gentlemen to Drive classes!

The Sunday morning Pleasure Drive pace class has been modified due to significant changes in the terrain and land ownership. Competitors that drove this class last year will understand that last statement. For the first time, we are offering the Sunday Morning Town and Country Pleasure Drive-Pace. It will be a shorter course and will include elements along the way that one might encounter on a country drive. The LDC Prize List will be available in April and it will include a detailed description of this newest house-rules class. The LDC show committee looks forward to the participation of many CVCA members!
