SPORTS LEGENDS OF CLEVELAND HISTORY PROJECT

The Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD) (formerly Cleveland Public Schools) Athletics Department in collaboration with the CMSD Alumni Association is proud to announce the **SPORTS LEGENDS OF CLEVELAND HISTORY PROJECT** to document the 115-year (1904-2019) history of the CMSD sports programs, athletes, athletic directors, and athletic commissioners to connect the **PAST** to the **PRESENT** for the **FUTURE**. The vision, mission and motto are as follows:

VISION

To revitalize the high school sports programs within the Cleveland Metropolitan School District and transform student athletes into legendary athletes who can compete at the collegiate, professional and international levels.

MISSION

To reestablish a sports model that can be implemented throughout the high schools within the Cleveland Metropolitan School District that is sustainable.

MOTTO

Legends are NOT just born. Legends ARE bred. Cleveland bred.

This project has five initial project outcomes:

- 1. A Sports Legends Benefit Gala
- 2. A Sports Legends Showcase at the Sports Legends Benefit Gala
- 3. A Sports Legends History Book documenting a 115-year history (1904-2019) highlighting the Athletic Commissioners, Athletic Directors, CMSD Schools, and Sports Legends from the international level down to the senate championship teams and/or individuals.

- 4. A Sports Legends Documentary highlighting the 115-year history (1904-2019)
- 5. An unveiling of the past State Championship and Runner-up Banners.
- 6. A Sports Legends Record Book
- 7. An inaugural Sports Hall of Fame Induction

The Sports Legends Benefit Gala will be held at the Cleveland State University's Student Center on Saturday, October 19,2019. The gala will attract former and current athletes, coaches, athletic directors, principals, and the community. Its purpose is to unveil the book cover for the history book, bring additional awareness to the project, showcase the sports legends (e.g., Jesse Owens, Harrison Dillard, Charles Oakley, Tim McGee, Ted Ginn Jr., Troy Smith, Madeline Manning, Manny Leaks, Bill Putich and Phil Argento), and fundraise for the documentary. The Benefit Gala will attract an estimated 700—800 attendees, the history book will highlight thousands of athletes, and the documentary will highlight up to 1000 athletes.

JAMES FORD RHODES—THE MAN

James Ford Rhodes, whose monument has been a center of learning for more than 8,000 area students—was a rich man who left Cleveland and business affairs at 37 to become one of the nation's greatest historians.

When he retired in the late 1880's Rhodes, a brother-in-law to the late Senator Mark A. Hanna left a successful business career with Rhodes and Co., an iron, iron ore, and coal dealership which he had helped establish. Upon his retirement the firm was reorganized and became the M. A. Hanna Co.

Although he never graduated from college, Rhodes studied at New York University and the University of Chicago and received honorary degrees from nearly a dozen universities here and in Europe. First to recognize him as one of the leading American historical authorities was Cleveland's Western University which conferred an honorary LL.D. upon him.

He won the Loubet prize from the Berlin Academy of Science in 1901, the gold medal of the National Institute of Arts and Letters in 1910 and the Pulitzer Prize for history in 1918 for his best known works—"History of the United States from the compromise of 1950." "History of the Civil War," and "History of the U.S. from Hayes to McKinley." Rhodes is also noted for his work in Harvard's history department and lectures at Oxford University.

A native Clevelander, Rhodes was born in a big house which still stands on Franklin Circle on May 1, 1848. He was son of Daniel P. Rhodes, a staunch Democrat from Vermont, and Sophia Lord Russel, granddaughter of Josiah Barber, the first mayor of Ohio City. His father was a cousin of Stephen A. Douglas who is reported to have often visited the Rhodes home and thrilled young James with stories of his classic debates with Abraham Lincoln.

Asked what had been his original incentive to become a historian, Rhodes was quoted in the Cleveland Plain Dealer as saying: "Well, I suppose I was born that way. But the particular thing that gave me the idea, as nearly as I can remember, was when I was a lad of 17 or 18 in Cleveland and began to read Buckle's "History of Civilization in Europe" and Macauley's historical works. "I read a good deal out of school, although in those days there was no great amount of collateral reading assigned to students as there is nowadays." (Rhodes was graduated from West High School in 1865 at the age of 17.) Because of his keen like for writing and history, Rhodes even through his 20—year business career wrote and edited a four page trade circular. It was intended as an advertising statement but rapidly grew into an elaborate philosophical paper. Acceptance of his publication by leading industrialists renewed the young man's confidence in his writing.

After his marriage in 1872 to Ann Card, whose father operated a coal mining business, Rhodes moved into another home on Franklin Circle. A son, Daniel P. was born there.

His business—Rhodes and Co.—formed with M. A. Hanna, Robert Rhodes, C.C. Bolton, A.C. Saunders and George Warmington, became one of the most important firms of dealers in iron ore and its products.

When at 37 he made his first move toward seriously writing history, he had sufficient funds to take care of himself and his family for the rest of their days.

To be "in the thick of things available for research," Rhodes moved to Cambridge, Massachusetts where he finished "History of the U.S. from the Compromise of 1850" and other volumes.

Rhodes, the writer, spent his summers abroad or with his sister, Mrs. Mark A. Hanna, at his cottage in Seal Harbor, Me. He often lectured at Harvard. In 1915, this man who had not graduated from college, was Phi Beta Kappa at that university.

Rhodes died in Brookline, Massachusetts on January 22, 1927. He is buried at Cleveland's Riverside Cemetery a few miles away from the school where the following inscription is etched on a plaque in its front entrance: James Ford Rhodes (1848-1927),,, Turning in middle life from a man of business to a man of letters he became the first American political historian, substantial, sagacious, tolerant. Judicial, he rendered great service to American scholarship and to his country.
