Lent Prepares Us for Easter, Our Life on Earth Prepares Us for Heaven Happy Sunday! Today is the First Sunday of Lent. How are we doing so far? Have you kept your commitment so far on what you decided to do for Lent? Or...are you still undecided on what you are going to do? Many of us were caught off guard on Ash Wednesday because it seems like it

came so fast this year. It snuck up on us. So here is a question, will the sacrifice or change we are willing to make, during Lent, bring us closer to Jesus? You see...this is why we make the commitment. We model Jesus' sacrifice in the desert, for forty days, to prepare our minds and our hearts for Easter. We do it to become closer to Jesus. For instance, if you've decided to cut back on watching TV or cut back on social media, are you replacing that time by devoting more time to prayer? Or, if you've decided to do more of something, rather than to cut out something...could that bring you closer to Jesus? One could decide to go to Mass twice a week or read the Bible every day during Lent.

Now, brothers and sisters, once we have committed to make a change to get closer to Jesus, guess who is ready to de-rail us from our plan. The evil one. The minute we are moving in the direction toward God, the devil is ready to step-in and knock us off track. Satan does NOT like our getting close to God and will do anything to de-rail our attempts at holiness. Satan wants us Christians...who are on track. He doesn't want the ones who are off track because he's already got them. So...in today's Gospel reading, we see that the devil is trying to knock Jesus off track. The Gospel readings for Lent always commence with the story of the temptation. Jesus goes out into the desert to be tempted by the devil. Again, the devil always has one purpose in the bible and that is to move us off the path that leads to God. His goal is to switch our desire in the direction of something other than God. So, the devil confronts Jesus and tempts him. Now Jesus had been in the desert for days and nights fasting and praying. He is alone, he is isolated. He is exhausted. I imagine, in his humanness, that he is weak. This is the time that Satan chooses to strike. He wants to tempt and de-rail Jesus when he is hungry, isolated, and tired. So, he tells Jesus, in Luke's Gospel, to turn these stones into bread. In other words, the devil is telling Jesus to make the desires of the flesh the priority over God. The devil wants us to make sensual pleasure the center of our life. He wants us to make the satisfaction of our bodily desires the center of our life...for food, for drink, for intimacy, and for pleasure. Now...we like the pleasures of the body. We think they are good; they are God given. But, when they become dominant, when they become the Lord of your life, then your deepest desire for God isn't realized. And so, Jesus says, to the devil, in Matthew, Chap 4, that, "It is written: one does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God." In other words, Jesus says, I refuse to use my power for my own benefit and accept whatever God wills. The devil goes on to tempt Jesus 2 more times while he is in the desert. He proposes to Jesus that he throw himself down off the parapet of the temple. In this 2nd test, the devil threw out scripture on Jesus. So...be careful, brothers and sisters, the devil knows scriptures too. The devil quoted Psalm 91:11 when he tells Jesus, "He will command his angels concerning you and with their hands they will support you, lest you dash your foot against a stone." The devil quotes scripture because he wants Jesus to put God to the test. There are people in the world today who may know and quote scripture to get us to do things against God's will. Watch out for them brothers and sisters. Don't let them get you derailed. Temptation is a very real part of life and is especially challenging in our wilderness

times. When we are down, discouraged, afraid, disappointed, and lonely. Satan loves to kick us when we are down. And if you are Christian, you are going to get hit. I imagine some of us feel like we are getting hit right now. We've lost our job, inflation is killing us and we can't make ends meet, we've come down with an illness, our kids have gone astray, and some of us...have lost a loved one. We are going to have these storms of life that hit us. Sometimes they hit us and we didn't even see it coming. Brothers and sisters, when we find ourselves in the wilderness, it gives us an opportunity to turn toward God and not away from God. When we put it in God's hands, we can find a way. 'God may not be there when you want Him, but He's always right on time.'

Lent Prepares Us for Easter, Our Life on Earth Prepares Us for Heaven

The Good News is...being in the wilderness is an opportunity for victory. It's an opportunity for victory with our Lord. You see...God is molding us for something greater. And our wilderness can be a part of that molding process. So we have victory when we rise up to meet the challenges head on and persevere:

- > We rise up when we do the right thing.
- When we stay faithful to God
- ➢ When we put our trust in God
- ➢ When we sit still and listen God
- > We rise up when we love others as God loves us.

The Good News here is that God strengthens us to rise up and meet all of our challenges. He strengthens us because He is with us. Jesus is with us when we are in the wilderness. And He knows what it's like to be tempted. He knows what it's like to get hit. He was hungry and isolated and tired. Sometimes we get hungry and isolated and tired.

- > There will be times when our physical energy levels are low
- Times when we've been working too much
- Times when we are stressed and frustrated
- Times when we are feeling alone

We may feel like giving up...like tapping out. We may feel like giving in to the temptation to do the wrong thing. We are tired of the hits. This is when, Brothers and Sisters, we must turn toward Jesus. St Paul wrote about this experience to the Church in Corinth, in 2 Corinthians, when he says, "We are afflicted in every way, but not constrained; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying about in the body the dying of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our body."

Brothers and sisters, in Jesus, we share in His suffering in the wilderness and in His glory in His resurrection. Again, He is with us. He won't let us down. Jesus loves us. Now some of you may be thinking, Deacon Darryl, I'm not in the wilderness right now. Things are going fine. I am on the mountaintop. My marriage is great; my relationship with my kids and my family is great; and my health is great. I even got all my vaccines. My business or job is going well. I am not hungry or isolated or tired right now. Well...we still have some of our brothers and sisters...around us...in the wilderness. Even though things are great for you, God could be calling you to be Jesus' hands and feet for someone else in need. We can respond and we can help to ease the suffering of someone else. We can let Jesus act through us to ease the loneliness, care for people in need, and comfort those who are anxious or heartbroken or ill. People in need...need our love and our presence. They need our prayers. They need us to be proclaimers of hope and the Gospel, which is the Good News. Wherever we are today...whether we are in the wilderness or on the mountaintop or somewhere in between, let us recognize that Jesus is with us. Let us always stay turned toward him. Let us stay prayed up. Let us continue this week to prepare our hearts and minds, during Lent, for the coming of Easter.


