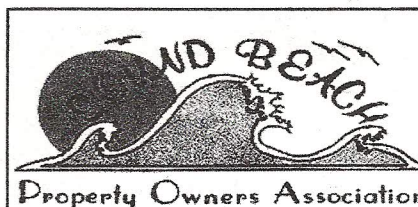

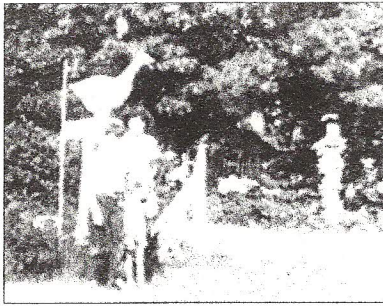
The SBPOA is welcoming a new (well, new is not really the word since he has done this before) Chairman, Tom Whiten. We offer him our support and sincere good

ANNUAL BEACH CLEAN-UP DAY: SEPTEMBER 21, 2002

Each year the S.B.P.O.A. participates in the annual international Beach Clean-up Day sponsored by the **American Littoral Society**. Our volunteers collect and record the litter found on our beach. The information is then sent to the National Littoral Society who studies environmental problems and ways to solve them.

This year, 29 volunteers, including 13 students from the **B.A.N.N (Be a Nicer Neighbor) club of the**

Rocky Point High School joined together to clean up the S.B.P.O.A. Beach. The students were accompanied by their teacher and club leader, **Brooke Bonomi**, and two of his young children.

Approximately 135 pounds of debris was collected. The bulk of the weight came from rusted pipes which somehow washed up on the beach. There was also an old tire, a child's riding toy, and a large unidentifiable metal box. Buoys, fishing lines, plastic bottles and beverage cans were also picked up. The biggest offender of

all, however, as it is all over the world was cigarette butts—found mostly at the top of the stairs. However, take heart, this was the smallest collection in the four years we have been participating in the drive (This indicates that more and more of us are becoming guardians of our environment).

Many thanks to all of our workers, particularly to our High School students. For many of them, it is their **THIRD** year of service to this project.

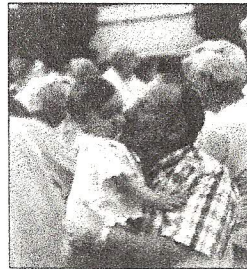

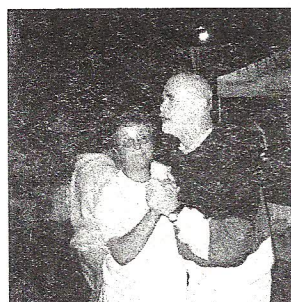

Surf's Up!

Once again, Sound Beach offers a thrilling aquatic experience. To those who say that LI Sound is a calm, boring estuary, July 5, 2002 proved the exception.

After a stifling heat wave, a front moved in during the early hours of July 5. The temperature and humidity dropped and the wind roared in strong from the northwest. Waves up to three or four feet rolled up onto the beach throughout the day. It was as if the surf lashed back from the previous night's onslaught of fireworks from the dunes.

Nevertheless, it did not deter the children on the beach. Armed with their boogey-boards, they rushed into the surf. Some were tossed back instantly and quickly learned the technique of slicing beneath an oncoming wave. Once passed the late breakers, they padded about one-half the distance to

the ropes and turned toward the beach. They bobbed up and down each of the junior surfers. After these early attempts, their technique improved, and it allowed them to stay near the top of the wave for the duration of the ride, thereby avoiding collisions with the bottom.

Halley Kretchmer, Chris and Lauren MacElveen, Lauren Ducca, Jenny McCabe, Val Perazzo and Jack McCabe, all under the instruction of Bruce Kretchmer, were the adventurers. To those of us on the beach, the early rides were at times hair-raising. Most of the junior surfers figured out how to position themselves to best catch their wave. However, some quickly moved to the wave base as they began their ride.

We watched from the beach as the crest began to break over their heads. We jumped from our chairs toward the surf (something we all hate to do!). The tide was low and we knew the rocky bottom would be unforgiving to those who did not master the technique of riding along the crest of the wave. But there is

nothing like the threat of a rocky bottom to make quick studies of each of the junior surfers. After these early attempts, their technique improved, and it allowed them to stay near the top of the wave for the duration of the ride, thereby avoiding collisions with the bottom.

During the winter, those junior Sound Beach surfers can share with friends their feat of surfing along a rocky north shore coastline. They sure had their share of the usual low tide bumps, bruises and cuts as their badge of honor.

Leaving the beach in the late afternoon when the sun was low and the tide higher, you could still see a lone junior surfer, silhouetted against the sky waiting for that perfect wave and maybe... an endless summer.

Row Row Row

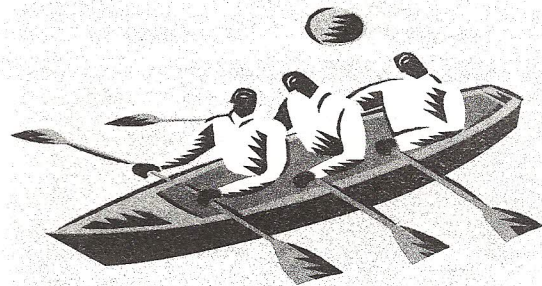

BIDS FOR CONCESSIONS AT THE BEACH ENTRANCES

The lease for the Concession Stand, at the Pavilion, will expire December 31st, 1937, and the Corporation is now offering to any responsible party or parties, who might be interested, the opportunity of leasing space at the East and West Entrances to the Beach in addition to the present Concession Stand at the Pavilion.

OUTLINE OF GENERAL CONDITIONS

1. All three entrances to the beach must be bid upon as a unit.
2. Alterations to the present structure located at the Pavilion, and any new construction must be subject to the approval of the Board of Directors and the Park Commissioner.
3. Interested parties are requested to communicate with E. Lawrence Park Commissioner.

IMPROVEMENT

The few people who have been down to Sound Beach lately have been pleasantly surprised by the sight of a new and up to date thoroughly modern building erected by Mr. Arthur Calace who for the past several years has conducted the Superior Food Market at Community Square.

Visitors were shown through the building which will feature a Self-Service Grocery Department, Meat Market, separate Delicatessen Department, Vegetable Market and up to date soda fountain. Complete automatic refrigeration will service the various Departments. Mr. Calace's slogan will be "City Service in the Country".

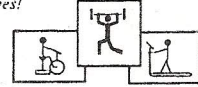


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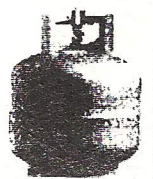


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
