Headquartered in Bangor, Maine, the Blue Knights® operates under an international constitution and bylaws within an organizational structure of an international board of directors and eleven regional conferences, each conference including a number of local chapters. The Blue Knights® promotes safe and responsible motorcycling and sponsors fund raising in support of numerous charities.

The inception of the Blue Knights® came in April 1974 when a Bangor Maine, police officer had the idea of forming a motorcycle club for people in law enforcement. Since then, the club has grown to become the foremost and largest international law enforcement motorcycle club. Today, there are over twenty thousand Blue Knights® worldwide in six hundred chapters in the twenty-nine countries and one commonwealth.

4. **Stay Visible:** Motorcycles are smaller and less visible than other vehicles on the road. To enhance your visibility, wear bright-colored gear and always use your headlights, even during the day. Position yourself in such a way that you are easily seen by other drivers. Avoid riding in blind spots and always use your mirrors to stay aware of the traffic around you.

5. **Practice Defensive Riding:** Defensive riding means anticipating potential hazards and taking proactive measures to avoid them. Keep a safe distance from other vehicles, allowing yourself enough time to react to sudden changes in traffic. Constantly scan the road ahead and be prepared for any unexpected situations. Defensive riding can significantly reduce the risk of accidents caused by the negligence of other drivers.

6. **Stay Sober:** Riding under the influence of alcohol or drugs impairs your judgment and reaction time, significantly increasing the chances of accidents. Never drink and ride, and if you are on medication that may affect your ability to ride safely, avoid getting on your motorcycle.

7. **Ride According to Your Skill Level:** It is important to know your limits as a rider and ride within them. Gradually build your skills and confidence before attempting more challenging rides. Take professional riding courses to improve your skills and learn advanced techniques. Riding beyond your capabilities can lead to mistakes and accidents.

8. **Be Prepared for Emergencies:** No matter how cautious you are, emergencies can still happen. Always carry a first aid kit, a tool kit, and a fully charged cell phone with emergency numbers saved. Knowing basic first aid can be helpful in case of minor injuries.

By following these riding safety tips, motorcycle riders can significantly reduce the risks associated with riding. Remember, your safety should always be your top priority.

Enjoy the ride, but do so responsibly and with caution. Stay safe out there!



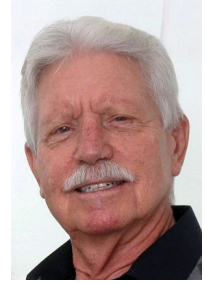

Detox that riding jacket

The other day I was on a day ride with some friends. We stopped for a break and one of the riders walked past me. I noticed him because he was really stinky.

The weather was hot and a little humid, so some personal odor was expected, especially from those of us who wore full riding gear. This encounter was noteworthy because of the odoriferous level.

Now my mind was racing; did I smell stinky, but no one wanted to mention it? To be fair, I had just returned from a 100+ degree ride to Big Bear and back, sweating profusely in my armored jacket. With a little investigative sniff, it was obvious my jacket had acquired some personal pheromones.

That caused me to mentally calculate; how long had I worn this jacket without cleaning it? In fact, how do I clean it? I had never thought about it before, but it had obvious dirty patches on it, and now had a noticeable smell. The collar had oily dark spots under my chin, brought on by months (years) of riding in hot, humid weather.

Maybe you have a jacket like this and wonder how to clean it and maintain the waterproofing. If so, I will tell you of my easy-breezy solution.

My first move was to read the cleaning label on the jacket. While it seemed pretty easy to “machine wash in cool water”, it didn’t give details about detergents or heavy soiling. I called the First Gear customer service number, where I left a message after being told “someone will call you back soon”. After two days of not receiving a call back, I turned to YouTube.

There are a couple of videos on YouTube that show how to clean textile motorcycle jackets. I watched two of them, which told of detergents and cleaning methods. Both included a bath tub, lots of water and a recommendation to use Oxyclean instead of soap. No one suggested machine-washing.

To save you some time, here is the recommended cleaning method that I followed.

- Remove everything from all pockets. Double check.
- Remove the armor from jacket. Mine had pads that were attached with Velcro.
- Fill a set tub or bath tub with cool to warm water, deep enough to submerge the jacket.
- Sprinkle in two to three small cups of Oxyclean powder. Swish around until dissolved.
- Have a stiff-bristle brush handy. You will need it for heavily soiled areas.
- Submerge the jacket and let it soak in the cleaner. Let the Oxyclean work.

- Use the brush to scrub soiled areas. Notice how the water is turning black.
- Do one final hand-tumble in the water. Pull the jacket out.
- Drain the yucky water and refill with clean water. Thoroughly rinse the jacket.
- Hang the jacket in the shower and let it drain. It will be heavy and dripping.
- After about 24 hours move to outdoors for final airing and drying.

Now you have a clean jacket!

But wait. What about the water repellency? New jackets have a significant level of water resistance that you just washed away with the dirt. What to do?

Once again I called First Gear; again, no call back. I did some research. A trip to REI, the camping store helped a lot. A knowledgeable sales associate had dealt with this issue before. His advice follows.

Don't use Scotch Guard. He tried it once on a textile jacket and it was "soak city" in a rain shower. There is also Thompsons Water Seal, but it is petroleum based and leaves a noticeable odor. He recommended Nikwax.

Nikwax is water-based, and soaks into the fabric. The water dries, and the wax remains in the fabric. Special attention should be given to seams. Nikwax recommends two light sprayings with a six-hour drying time between applications. I bought some Nikwax.

I sprayed my jacket, let it dry and sprayed it again. The second coat began to bead up, indicating the water proofing had occurred with the first application. I let everything dry, and gave the jacket the sniff test again.

A fresh, clean smell inside and out. Some slight odor akin to wax, but it was almost unnoticeable. After a day ride in fresh air, the jacket had no odors, yucky or otherwise.

It should be noted that no textile riding jacket is truly 100 percent water proof, even with fabric treatment. If you want that level of dryness, wear a rain suit. But for the daily rides and short trips, a water-resistant textile jacket will do the trick.

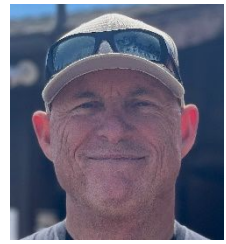
So there you have it; an epiphany about personal hygiene and textile riding jackets. Also, a lesson in cleaning and maintenance of my First Gear jacket.

If I encounter the stinky-man again, I will tell him about Oxyclean and Nikwax.

Blue Knights represented at the Wall That Heals!

On Tuesday, March 19th, the Wall that Heals (WTH) traveled from Skyline Church to its display location at Wells Park in El Cajon, CA, and was on display for visitors from 3/21 - 3/24, 24 hours per day.

The WTH is a 3/4 scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, DC. The WTH also travels with a mobile education center that includes informative videos as well as artifacts left at the Wall in DC.

The WTH visit to El Cajon is one of Thirty-One planned stops for the year 2024. The traveling exhibit honors those that served in the US Armed Forces during the Vietnam War and displays the names of the 58,281 men and women that made the ultimate sacrifice in Vietnam. The WTH is 100% funded by the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund with the vast majority of the funding coming from private citizens.

Blue Knights CA VI Michael Belluso and Sistiana Chestnut were privileged to take part in the motorcycle escort that included over one-hundred vehicles! The WTH escort procession wound from Spring Valley to El Cajon and was a parade with hundreds, if not thousands of patriotic Americans coming out to show support by waving flags and signs.



From the Wall That Heals El Cajon Website - “The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund's average visitor count for their 2023 tour was 7,000 per site. The two previous tour stops in San Diego County (2013 and 2015) were not very well attended so they were not expecting much but El Cajon shattered that trend! The El Cajon tour stop March 20th -24th had just shy of TEN-THOUSAND visitors!”



Sistiana and I both volunteered at the WTH on Friday and Saturday. We felt honored to have had the opportunity to hear directly from Vietnam Veterans of their experiences and unique perspectives of the Vietnam conflict during the WTH event. The application process to host the WTH is from all accounts lengthy and involved.

Kudos to those involved in the El Cajon effort! We highly recommend visiting the WTH if you ever have the opportunity.

Membership and Recruiting

Moving forward is the only way to survive (John Green)

The Blue Knights are not unique in one important area: recruiting and maintaining membership. Most all social clubs have the same membership challenges.

What are the challenges for Blue Knights? Here are the obvious.

Qualified member pool

We are very selective in who may be a member. Only about one in 10 applicants are qualified to be law enforcement officers. Of that population, only a small percentage are motorcycle riders. There are several motorcycle groups that cater to law enforcement members; the Blue Knights have a lot of competition.

Image vs. reality

Three-patch motorcycle clubs bring to mind outlaw bikers. Movies, and even some well-meaning “gang detectives”, have reinforced the negative connotation of three-patch equals outlaw. Some police “advanced training” seminars have seen instructors equate Blue Knights with outlaws. Action by Blue Knights International has stifled much of the inaccurate police perception, but public opinion persists.

While the Blue Knights have made efforts to modify our vest patches, three-patch attire still prevails. Despite our Blue Knight pledge and law-abiding travels, the public doesn’t know us as “the good guys”.

Lack of exposure

Blue Knights are still a mystery to most of the population, even fellow law enforcement officers. Yes, there are Blue Knight postings on Face Book, but not everyone follows social media.

Many police agencies discourage their active-duty officers from being members of a law enforcement motorcycle club. Much of this attitude comes from other law enforcement motorcycle groups who emulate outlaw bikers in dress and demeanor. The Blue Knights are painted with the same brush as the wanna-be outlaw cops.

On top of all this, an in-depth study by the Union-Tribune newspaper recently reported that tens of thousands of people have moved out of San Diego County in the last year. That includes qualified candidates for Blue Knight membership. You probably know someone you worked with who lives in another state today.

The U-T study listed factors such as traffic, increase in homelessness, failing infrastructure, shifting local and state politics and lack of affordable housing.

While these are things that we cannot control, we must consider how to deal with the diminishing pool of qualified members. If we don't make an effort, the Blue Knights will experience a similar reduction in "population". **"Moving forward is the only way to survive."**

We need to do a better job of public relations. Sure, we go on rides to support causes. We donate time and money to worthwhile charities too. But still, Blue Knights are not well recognized for our family-inclusive format; something that is unique to us, and desirable in American society.

The challenge

Action is needed for Blue Knights to survive and thrive, especially in California. We cannot be satisfied with being a "breakfast club" or stray from the attractions that brought us in as members.

Riders primarily join motorcycle groups for common reasons; Social interactions with people they relate to, structured riding experience, frequent rides, learning new riding techniques and pride of membership. Blue Knight leadership should remember these reasons and promote them all – all the time.

Sustaining healthy memberships requires a never-ending, year-round, all-hands participation. There are no "recruiting seasons"; every day is recruiting day. For every member, not just Blue Knight leaders.

You can do this. If you are a proud member, be an ambassador for your chapter. (If you're happy and you know it, clap your hands.) If there is a reason you can't be a part of the cheering squad, let your Board of Directors what they can do better.

Some personal recruiting ideas



When you ride, Blue Knight activity or not, watch for **potential members**. (Don't refer to them as "Prospects".) Make personal contact, and ask if they know about the Blue Knights. Be ready to tell them why you like being a Blue Knight. Emphasize that we are the "good guys"; we invite all family members to any event we do. That is the real difference between us and all other motorcycle clubs.

Invite them to the next Chapter membership meeting. Having a Blue Knight business card with you is important. (Blue Knight business cards are available from your Board of Directors.) Write the date, time and location of the meeting on the card. Tell them to look us up on the internet. We have a Blue Knight Facebook account as well as a Chapter website. We are well represented on both venues.

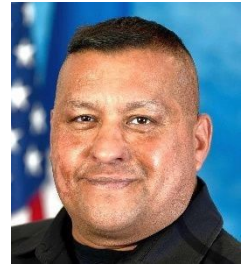
