



I Op'ed But I Didn't Drop

On a recent evening a group of 10 or so model railroaders gathered at Rick Stern's for an operating session on his Santa Fe layout. The group ranged from veteran OP session attendees to rank neophytes. (meaning me) After everyone was assigned a position ranging from Dispatcher down to Road Engineer, we all got down to running a railroad. (Incidentally, Bruce hit another truck. Really. As usual, he tried to blame it on someone else.) I've been running trains on my own or other's layouts for more years than I'd care to admit but this was my first "OP" session where everyone has an assignment based on real life operations.

If you haven't seen Rick's railroad, it's DCC controlled and complete with a dispatcher's panel, operating automatic signals and just about everything else that's on a real railroad. My first assignment was road engineer on the work train, After driving thru a couple of red signals causing alarm bells to ring and throwing the entire railroad into chaos, I finally got the hang of it and managed to bring my train to it's destination with all the cars I started with still on the rails.

I think the highlight of the evening for me was when I got to run the local commuter train equipped with a camera in front. Sitting in front of a color TV set and watching the progress of a train your controlling that's completely out of sight on the other side of the basement is a totally new experience. I've seen and photographed this railroad several times in the past but the perspective from track level is awesome, especially going thru tunnels, over bridges and approaching the signals. At times you get so interested in the view, you forget you're in control of the train and suddenly realize at the last minute that red signal means you're supposed to stop. The hardest part of driving the commuter train was getting used to the fast clock. As the engineer/conductor I was given a timetable with arrival and departure times at each station along the way. However, unlike Amtrak, I usually arrived early and but always left on time.

The OP experience made for an interesting and fun filled evening. If you haven't tried it, you don't know what you've been missing. It's one more fascinating side to this great hobby of ours.

[Yes we had quite a lot to share]. All in all, Amtrak to convention was a great ride, made even better by employees that understand what service really is. The Raton Pass

One of the high-points of the Southwest Chief is going through Raton Pass. Every time I travel through the pass I see something new. This time was just observing the many species of tree that grows in the pass. I used to have a chap in the 338th Army Band, who used to quip, "All you need to model the Santa Fe is a flat table and a large sand-pile. You surely can't prove that at Raton; there are a lot of trees of many types. I suspect I don't have nearly enough trees. Much of the trackwork has been removed as the BNSF is forwarding much of its freight traffic via the old southern route through Oklahoma and Texas. Currently the route will be used by New Mexico's Sun-setter commuter service. I realize that I will be recreating some railroad history with my new layout.


