It was great to catch up with both members and chat with them. BTW





Ian Rudd's new found interest in music Caion Snare Drum



One of the recent requests from the Music Therapy Depart-

ment at the Children's Hospital Randwick was for some more different musical instruments. I found the basic drum design was very popular on You Tube and I proceeded to modify the design to include both a Snare wire and engraving on each of the polygon faces. The drum is designed to be played by using your hands but I have also included two special drumsticks to allow children an easier way to play the drum.

The side walls are made from 16mm Meranti and the Tappa (the drum face) is made from 2mm plywood. The drum has been finished with multiple

been finished with multiple coats of Feast Watson Wipe on Poly. The snare wire gives the drum the extra rattle when played.

Roger Dixon made a beautiful Chess Board



Roger reports: "This project was commissioned by the son of a stall holder (selling Greek meals & sweets) at the Ramsgate school markets, some time ago.

The 60mm squares were cut from dressed 8mm Rock Maple and Murray River Red Gum for contrast.

The 64 pieces were then glued with one colour facing opposite grain to the other to an oversized 12mm plywood board starting at a selected 90 degree corner. After the glue had cured the base plywood board was squared to 480mm x 480mm and then sanded.

The top side mitred picture frame was made from a 4mm strip of Baltic pine glued to 26mm Murray River red gum strip then glued.

The underside mitred frame was made from $6\,\mathrm{mm} \times 50\,\mathrm{mm}$ Baltic pine. This was added to give a thicker appearance.

Overall dimensions when fully dressed and sanded is 540mm x 540mm x 26mm.

From the materials used, the Rock Maple was donated by Ian Rudd and the Murray River Red Gum/Baltic pine was donated by Ray Tregoning. The board was finished with 4 coats of Anchor Lacquer 100% gloss."

Neil Matthews made a recipe book holder



Neil reports: "Recently my next neighbour -door came in with a small fruitcake as a thank you for a small job I had done for her. She saying was she needed something support her recipe books while she was cooking, and did I have any suggestion.

I had some bits of Queensland maple that would do the job, but I thought this book holder would be a nuisance when not in use so I decided to make it as a collapsible unit

that could be easily stored away. I had no ideas of size or angles and was largely restricted by the available material. I would get one go at making it correctly. I worked on 15° and hoped it would work. I used the same angle for page separation and the layback angle. It worked!

I did find a problem that the base would tip over when a large book was used. This was solved with a pair of fold-back stainless-steel outriggers.

The final gadget to hold the pages open, I made from a piece of 90mm PVC tube and a piece of polycarbonate. All good and I am looking forward to another thank you."

MEMBER PROFILE: KEN TYSON #236

On May 10, 1946 Ken was born to Joan & Ken Tyson at Cromer in Norfolk County, England. He attended the



Cromer Primary School followed by his higher education at the Cromer Secondary School ending his studies at 15 years of age.

Ken's school years were a busy and happy time occupied in supplementary sports and activities. He played football (rugby), cricket and hockey for the Cromer School Team.

Ken and cousin John played Roller Hockey for the Cromer Team. During his busy youthhood he learned to sail.

Ken's Grandfather taught him to fish, build fishing rods and introduced him to the <u>safe</u> sport of shooting.

His two uncles greatly influenced his younger life showing him skills in building canoes, land yachts and "all the other things a Dad would have done". Ken says with the loving conviction of these 3 men made him the man he is today.

Ken was selected by H. Bullen & Son to do his apprenticeship in Carpentry and Joinery,

For 5 years Ken attended the Norwich Technical College part time obtaining his Trade Certificate. Full Technical and Clerk of Works passing out in the top 3%. Ken then worked alongside his uncle in the family business until he came to Australia.

Just before his 21st birthday Ken together with two mates Robin and James left "the Old Dart" to spend time in Australia and New Zealand. Until the 1970's Ken worked in many places around Australia at his trades with his Australian Builders and Australian Boat Licences.

Having met in 1972 Ken married Dreena on November 25, 1980.

Ken later went on to work as foreman of the joinery shop and emergency response group at the University of NSW. He was made redundant on February 3, 2012.

In retirement Ken is not short of hobbies. He is an active angler, loves boating. sailing, the beach and particularly **WOODWORK.**

He also loves his birds, likes to shoot with bow and gun and has an affinity with dogs and horses.

MaxiDay June 2022 Guest Speaker

Our MaxiDay guest speaker, Justine Fisher, is a paramedic educator; she is a local, living in Cronulla. In addition to being an educator she is also a real life paramedic attending to incidents requiring her skills.

Her MaxiDay talk was on *drugs and alcohol* in our community with particular attention to the impact on the younger members of our community.

We learned that while human brains are physically mature in our teens our emotional maturity is not complete until we are in our mid-20's. Consequently, when assessing the risks versus pleasure of drugs and alcohol the younger community members may make decisions that are inappropriate.

The income of younger community members impacts their ability to afford different types of drugs. For example, alcohol is readily available and lots of different types of alcohol are quite cheap. As community members mature and enter the workforce their disposable income increases and therefore their ability to purchase more expensive drugs, such as, cocaine.

Unfortunately, some drugs are both highly addictive and generate extreme highs and extreme lows for users. The long term consequences can be extremely devastating for the drug user and the families and friends.
