God filled Enoch with his Holy Spirit when his son, Methuselah was born. In total unity, Enoch walked with God, during a time when the inhabitants of the whole earth were reveling in sin having partnered with fallen sons of God. Nephilim walked the earth before [and after] the flood (Genesis 6:2). These are the seed of a forbidden union. They entered into a war against God—one that resulted in the great flood. Their names were never written in the Book of Life because **they are not the children of God** from the descendants from **BOTH ADAM AND EVE**. “The inhabitants of the earth **whose names have not been written in the book of life FROM THE CREATION OF THE WORLD** will be astonished when they see the beast, because he once was, now is not, and yet will come” (Revelation 17:8). They will appear again on earth in the last days, during the Great Tribulation.

Noah walked with God. “Noah, however, found favor in the sight of the LORD. These are the family records of Noah. Noah was a righteous man, blameless among his contemporaries; **NOAH WALKED WITH GOD**” (Genesis 6:8-9).

Noah was 600 years [300 X 2] when the flood started. “Noah was 600 years old when the flood covered the earth” (Genesis 7:6). Noah was given a double portion of God’s Holy Spirit as Joseph was given a double blessing. As Noah saw the evil age washed away and the beginning of a new age, Joseph saw his people living as slaves in Egypt and foresaw their great deliverance.

Abraham was promised by God to be the father of many nations, if he would walk with God. “And when Abram was ninety years old and nine, the LORD appeared to Abram, and said unto him, **I am the Almighty God; WALK BEFORE ME, and be thou perfect.** And I will make my covenant between me and thee, and will **multiply thee exceedingly**” (Genesis 17:1-2).

When Abraham was 100 years old, Isaac was born (Genesis 21:5). Finally, the first of the children of promise was born.

Parents of John the Baptist, Zacharias and Elizabeth, walked in all the commandments and ordinances; they were blameless. “There was in the days of Herod, the king of Judaea, a certain priest named **Zacharias**, of the course of Abia: and his wife was of the daughters of Aaron, and her name was **Elizabeth**. And they were both righteous before God, **WALKING IN ALL THE COMMANDMENTS AND ORDINANCES OF THE LORD BLAMELESS**” (Luke 1:5-6).

“**And he [John the Baptist] will turn many of the children of Israel to the Lord their God.** He will also go before Him in the spirit and power of Elijah, ‘to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children,’ and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, **to make ready a people prepared for the Lord**” (Luke 1:16-17).

The children of promise were prepared by John the Baptist for Christ who paid the penalty of mankind’s sins and made possible the outpouring of God’s Holy Spirit. In great humility, John the Baptist pointed the people to Christ, their Savior. “He who is coming after me is mightier than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry” (Matthew 3:11).

Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Zacharias and Elizabeth, John the Baptist—it has taken time, slowly initially but at His designed pace, God is granting mankind His Holy Spirit, so we can walk with Him. Our great examples of the past were obedient to God. They kept all of God’s commandments and ordinances; they were found blameless, worthy of their vocation as servants of God. They were rich in faith, walking in the spirit: “love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law... Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit” (Galatians 5:22-25).

They walked as children of light. “Live a life worthy of the calling you have received. Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. There is **one body and one Spirit**—just as you were called to **one hope** when you were called—**one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God** and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all” (Ephesians 4:1-6).

Scripture is clear. “He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And **what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God**” (Micah 6:8).

Be an overcomer. “He who overcomes will inherit all this, and I will be his God and he will be my son” (Revelation 21:7).

The 144,000 from the twelve tribes of Israel will be found blameless. “These are those who did not defile themselves with women [false religion], for they kept themselves pure. They follow the Lamb wherever he goes. They were purchased from among men and offered as first-fruits to God and the Lamb. No lie was found in their mouths; they were blameless” (Revelation 14:3-5).

The great multitude that no one could count from every nation will be wearing robes of righteousness and holding palm branches of peace. “A great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands... these are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb” (Revelation 7:9-14).

Do all you can to find what pleases our Creator—God. “By faith Enoch was taken out of this life and did not experience death. He could not be found because God had taken him away. Before he was taken, **he was complimented as one who pleased God**” (Hebrews 11:5).

“Without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him” (Hebrews 11:6).

“For the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness, and truth and **find out what pleases the Lord**” (Ephesians 5:9-10).
