2015 Induction Ceremonies and Speakers

Following an enormously enjoyable Friday evening cocktail party at the Amelia Earhart Birthplace Museum in Atchison on June 19th, nineteen honorees were inducted into the Forest on the morning of the 20th. The ceremonies were held in the Fay Gillis Wells gazebo, surrounded by the waving flags of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and 36 territories and foreign countries which have trees in the Forest. The weather was beautiful. Within the Forest's overall theme of "World Friendship though Flying" (www.ifof.org), this year's theme was "Flying and Forests," linking aviation and aerospace with the Earth's green spaces. This topic combines several rich and diverse categories, such as smokejumpers, wildland fire aviation, remote sensing and analysis of forests and other ecosystems, forest and habitat management, precision agriculture, and other activities.

In addition to the inductees, we honored Geoffrey "Craig" Hunt, who was killed on October 7, 2014 when his S-2T airtanker crashed while performing fire-fighting duties during the Dog Fire near Yosemite National Park. A 13-year veteran pilot of Dyncorp International under contract with CAL FIRE, and former naval aviator, Craig was 62. He is survived by his wife of 39 years, Sally, two daughters, two brothers and a sister.

We also dedicated a tree to Marjorie and Arthur Anderson, longtime supporters of the Forest and members of its Forest's Committee. Marjorie flew on to New Horizons on December 14, 2014 and will be greatly missed.

We had three speakers this year. During the ceremony, Larry Biles, Kansas State Forester, spoke about the Kansas Forest Service and its relationship to the International Forest of Friendship (see below). After lunch, Art Hinaman, Assistant Director, Aviation in the Fire & Aviation Management division of the Forest Service headquarters in Washington, spoke about aviation and the Forest Service. Dr. Greg Asner, our principal speaker, addressed his work with the Carnegie Airborne Observatory (CAO) in airborne mapping and monitoring ecosystems. His videos from the aircraft and description of the extent of drought damage to California forests were exceptional. Links between Kansas State Forestry and the International Forest of Friendship

One of the highlights of the 39th year was strengthening the ties between the Forest and Kansas State Forestry. This spring three members of the Kansas Forest Service--Mr. Larry Biles, State Forester, Mr. David Bruton, District Forester and Mr. Mitch Lundeen, Water Quality Forester—planted a Swamp White Oak in the Forest to represent the IFOF's links to state forestry in Kansas, which was re-enacted in a ceremonial event on June 10. These links go back more than 40 years to 1973, when planning for the International Forest of Friendship began among the 99s, the city of Atchison, and the Kansas State University, Kansas Forest Service as a bi-centennial gift to the nation, a vision that was realized in 1976.

The Swamp White Oak (quercus bicolor) is a striking tree with attractive peeling bark, especially on young trees. The lustrous, lobed leaves have a two-tone appearance, dark green on top with a silvery-white underside, which turn an orangeish-gold to yellow in mid-autumn. It has a very large range in America's north central and northeastern mixed forests, grows rapidly, can reach 60 to 80 feet tall, and is long-lived. It is one of the more important white oaks for lumber production. In the fall when acorns drop this tree attracts wildlife such as deer, ducks, and geese, as well as other animals. Some 400 Swamp White Oak trees are being planted in the September 11 Memorial Plaza in Manhattan.

Plans for 2016 (our 40th Anniversary!) and Beyond

We are particularly looking forward to next year's induction ceremonies, which will be on June 17-18 (Fri-Sat), 2016. This will be the Forest's 40th anniversary! The focus for 2016 will be on "World Friendship through Flying," and the emphasis will be on international activities. We hope to have wide involvement from the 99s international chapters and others around the world.

Even as we prepare for 2016, we will be working to strengthen the ties forged this year with the Kansas State Foresters and with the U.S. Forest Service. As noted in our second newsletter in March, there is an enormous amount of activity underway worldwide within the "Flying and Forests" category. We hope to build on the 2015 theme to develop partnerships between the Forest and many other organizations. In addition to activities around Atchison, this could include ties with agriculture-based businesses, as well

as other aviation and aerospace organizations in Kansas. We'd like to work with the Explorers Club in their explorations of the biosphere, and leverage the explosion of opportunities in open source Geospatial Information Systems (GIS) development. The use of aviation, remote sensing and related data analysis in precision agriculture could be a collaborative area. Another potential set of ties would be to collaborate on educational projects, particularly in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) areas, while adding Art and Design (to make it STEAM). This could be done together with organizations like Rotary International, Challenger Center, Young Eagles, Girls Fly, etc. In sum, this year's events could be the basis for a very rich web of cooperation.

We would welcome discussions on these topics with anyone or any organization that's interested and would like to explore several types of relationships going forward:

(1) Following up on this year's "Flying and Forests" events;

(2) Encouraging greater participation in ongoing Forest activities around Atchison; and

(3) Developing an understanding of how we might work with partner individuals and organizations on future activities at the Forest. Upcoming themes include:

2016: "World Friendship through Flying"—Focused on international activities and the Forest's 40th year.

2017: "Flying, Forests, and the Future"-- Emphasizing contributions by people under 35.

2018: "Security and Solace through Flight" – Especially military aviators, flying medical staff, Angel Flight, etc.

2019: "Discovery through Flight" – Honoring those who have "pushed the envelope" in all aspects of aviation and aerospace.

Within the Forest leadership, Leonard Buddenbohm was elected as Co-Chairman and Kathy Carrigan has become Executive Director. Pat Carrigan and Kay Baker remain on the committee, and we thank them very much for their service and for continuing to serve.
