National Issues

COOL Lawsuit – Proudly promoting USA beef, the Kansas Cattlemen's Association Board of Directors met in August and unanimously voted to support the United States Cattlemen's Association (USCA) and Ranchers-Cattlemen's Action Legal Fund United Stockgrowers of America (R-CALF USA) in the intervention of the COOL lawsuit initially filed by the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA), multinational meat organizations, and foreign cattle groups. Kansas Cattlemen's Association has offered its support to both USCA and R-CALF USA. On behalf of Kansas cattlemen, the KCA Board also unanimously decided to, if an opportunity arises, to offer testimony to the court in support of country of origin labeling.

GIPSA in Farm Bill – KCA along with over 100 groups reached out to Congress to encourage them to remove any language that would prohibit GIPSA from enforcing the law or deny producers protection from fraud, retaliation, and illegal anticompetitive practices. **KCA continues to support the needs of independent producers.**

Smithfield – In early September, the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States approved Shuanghui International Holding's bid to purchase Smithfield Foods. This is the biggest buyout by the Chinese of a U.S. company to date. The deal is valued at over \$7.1 billion and results in the merging of the world's largest pork company with China's biggest pork producer.

Chicken from China – USDA approved four Chinese poultry processors to begin shipping cooked poultry products to the U.S. Initially, the companies will be allowed to export only cooked products from birds raised in the United States and Canada. With the COOL law lingering, this could mean that consumers would not know if their product is from the U.S. completely or was processed and cooked in China and shipped back to the U.S. Does anyone remember the melamine issue? Discussion has already risen about the U.S. government eventually expanding the rules so that chickens and turkeys bred in China could end up in the American market. What do you think about this? EPA – With the urging of many in Congress and groups such as KCA, the EPA took some action to prohibit environmental groups from obtaining producer information such as individuals' names, addresses, and telephone numbers. In a letter to the EPA and Congress, KCA expressed its concern that activist groups could use the information to harass and endanger not just producers but family ranchers and their children. These environmental groups, Environmental Integrity Project, Food & Water Watch, The Humane Society and Iowa Citizens for Community Improvement, then turned around and sued the EPA alleging the federal agency unlawfully discarded the rule that would have authorized it to collect information. In fact, though, the same information is still collected, often from state agencies like KDHE, and provided to the EPA. The EPA has not stopped obtaining producer information; it just stopped distributing the information to extremist groups.

State Issues

Corporate Ag Law – As state legislators prepared to meet in Topeka for a special session to address the "Hard 50" rule, a group of lawyers targeted Kansas' corporate ag law once again. At the request of Rep. Sharon Swartz, the Chairwoman of the House Ag Committee, the group which included two legislators, discussed the constitutionality of the law. The Kansas Department of Agriculture and corporate interests have suggested that the law needs to be thrown out. KCA and other state farm groups have been champions of this law to protect the interests of independent producers.

A Month on the Road – KCA staff and volunteers traveled the state throughout September to visit with producers and promote KCA policies, USA beef, and the Kansas cattleman. KCA staff also telephoned a number of members and had the privilege to hear from them about their thoughts on some of the issues that are prevalent in the industry. Many of the discussions focused on COOL. Members shared compliments, suggestions, and concerns. KCA staff always appreciates the opportunity to talk with producers and get your views. Thank you for your membership and your contributions to your industry.
