

# Biodiversity is all the different kinds of life you find in one place.

Often, these living things work together and depend on each other – for example: bacteria in pea plant roots, humans and the land where their food comes from.

# Living things are found everywhere; for example:

- Your lawn or a wood or the sea, these will have lots of different kinds of life in them
- A pavement, a carpet or a wall, these will have fewer different kinds of life
- We know that plants grow better when they live in "rich" soil which has lots of other living things in it
- That is true for all living things including the animals and plants which provide our food
- But it is also true for us we grow and feel better when we have other living things around us: our pets, other people, plants
- But also, helpful bacteria; in and on our bodies, our gut and skin



# We want to help by offering suggestions and examples of where we can help to make a more biodiverse world:


- Successes in our own community and how we can add to them

- Encouraging people to talk about it to each other



**Flower Seed Balls** 

**Free Today** 

#### How to make them

You will need

- 1. Selection of local or UK flower seeds
- 2. General purpose compost
- 3. Cheap flour

#### Method:

- 1. Mix 1 cup of flour with water stir with a stick or spoon until gloopy 😂
- 2. Mix 1-2 tablespoon of seed with 2 cups of compost/soil into a bucket /bowl
- 3. Add the flour and water mixture to the compost and seed and mix it all together
- 4. Now the balls can be formed. The mix just needs to be gently rolled in the hand to form a golf-ball sized ball
- 5. Place the balls in a tray or box and allow them to dry for 24 hours
- 6. Find a space that needs a bit of brightening up, and throw or plant the seed ball preferably just before it is due to rain
- 7. Sit back and watch a little oasis of flowers grow over the next year and keep an eye our for bees and butterflies feeding on the flowers
- 1. Ideally, seed balls should be made the day before rain is forecast and then cast 24 hours later hopefully before the rain has started! If it doesn't rain then no matter, the seeds will be fine for a few days
- 2. Instead of the children all making round balls perhaps they could get creative and make different shapes?
- 3. If you are concerned that birds will eat the seeds then add a little paprika to the mix. It won't hurt them but birds don't like it!

# **Building a Bug House**





# It's (mostly) pieces of damp wood!

To make a log pile, simply collect small logs, large sticks and pieces

of rotting wood. Pile them up in a damp, shady area of your garden, then stuff some dead leaves in the nooks and crannies to make it cosy. Good for: centipedes, woodlice and beetles who like to burrow into decaying wood.

### **But Why**

Remember the days when the front of cars was covered with insects when you drove at night? We have lost 60% of our insect life. Bug hotels provide shelter for insects which are essential for pollination and prey on pests; but they can also give shelter to anything from hedgehogs to toads, solitary bees to bumblebees, and ladybirds to woodlice.




## **Bats**



### Things you might like to do next and where to find out how:

- Use your free seed-balls in your garden, buy some more or make your own
- Build your own bug houses—almost anything works and it encourages lots of other creatures too—e.g. think hedgehogs!
- Think about getting your own swift box(s) fitting is included in the price
- Look out for our bat population always busy at dusk; especially where there are insects, maybe those living in your bug boxes
- Look out for the local bird population; more varied than you
  might think; locals include blackbirds, robins, starlings, gold
  finches, sparrows, rooks, magpies, pigeons and more—but there
  are owls, sparrow-hawks, red kites making looking out for dinner
  and house-martins nesting in summer. How many could you see if
  you really tried.




