Club Hunt Details

Hunt Results:

28 members and 1 guest turned out for the Christmas club hunt. Don put out 50 white zinc pennies good for a silver quarter, seven gold pieces of clad good for a dime, five silver half dollars were hidden in the park, and a special token. Thanks to members who brought cookies and fudge to count out.

The club found some silver coins in the park, Tim found a Rosie and War Nickel, Jackee found a 1939 Washington Quarter and Mercury dime. Jerry found a 1919 wheat penny and won the oldest coin. A nice silver ring was found by Willy and Ryan found a broken earring stamped Mexico 925.

At count out, Kirk and Bill announced they had each found a hidden silver half dollar. Don is recovering the other three. Everyone who didn't find a white zinc penny was awarded a silver quarter, which was about half the turnout. Then members with found tokens turned them in, some members had up to four tokens good for a quarter! In all, 28 of the 50 were found. Only two of the gold tokens were found and the special token was not recovered. Extra member draws were held for each natural silver coin found on the day, and the special token prize. So five additional silver coins were given out to members by random draw. Pull tabs were collected and will be donated to the American Legion.

For the membership drawings, Steve E. and Dan R. won Franklin half dollars. Kirk won a \$50 gift card to Heathen Brewing donated by Tom S. Willy won a Washington quarter.

Well, about 5 minutes into detecting the newly scraped site, my third target was this 1861 seated half dollar in very fine condition. I also found a buffalo nickel (no date), a 1917 wheat cent and a colored glass brooch on that day. I always knew there had to be more silver there - I just needed to get down deeper. Obviously this a bucket lister for me, and to date the oldest U.S. coin that I have found.

Thanks all! Hope to swing with y'all soon




Now, why would anyone put this message a junk penny? Unless maybe they were looking for change for a nickel.


