2023 Florida Hurricane Season

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) predicts a near-normal 2023 Atlantic hurricane season this year. NOAA is forecasting a range of 12 to 17 total named storms (winds of 39 mph or higher). Of those, 5 to 9 could become hurricanes (winds of 74 mph or higher), including 1 to 4 major hurricanes (category 3, 4 or 5; with winds of 111 mph or higher). NOAA has a 70% confidence in these ranges. Given the effects of last year's storms here on Twin Rivers we should all be aware of these storms and prepare accordingly.

Attached is an Emergency Supply Checklist provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for your planning and use. The 2023 season starts on 1 June and ends 30 November.

The HOA is committed to assist its members anyway it can before, during and after an event. Please reach out to us if you have any questions.

Architectural Review Committee



The architectural committee has been empowered by the Board to ensure the community maintains its aesthetic and financial values. Angry homeowners across the country have made members of association architectural committees seem like ogres. But what exactly do architectural committees do? Here's the skinny on architectural committees.

"Typically, an architectural committee's responsibility comes from the association's bylaws or CC&Rs," says Sharon Glenn Pratt, an attorney who advises homeowners associations

and the principal at Pratt & Associates in Campbell, Calif. "Its members are responsible for maintaining the aesthetic and structural integrity of the association and enforcing the CC&Rs. They should be reviewing any applications for modifications, additions, or architectural changes in the community."

"The board has a fiduciary duty to do what's best for the whole association, not just one member who thinks his unit would be much more valuable if he made certain changes" explains Pratt. "What if those changes affect the rest of the association? You can't have people adding to their homes and possibly violating your CC&Rs or changing the actual structure without getting the association's approval."

Here at Twin Rivers our ARC has traditionally met with homeowners, discussed their proposal and amicably agreed to approving it. In the case of a disagreement to member may appeal to the entire Board whose decision is final. Working with the ARC is not difficult. It takes a little time and effort top usually get the desired results.



Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

Extra cell phone battery or charger

Battery-powered or hand crank radio that can receive NOAA Weather Radio tone alerts and extra batteries

Flashlight and extra batteries

First aid kit

Whistle to signal for help

Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place

Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

Non-sparking wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

Can opener (if kit contains canned food)

Local maps

FEMA's Ready Campaign

educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for and respond to potential emergencies, including those from natural hazards and man-made disasters. Ready asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan, and be informed about the different types of emergencies that could occur and appropriate responses. Everyone should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive several days if an emergency occurs. This list of emergency supply kit items is only a starting point. It is important that individuals review this list and consider the unique needs of their family, including pets, for items to include. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.
