Educational Campaigns



I STEER CLEAR

"I STEER CLEAR", a research-based social norms campaign to reduce the number of drivers who drive while under the influence. Many substances can impair driving including alcohol, marijuana, some over-the-counter drugs, prescription and illegal drugs. 44,565 Reached.



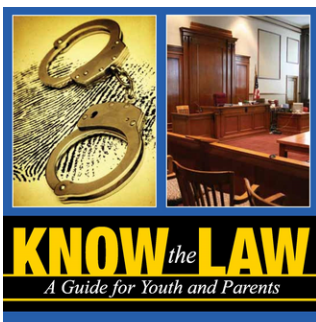
BE ABOVE BULLYING

Be ABOVE Bullying is a social norms campaign to increase awareness of bullying. Bullying can affect everyone- those who are bullied, those who bully, and those who witness bullying. Working with students to decrease bullying behaviors and acts of violence against one another can improve the lives of our youth. 445 elementary youth and 190 parents reached.



NO ONE'S HOUSE

No One's House is a Safe Place for Teen Drinking is a comprehensive social norming campaign that works to reduce the number of parents in a community who are providing teens with alcohol and/or allowing teens to drink in their homes. Some parents have the belief that letting teens drink under their roof is "safe drinking", but when it comes to teens there is no safe drinking. 44,067 Reached



KNOW THE LAW

Know the Law is an education booklet designed to increase knowledge of Florida laws and how violating such laws will impact students' futures. During the 2022 year, 412 "Know the Law" booklets were disseminated to youth and their parents. In addition, law enforcement School Resource Officers implemented Know the Law presentations with 110 high school students.

Community Awareness

Monroe County Coalition provides educational pamphlets including: What is alcohol misuse?, Let's Talk About Cirrhosis, Save a Life Carry Naloxone, The Truth about Vaping, No One's House is a Safe Place for Teen Drinking and Monroe County Coalition's Virtual Directory. MCC also provides information on other important topics including SAMHSA's Talk They Hear You parent campaign encouraging parents to talk to their teens, and MCC's Hidden in Plain Sight platform engaging parents to search and find items that are sold online as "Diversion Safes" that some teens are using as stash places for alcohol and/or drugs. Brochures are disseminated to doctor's offices, dentists, law firms, schools, government offices, libraries and during community-level events.

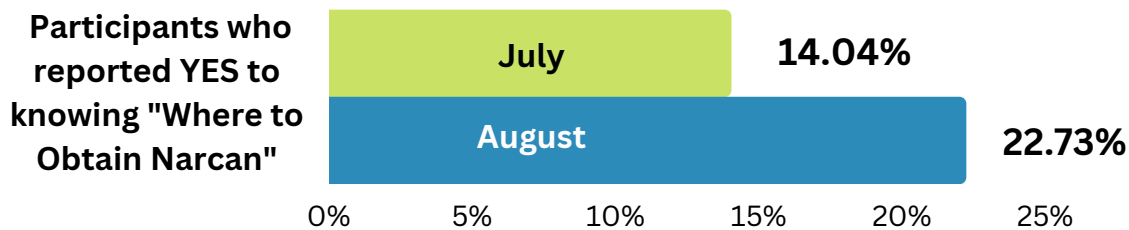

RESPONSIBLE VENDOR TRAINING

Responsible Vendor Training (RVT) provides local alcohol licensed vendors and their sellers and servers with training that meets requirements of Florida Statutes. In an industry with a relatively high degree of turnover, RVT can provide sellers and servers with information they need to protect themselves, their business, and the community.

WE I.D. SIGNAGE & I.D. CHECKING GUIDE

Monroe County Coalition provides legal age signage to local alcohol vendors supporting safe serving practices. Signs are a deterrent to underage youth who may attempt to purchase alcohol at the establishment. We I.D. Guides include the latest I.D.'s from all US states as a tool for sellers and servers. 584 WE I.D. Signs were provided to alcohol establishments and I.D. checking guides were disseminated to 22 businesses who completed MCC's Responsible Vendor Training.

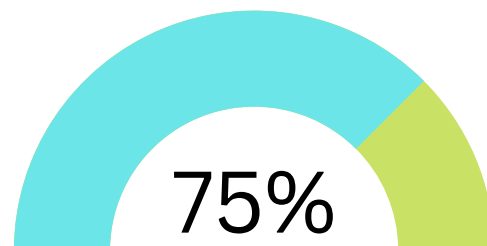

COMPLIANCE CHECKS

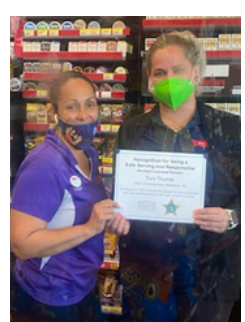
Compliance checks are operations performed by local law enforcement, with a person under 21 years of age, in an attempt to purchase alcohol to determine if establishments that sell alcohol are implementing safe serving practices. In 2022, 44 compliance checks were completed. 75% of businesses were compliant and did not sell to minors. MCC presents businesses with a certificate of recognition for safe serving practices otherwise known as "Merchant Recognition".

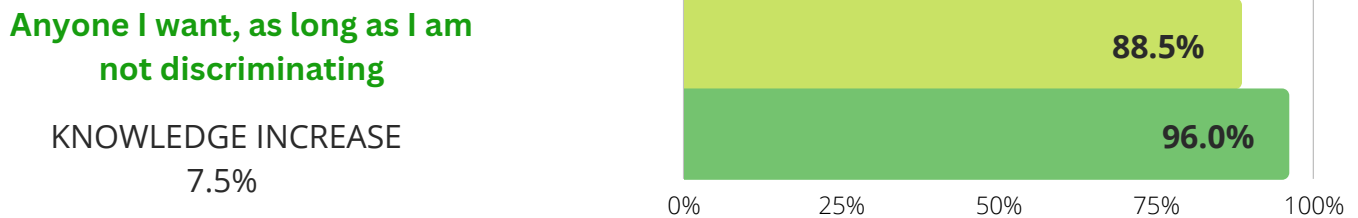

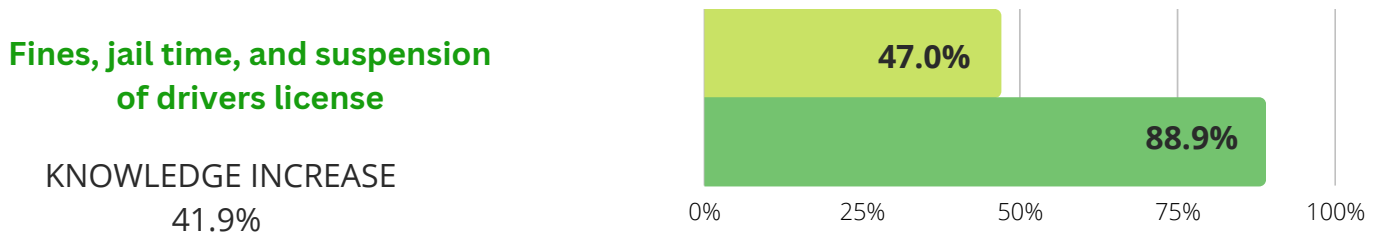

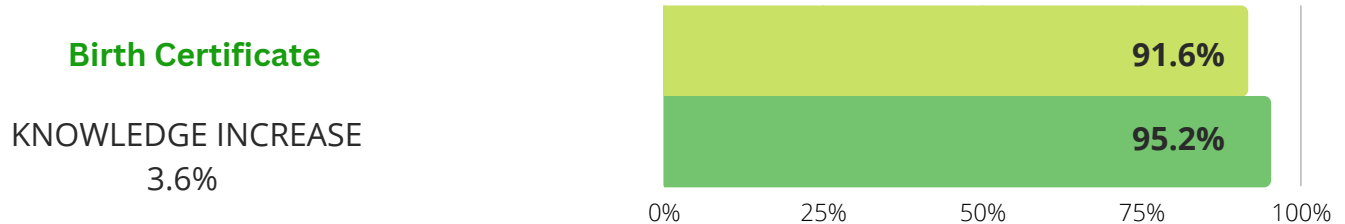
Who can you refuse to sell alcohol to?



What is the maximum penalty for selling alcohol to a minor?

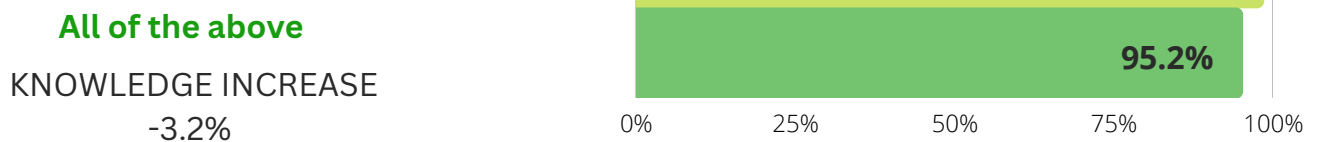

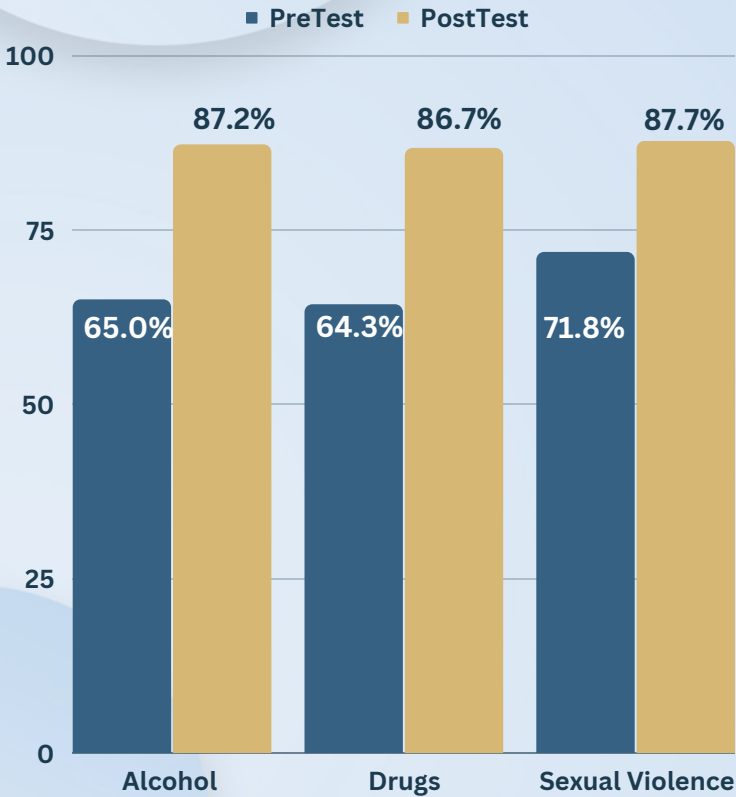

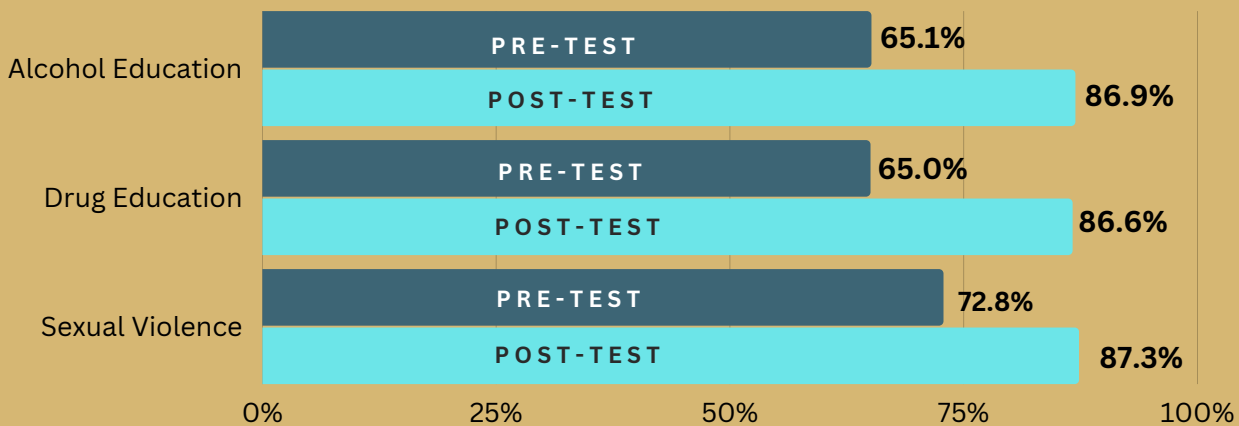

Each course is self-paced, and students may log in as many times as needed to complete the course. Each module within the various courses follows the same format: 1) Course Introduction: Students will view a video explaining the course; 2) Module Rate Myself: Students answer self-assessment questions about their behaviors; 3) Module Rate Myself Feedback: Students receive customized feedback based on their responses to the Rate Myself; 4) Pre-Test: Students take a quiz assessing topic knowledge prior to going through the educational modules; 5) Module Content: Students read articles, view videos, and participate in interactive learning tools; 6) Post-Test: Students answer the same questions that were in the pre-test to gauge what they learned; and 7) Course Satisfaction Survey: Students answer questions about their course experience.

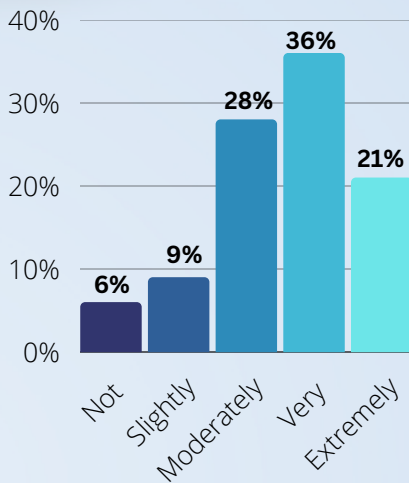
INCEPTION TO DATE 2016-2022 N= 1,238 COMPLETIONS



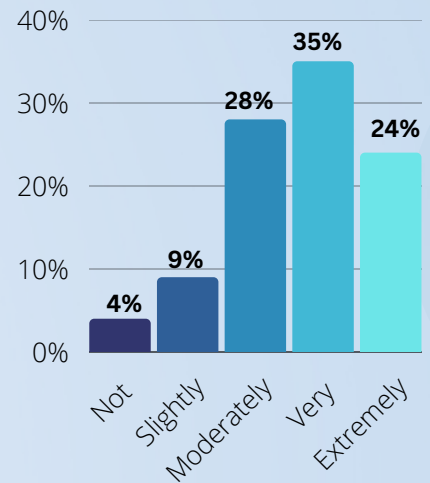

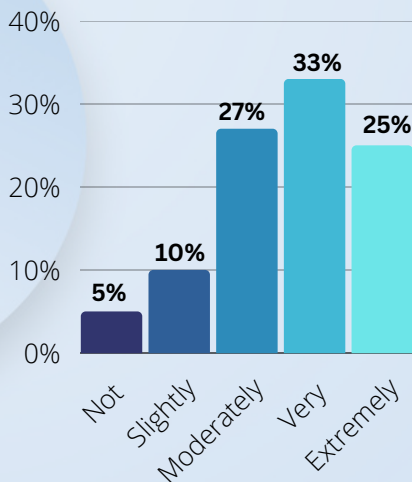

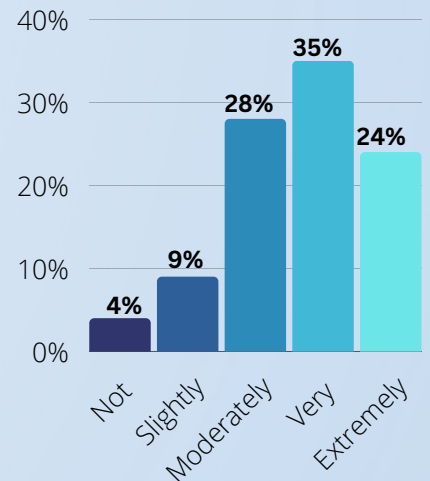

Project Success High School Prevention

Schools Using Coordinated Community Efforts to Strengthen Students

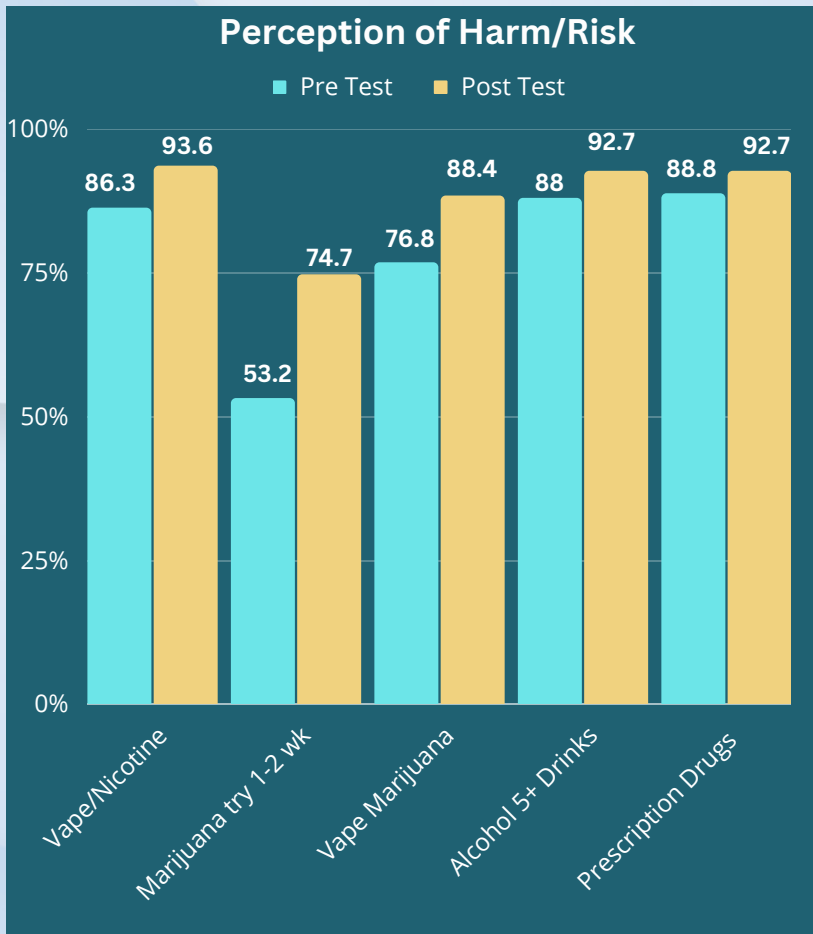
Project Success is a Substance Abuse Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA) program modeled after the successful Westchester Student Assistance Program (WSAP) and Residential Student Assistance Program (RSAP). Both programs are highly effective, school-based substance abuse prevention and early intervention programs. Project Success is a program that prevents and reduces adolescent substance use and abuse. It works by placing highly trained professionals (Project Success counselors) in the schools to provide a full range of substance abuse prevention and early intervention services.

How Project Success works?

Project Success is a research-based program that builds on the findings of other successful prevention programs by using interventions that are effective in reducing risk factors and enhancing protective factors.

Based on 5 proven prevention principles:

1. Increasing perception of risk of harm.
2. Changing adolescents' norms and expectations about substance use.
3. Building and enhancing social and resistance skills.
4. Changing community norms and values regarding substance use.
5. Fostering and enhancing resiliency & protective factors.



7.3% Increase Perception Harm/Risk

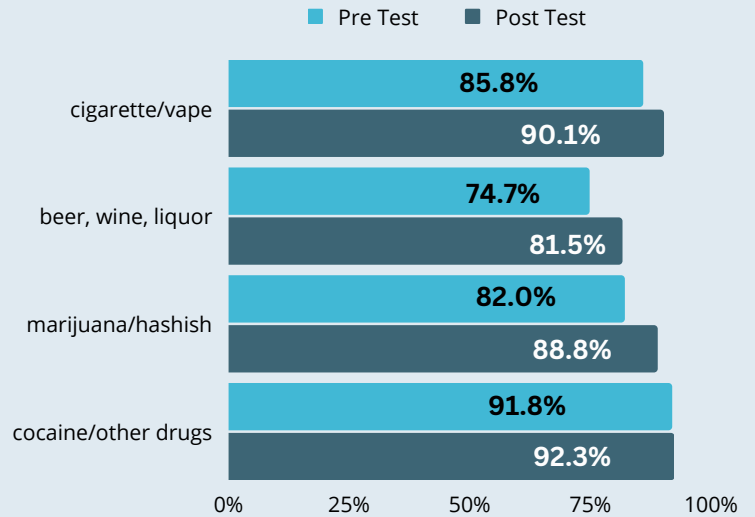

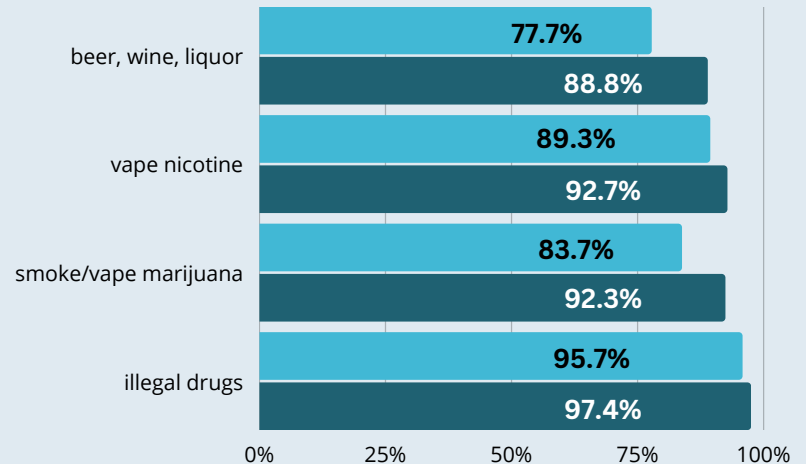

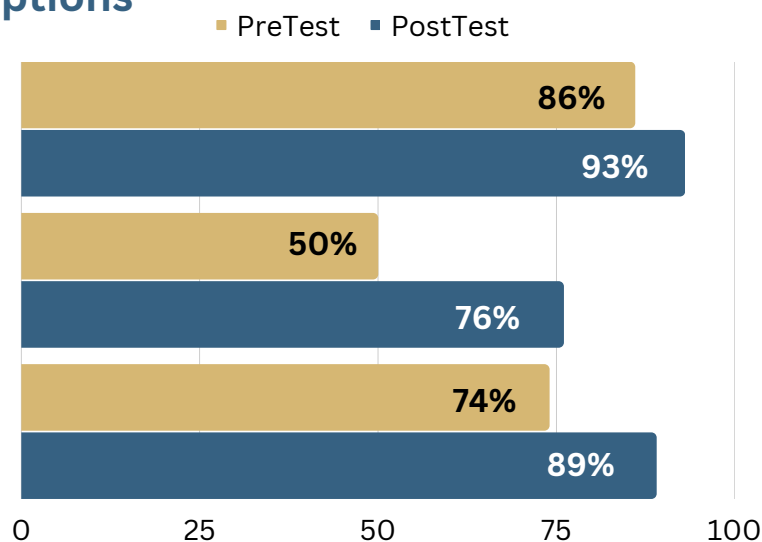

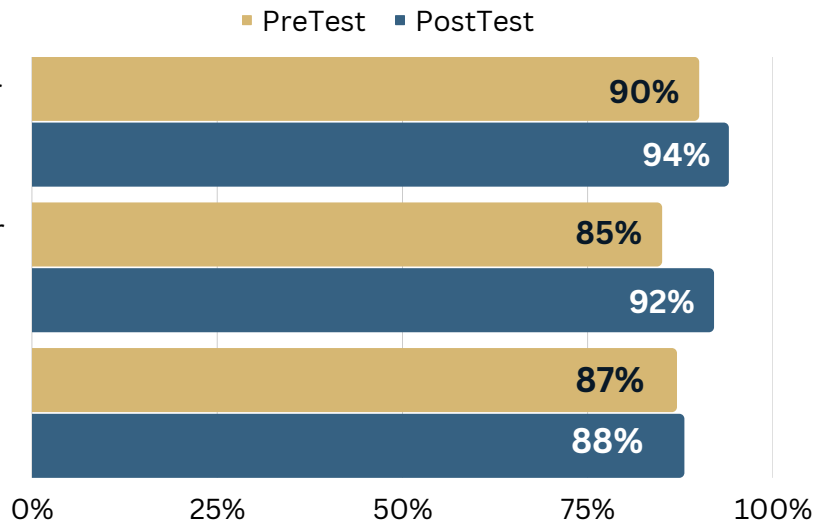

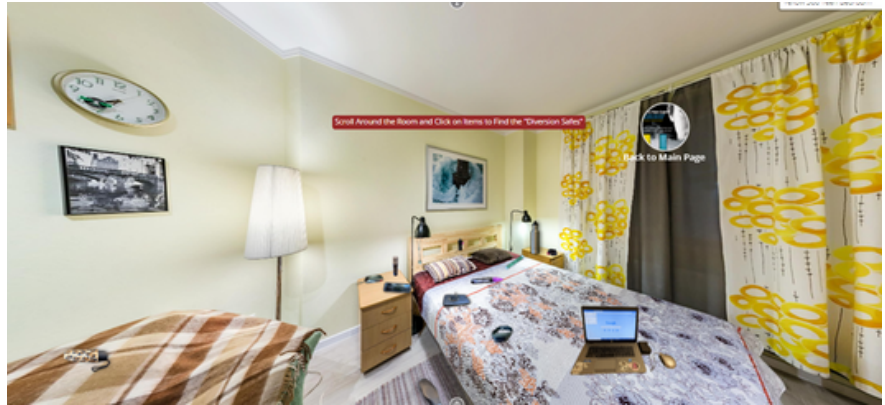

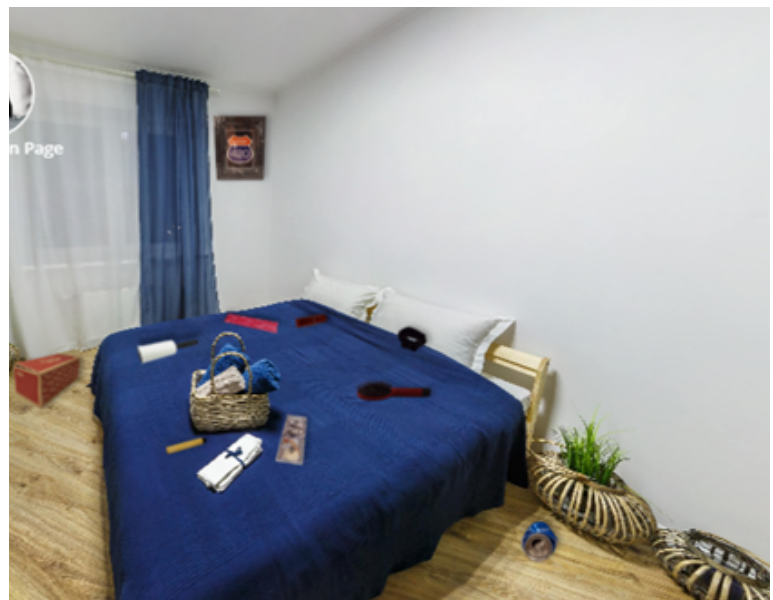


The online portal allows you to search two 360 virtual teen rooms for items that are considered diversion safes or stash decoy. These stash items may suggest the use of alcohol, substance or drug use.

This is a tool parents can use to identify these Diversion Safes. Most Diversion safes are essentially made to look like the real thing, but have hidden compartments to conceal things such as alcohol or drugs. If any of these items are in your teen's bedroom this may be a sign that they are hiding something such as smoking, vaping or any other substance/drug use.

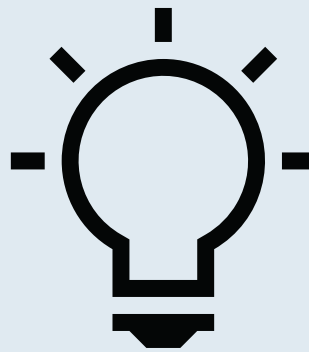
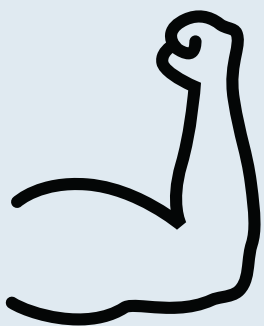
- The constant changing of our populations in different sections of our County creates challenges for the people who work for the different groups we help.

YOU CAN PREVENT AN OPIOID OVERDOSE

Naloxone is a life-saving medication that can rapidly reverse the effects of an opioid overdose and can easily be administered by anyone with some basic training.

- 1- Try to wake the person up
- 2- Call 911
- 3- Administer nasal naloxone
- 4- Check for breathing
- 5- Stay with the person
