#### **Donations**

One of the goals of SCHAF is to preserve all SC aviation history not just WWII. During 2023, SCHAF was fortunate to receive donations of amazing items important in telling both the history of GF2 as well as aviation history in SC. SCHAF received a donation of books and original newspapers from the WWII years. Dan Rossman's daughters, Lynn Gunzenhauser and Hope Bloom donated some more of their father's items. Along with an original B-25 pilot's manual, there are great pictures of GF2 when she was raised out of Lake Greenwood, newspaper clippings and other historical documentation.

SCHAF received a donation from Charles Taylor of some maps and pictures of the Columbia Army Air Base taken just after the war. Charles used to work at the air base. SCHAF received several models of airplanes including a P-51 remote control model belonging to Ken Berry that is now "flying" over the hangar! SCHAF also received WWII airplane recognition models donated by Keith Brightbill. Bill Vartorella donated an extensive collection of items including these challenge coins that belonged to his late brother, Doug. An F56 camera that was used on several WWII bombers including the B-25 was donated by Mike West. Last but certainly not least, Bruce Cotner, loaned original B-25 parts recovered from a B-25 that crashed in Lake Murray.

## **Restoration Progress**

During the year, it seems like the restoration work progresses slowly. However, after looking back to where we were in January to where we are now, the accomplishments for 2023 are outstanding.

The tight crawl space over the bomb bay area has seen a lot of progress. The handrails were completed, and instruments were installed; only fine details remain to be completed.









John spent almost 100 hours of time on both the research and fabrication of the Norden bomb sight. This is now installed in the bombardier's area. The small details in the bombardier's area are nearing completion. The .30 cal gun with the fabricated ammo can and spent shell casing bag built by Ron are installed. The seatbelt for the riding seat was installed. If you look closely, there are even spent shells on the floor.





The floor in the Navigator's area, as well as the outside skin underneath the plane was repaired. The deicer and hydraulic instruments along the back wall were installed. Still a few more details such as hoses and pipes to complete this project.



One huge accomplishment was the installation of the bomb racks and replica 100-pound bombs. The look and feel in the bomb bay section completely changed after these were placed. Ron spent many hours making these look just right

#### Goals for 2024

SCHAF has some big goals for 2024. The foundation is working hard on establishing a STEM program to get youth interested in aviation, engineering, science, and history. There are so many opportunities in the aviation field besides being a pilot.

The bucket list of items for the restoration team sometimes seems to be a never-ending list. At the top of the list is completing the bomb bay doors. The workers are inching closer and closer to the riveting stage. There are small detail items in all areas of the plane that need to be completed. The various projects started in 2023, will be completed in 2024.

Another exciting goal this year is the acquisition of an actual aircraft cockpit in which SCHAF will install a realistic flight simulator suitable for all ages to experience the thrill of flight.

In 2023, work was started on getting the second tug up and running. Lanny replaced several parts as well as corrected circuits which were previously wired incorrectly. One big item needed is 6 new tires for the tug. Sometimes we move from one project to another while we wait on parts.

One more area started in 2023 was installing the cables running thru the bomb bay area. Lanny and Ron have been working hard repairing the various pulleys that operated the ailerons, flaps, and rudders. We are hoping to one day have the controls in the cockpit move the ailerons, etc.

#### Santa flew in for a visit.

We would certainly be remise if we forgot to mention Santa! For the December open house, Santa flew in to visit the children. He is always a big hit! If you did not make it to the hangar this year, it needs to be on your bucket list for next year.
