Cape Cod Celebrates Marconi Anniversary

In July, the Cape Cod National Seashore began a celebration of the 100th anniversary of the first two-way trans-Atlantic wireless message: greetings between President Theodore Roosevelt and King Edward VII of Britain. The historic event took place nearly a century ago on a cold January night in Wellfleet MA, on Cape Cod. The operator was Italian inventor Guglielmo Marconi, who was transmitting from a remote site perched on a seaside cliff on the outer Cape. With that transmission, Marconi pioneered wireless technology to become the father of radio – and the grandfather of today's cell phone society.

The Cape Cod National Seashore plans to commemorate the original 1903 transmission in January 2003 by sending a wireless message from South Wellfleet to the international space station.

Those who get a chance to visit Marconi Beach on Cape Cod, will see that very little remains of the original site. The remains of two concrete foundations that anchored the towers are still visible. And visitors can also see a mock-up of Marconi's invention that is protected by a weathered wood canopy.

The four 210-foot-high wooden towers tethered to an inverted pyramid of heavy copper wire are long gone. They were dismantled when the station, which was once North America's premier ship-to-shore transmitter, closed for good in 1920.

More Co-Sponsors Sign Aboard CC&R Bill HR 4720

Additional cosponsors have signed aboard HR 4720, the bill in Congress aimed at providing relief to amateurs faced with private deed covenants conditions and restrictions--CC&Rs--in erecting antennas.

The list of 18 members of Congress who have agreed to cosponsor the measure includes two amateurs. They are Oregon Republican Greg Walden, WB7OCE--one of the two original cosponsors of HR 4720 with Texas Republican Pete Sessions—and Arkansas Democrat Mike Ross, WD5DVR. Walden and Ross are believed to be the only Amateur Radio licensees in the US House of Representatives.

New Amateur Radio Antennas to be Installed on ISS

The last two Amateur Radio antennas are scheduled to be installed this month on the International Space Station's Zvezda Service Module—the crew's living quarters.

ARISS initial ham station gear--a single-band Ericsson 5-W hand-held transceiver for 2 meters--is installed in the Zarya Functional Cargo Block (FGB) using an antenna initially installed to aid docking operations and EVAs. The new VHF-UHF antennas and a flexible-tape HF antenna also installed January 25

are designed for and dedicated to ARISS operations. Plans down the road call for installing HF gear at the ARISS station as well as higher power VHF and UHF equipment.

ARISS is an international project sponsored jointly by ARRL, NASA and AMSAT.

Solar Update

Solar watcher Tad "You Are My Sunshine" Cook, K7VVV, Seattle, Washington, reports:

"Sunspots keep growing and growing, and one wonders if the peak of the solar cycle has really passed. With sunspot numbers topping 300 this week (the week ending Saturday August 3), it almost seems like a third peak in a cycle with a double peak so far. Sunspot numbers peaked on Saturday at 323--the highest number since March 2001.

"The mean daily sunspot numbers for the week were 122 points higher than the previous week. Average daily solar flux was up by nearly 39 points.

"Average daily sunspot numbers for all of July were 183.5. This is much higher than June, which was 146, but not as high as May's average, at 204.1. Average daily solar flux for July was 174.4, higher than then 148.7 for June and around the same as May's 178.4.

"Current helioseismic readings suggest several active regions on the sun's far side, so more excitement may be in store."

Sunspot numbers for July 25 through

31 were 299, 319, 323, 300, 304, 297 and 265, with a mean of 301. The 10.7-cm flux was 217.7, 241.5, 230.8, 238.8, 234, 227.2 and 208.5, with a mean of 228.4. Estimated planetary A indices were 13, 17, 19, 12, 11, 8 and 9, with a mean of 12.7.


