I look forward to seeing each of you.



Terry was born July 14, 1961, in Malone, N.Y., son of Leightan Geneway, of Danbury, and the late Cecilia (Humiston) Geneway. As a young man, he lived on a farm in Burke, N.Y., and attended Chateaugay Central School until 1971 when his family moved to Danbury. He attended Stadley Rough School, Broadview School and graduated

from Danbury High School, Class of 1979. He later attended Henry Abbott Technical School for carpentry. Terry was a self-employed carpenter and general contractor. He owned and operated T. G. Carpentry and Builders.

Ham Radio Support for Katrina Disaster

I know what I just emailed out; I told you to stand by but the situation is changing. The need is much more immediate. I just got a "heads up" that 500 hams from all over the country will be requested within 24 hours for immediate deployment to affected areas, possibly in Alabama and Mississippi. NO CONNECTICUT ARES MEMBER IS TO DEPLOY YET!

Your task, right now, is to collect names of those who can respond, their training level, their equipment complement.

Amateur Radio emergency communication volunteers needed! (Sep 2, 2005)
-- The ARRL now is seeking experienced Amateur Radio emergency volunteers to help supplement communication for

American Red Cross feeding and sheltering operations in Mississippi, Alabama and the Florida Panhandle--as many as 200 locations in all. Special consideration will be given to operators who have successfully completed the ARRL Amateur Radio **Emergency Communications course** training (Level I minimum) to serve as team leaders. These volunteer operators will help to provide communication and equipment for relief efforts in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. If you're interested and qualified, please send an e-mail message to Katrina@arrl.org, providing name, call sign, contact information and any equipment you're willing and able to take along on a field deployment for an indefinite period. Volunteers may face hardship conditions without the usual amenities and will need to provide their own transportation to the marshaling area. This is what we train for.--Rod. N1FNE SEC CT

New "Ham Aid" Program Funded

Newington, CT, Sep 2, 2005...The Corporation for National and Community Service (<CNCS)" target=externalhttp://www.nationalservice.or g/>CNCS) will provide a \$100,000 grant supplement to ARRL to support Amateur Radio's emergency communication operators in states affected by Hurricane Katrina. The grant will help to fund "Ham Aid," a new League program to support Amateur Radio volunteers deployed in the field in disaster-stricken areas. ARRL Chief Development Officer Mary Hobart, K1MMH, expressed gratitude to CNCS for its generous response. Ham Aid, she said, offers a unique opportunity to support individual radio amateurs helping to bridge the communication gap Hurricane Katrina has caused.

"For the first time in ARRL history, we will be

able to reimburse some of the expenses that hams incur in response to a disaster," she said. "We only wish that we could justify an expense reimbursement program like this every time Amateur Radio Emergency Service volunteers are called upon to help in a disaster or emergency, sometimes placing themselves in harm's way."

In addition to providing emergency communication within and outside the affected areas, Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) members and individual radio amateurs are supplementing the communication needs of emergency management and relief agencies, including the American Red Cross and The Salvation Army. Hobart said it's only due to the scope of the unprecedented and tragic Katrina disaster that CNCS agreed to help support dedicated Amateur Radio volunteers.

The CNCS Ham Aid grant is effective for operations established and documented as of September 1, 2005, and the aid is earmarked for Hurricane Katrina deployments only at this point. Guidelines are being established that will permit volunteers who have been involved in bona fide field support operations on or after September 1 to provide communication support to apply for a reimbursement voucher on a per diem basis.

Trained Amateur Radio operators will be on site for the duration of this disaster response, which could run into several weeks or months. "Many will leave their jobs and families and travel on their own expense, using their own equipment," Hobart points out.

The CNCS grant is an extension of ARRL's three year Homeland Security training grant, which has provided certification in emergency communication protocols to nearly 5500 Amateur Radio volunteer over the past three years.

"CNCS grants helped make it possible for the ARRL to train America's hams and make

them the best all-volunteer emergency radio service ever seen," Hobart said. "Now they are making it possible for the hams to use that training."

THE WIZARD'S OFFER... AN OFFER AIMED AT KIDS



Here is my Wand. I hold it out to you. It is enjoyable, yet it conveys power and responsibility. Will you accept its challenge? Who is wise enough to take it up? (Do not do so lightly...)

I will reveal all its secrets to you happily. I seek only to pass my arcane knowledge on, because it is Valuable, and was hard-won. It is useful, practical knowledge that on fairly regular occasion is needed most urgently to do some good things for people in very grave danger. At other times it is interesting and educational just for its own pursuit.

It holds century-old, worldspanning personal power, without gatekeepers or toll-takers. It is free, yet it is also costly in things more important than mere money. Time. Effort. Dedication. Intelligence.

It is easy, yet it will challenge your mind for the rest of your life, and never be finished.

I am 61 years old now, and have far more left to do than I have done so far; and I started over 40 years ago. Along the way, I have held every rating in this Craft from the lowest novice to the highest level of adeptness, and I earned each and every step.

My Brothers and Sisters in this Craft are poorly understood by most people. (We have not done a very good job of explaining ourselves.)

This Craft draws us into some odd ways, not entirely like other mortals. We sometimes do our work late at night, or in the very earliest of morning hours, or in the broad, main daylight. The mysterious and vast energies of The Sun itself power our exploits, and we seek to know its every mood, minor blemish, and major tantrum, because The Sun expands greatly or destroys utterly our power to span thousands of miles instantly with our merest of spoken thoughts.

In basements and in workshops in solitary labor we sometimes make things, special devices, not available anywhere else, with our own hands to our own personal designs, sometimes out of seeming junk, devices that are unique in all the world---and yet things that will become connected to all the world.

I can toss a few feet of common wire over a tree, and by doing, know the exact atomic time in Boulder, Colorado; or I can know at that precise instant what's being heard from Japan; or I can eavesdrop on 10,000 conversations---and join in any of them in less than a heartbeat.

You cannot do these things yet, or many, many others until you study this Craft, and are admitted to the membership of its examined and certified practitioners. For example, there is a precise formula for the length of that wire and the manner of its orientation that you are not schooled in yet, and so do not know yet, and so could not do. I can tell you how. And then you'll be amazed of how really easy it seems, once I give you that simple but arcane secret.

As almost a side-effect of taking up my offer, you'll learn a universe of things you have little idea of now. You'll gain an understanding of many things that is very rare in

today's world. You'll eventually know how almost everything in everyday life works. Not all of it right away, but in a steady gaining over the years, as you grow in this very special Craft.

The Craft's name?

Amateur Radio.

You will learn some physics, some electronics, some chemistry, some basic machine shop and technical construction skills, how to design and execute your ideas for new devices that never existed before. You'll gain understanding few people achieve.

You'll have help. Special guides we call "Elmer". Books. Many books. And you'll have literally millions of fellow students worldwide who you can talk with, learn from, and teach in turn the unique things you've discovered. It's a very, very special global community. And it's open to you---if you'll accept the challenge.

That's Amateur Radio in the 21st century.

The award recognizes excellence in assisting CCE students both online and in the classroom.

Amateur Radio Awareness Day

What makes Amateur Radio unique is its ability to communicate with one another anywhere in the world--and even in orbit-without having to rely on any outside infrastructure whatsoever. Hams can even do this without being plugged into the wall socket. Experienced radio amateurs take this capability for granted, but the general public is far less aware of it. So, an Emergency Power Operating Event (EPOE) on Amateur Radio Awareness Day, Saturday, September 17, will highlight Amateur Radio's ability to communicate worldwide without commercial mains, the Internet or a cellular telephone system.

"What better way to mark Amateur Radio Awareness Day than by calling attention to this unique capability?" says ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ. "It is particularly appropriate since September is the Department of Homeland Security's National Preparedness Month."

Amateur Radio Awareness Day activities typically focus on increasing public awareness. Past events have included public demonstrations, talks to community groups and getting local media coverage. According to DHS, National Preparedness Month is aimed at encouraging Americans to prepare for emergencies and to raise public awareness about the importance of being prepared.

This Amateur Radio Awareness Day, September 17, the ARRL will sponsor a 15-hour Emergency Power Operating Event for stations operating off the grid. "It is not a contest," Sumner stresses. "It is simply a demonstration of what we amateurs can do without having to rely on the commercial mains, and what we will do whenever the need arises."

An announcement in September QST (page 49) spells out the details. The event kicks off at 1300 UTC on Saturday, September 17, and wraps up at 0400 UTC on September 18. The ARRL is inviting home stations to operate from generator or battery power. Mobiles and portable stations also are welcome to participate, although unlike Field Day, the emphasis is not on setting up a temporary station, but rather on operating your regular station on emergency power.

There is no set exchange; contacts may be casual, but operators are encouraged to share information on their emergency power sources in addition to the traditional signal report, name and location.

ARRL Maxim Memorial Station W1AW will be on the air for the event, running on emergency power from its 60-kW emergency backup diesel generator. W1AW Station Manager Joe Carcia, NJ1Q, says the whole point is to showcase that Amateur Radio is prepared during National Preparedness Month--"and any time, for that matter," he adds. A special QSL will be available to stations contacting W1AW while running from an emergency power source. Include a self-addressed, stamped envelope with all QSL card requests, and indicate on your card the emergency power source used. (Address cards to W1AW, 225 Main St, Newington, CT 06111.)

"I hope we can work stations operating on emergency power in all 50 states," says Sumner. "It should be a lot of fun, and we may even learn something!"

The League is encouraging participating

radio amateurs or groups to invite local Citizen Corps leaders to see Amateur Radio installations in emergency power mode.

"The two events offer great opportunities for Amateur Radio to showcase its valued service to the nation," said outgoing ARRL Field and Educational Services Manager Rosalie White, K1STO. She urged ARRL-affiliated clubs and Field Organization volunteers to take advantage of the occasion to set up public demonstrations of Amateur Radio and to present or even demonstrate-under the banner of National Preparedness Month--the free services Amateur Radio provides to the community.

ARRL Club/Mentoring Program Manager Norm Fusaro, W3IZ, believes a public Emergency Power Operating Event offers a great opportunity to recruit prospective hams for licensing classes clubs that may be forming this fall.

ARRL Goes to Washington video now available on DVD

This video offers an opportunity to call attention to ARRL's critical advocacy efforts in an entertaining and informative way.

Featuring ARRL President Jim Haynie, W5JBP, and narrated by former CBS News anchor Walter Cronkite, KB2GSD, the presentation's debut at Dayton Hamvention was resoundingly positive. The video makes a great centerpiece for an Amateur Radio club program or meeting, and it's ideal for showing at hamfests, forums and even civic group meetings. It is not intended, nor

available, for telecasting or broadcasting, however. The ARRL Goes to Washington remains available for downloading, free of charge, from the ARRL Web site <." target=externalhttp://www.arrl.org/pio/VTS-Video.mpg>. The file is 95 MB, so a high-speed connection is necessary.
