Message From the President

I hope all of you have finished your antenna maintenance for the winter and are beginning to enjoy the winter DX season. Happy Thanksgiving to all.

As we are now near the solar minimum DX should be quite good on the 160, 80, 40 and 30 meter bands. DX is easiest in these bands if you use CW and the digital modes. I was able to work 3B7C (9175 mi) with very loud signals on 80 m.

HF DX is great fun and this month's program will be given by Joel, W1ZR aka QST's Doctor who will give a program on selecting an HF rig. I am sure the newer hams will find the program to be essential. The price range of HF rigs is great and there are differences that may not be apparent from the brochure. When selecting your rig you must consider your operating style and where the rig will be used (mobile, portable or at the home station) I have noticed that digital mode operation varies quite a bit between manufactures. In this regard my FT-817 is great.

For those interested in DX, I recommend G3SXW's two books (Contesting in Africa and Up Two) Roger is an excellent writer and captures the spirit of ham radio. I highly recommend Contesting in Africa to those involved in Emergency operations. Roger has a great deal of experience in operating under primitive conditions and he shares many details. The 6m repeater failed to go up the mountain. The team was willing and able but politics and a BIG pile of dirt made progress impossible. Details will be discussed at the meeting.

Joe, AB1DO has made some more prototypes of the CARA logo. We should be able to recommend at least one design for application to apparel.

I look forward to seeing each of you at the meeting.

Amateur Radio Band Choices

Just as many of us have a favorite fast food that we come back to time after time Radio Amateurs tend to have a favorite band that they use more frequently than other bands. The question of what band to use may be secondary to that favorite band. But the first question should be what band(s) am I licensed to use? From the beginning of the licensing process you will find out what bands your license covers.

Next it is a matter of having the right equipment for the bands you want to use. As an entry level license generally covers VHF(2m) and UHF(70cm) and many beginning hams will use one of both of these bands. Also hand-held single-band or dual-band radios for these bands are affordable and don't require a sophisticated antenna or power source. Most metropolitan areas also have amateur repeaters to extend the coverage when using VHF or UHF radios.

Popular Bands

So what are the bands that most Radio Amateurs use? The table below shows bands that are relatively common and how and when they are in use. Again your license will determine which bands and what portions you are eligible to use.

* It should be noted that band conditions vary for many reasons and thus all of these bands can at times take on the characteristics of others. This table should be considered a general guideline.

HF Bands

For amateurs who have an interest in long distance communication the HF (high frequency) bands will be of great interest. These bands offer propagation to all parts of the world at some time during the day, night or season. Do you want to talk to Japan from the east coast or Europe from the west? There will often be a time and a band where this communication is possible.

During a sunspot high cycle conditions are best for the higher HF frequencies and during a low cycle the low frequencies are often in demand with all kinds of variation in between. Magazines such as QST and CQ Amateur Radio publish charts monthly that predict the best propagation to different areas of the world. These are just best guesses and will help you to choose your times and bands but there is no substitute for getting on the air.
