

CARA participated in the 2018 winter field day event on January 27th and 28th at the home of Vice-president- N1NRP and CARA member Marlon Henriquez – KC1EHW.

Two stations were set up - and W1QI, our club callsign was used.

A home station is defined as:

Home: Operation from a place where an amateur station is already or would normally be established, whether it's your home or another person's, including any enclosed structure attached to the home (garage, deck, sunroom). Use of any pre-existing feed line or premounted antenna system, such as a backyard tower/beam, roof antenna, or previously installed dipole/wire, or previously installed rig renders your station a "Home" operation. A home station may still claim "alternate power" bonus if using non-commercial power.

Operation from another ham's home other than

your own, from a seasonal rental (..like your Florida/Arizona snowbird condo), or from a second home you own would still be considered a "Home" operation unless no equipment, antennas, or accessories were present before the stated WFD set-up time (in which case you'd be an "Indoor" entrant and eligible for the "remote/not at home" and possibly the "alternate power" bonuses).

Over the past few years, I've participated with members from GBARC, the Greater Bridgeport Amateur Radio Club, at the White Hills Recreation Center in Shelton. After last year's event, I thought about getting CARA involved in the 2018 contest.

Some of you may know that I have ALS, which is making it progressively harder for me to do all the things that I love. One of them is setting up portable ham radio stations outside with tents and using a generator to power the equipment, etc.

My idea of fun is being outside, watching a campfire, and trying to stay warm while operating the radio. Compared to the ARRL Field Day rules, the Winter Field Day event scoring system awards many bonus points for operating outdoors, using generator power, and making a satellite contact too.

CARA decided to enter in the Home Station category, 2H, with commercial AC power to run all the equipment.

My wife, Juliana, Marlon, Marlon's wife Candee, and their daughter, Isabel "kept the home fires burning" with a 24-hour coffee pot, and plenty of snacks to keep us well-nourished.

They also prepared an excellent breakfast, lunch, and dinner for those who attended. We had "all the comforts of home", including some options for resting if we got tired.

The best part is that the station was all set up without needing to move the equipment into another place, plus set up temporary antennas too.

Of course, there were several challenges to overcome to prepare for this winter event.



About a week before WFD, a storm with high winds took down both my existing G5RV and 15M/10M Skeleton Sleeve folded dipole antennas. They were beyond repair, and my dual-band VHF vertical stopped working with an SWR of over 4:1. On top of all that, the 14 element 2M yagi blew over right before our planned CARA Winter Field Day event.



I called John- W1JGM, who loaned me a brand new G5RV antenna that was donated to the club as a door prize from former member and SK George Pollizi – K2ZZ from Radio Oasis. Then, Harlan, Marlon, and I got together Saturday, January 20 to shoot new ropes over the trees and raise the new G5RV.

Marlon also installed a new mast for the 2M beam. Repairing the vertical would have to wait for another warmer day. Thanks guys for all your help with this; what a team.

Thanks also go to Harlan, who stopped in after work to get the N1MM+ Contest Logger program working, networking the two laptops, and setting up my Yaesu FT-450D for CW.


Gary was on 40M SSB.



Special Presentation by Michael Miciukiewicz – K1MJM at February 9 CARA meeting:

Puerto Rico recently experienced its worst storm season in meteorological history. Several small storms set the stage for hurricanes Irma and Maria, which turned into the grand finale.

Hurricane Irma did major damage to Puerto Rico's infrastructure with heavy winds and torrential rain. Several days later, Hurricane Maria hit with sustained winds of 155 mph, gusts to 195 mph, and even heavier rain than Irma. Maria wiped out any power and communications that Irma left behind.

The combined forces of these two storms destroyed thousands of buildings and caused mud slides and flooding throughout the island.



Immediately following, the American Red Cross prepared to deploy several hundred disaster relief volunteers.



Knowing that all communications systems were gone, they asked the ARRL to provide 50 volunteer amateur radio operators. Twenty-two "Hams" were sent there in the first wave. In just a couple of days, the Hams had set up a well distributed HF communication network across the entire island and were providing VHF communications for Red Cross mobile units.



I was fortunate enough to deploy to Puerto Rico with that first wave of volunteers from all parts of the United States. We were on the island for three weeks. It was truly an experience of a lifetime that I'd like to share with you. During my talk, I'll discuss: Travel, living conditions, logistics, weather, medical concerns, organizational structure, radio gear, pre-existing resources, radio procedures, and much more. I welcome your questions throughout the presentation, because I can't cover everything -but do want to discuss what's of interest to you.

Early on Wednesday, September 20, Hurricane Maria — a powerful Category 4 hurricane with 150 mph winds made <u>direct landfall</u> on Puerto Rico, bisecting the entire island and drenching it with <u>feet</u> of rain. What's happened since has been truly <u>catastrophic</u> for Puerto Rico.



There's still little power on the island. In many places, there's still no water to drink or bathe in or to flush toilets. There's limited food and cell service, and dozens of remote villages have been completely cut off from everything for weeks.



"Make no mistake — this is a humanitarian disaster involving 3.4 million US citizens," Puerto Rico Gov. Ricardo Rosselló said the Monday after Maria hit.



The initial recovery response from the US federal government has been lackluster, and President Trump's comments have not inspired confidence. After dwelling early in the week on the facts that:

1) Puerto Rico is an island, and
2) Puerto Rico is in massive debt, the president and his senior officials then went on the defensive, describing the administration's response so far as a "good news story."

The Federal Emergency Management Agency <u>still has not authorized</u> full reconstruction aid to Puerto Rico.



"Help us. Without robust and consistent help we will die," Carmen Yulín Cruz, the mayor of San Juan, said in a <u>statement</u> on October 12. "Mr. President, fulfill your moral imperative towards the people of Puerto Rico."



This is still a terrible disaster that deserves more coverage and a better-coordinated response — and both appear to have been impeded by widespread confusion about Puerto Rico's relationship to the United States and the severity of its current situation.

ARRL January VHF Contest

The ARRL January 2018 VHF Contest was held on the weekend of January 20-21. This is a GREAT opportunity for all hams to get on the air to have fun, try operating on VHF/UHF **without** using repeaters, and learn more about VHF/UHF operating. For full details, please refer to: http://www.arrl.org/january-vhf

- I. Date/Time: 11AM PST Saturday 20 January until 8PM PST Sunday, 21 January 2018
- II. Frequencies: ALL amateur radio frequencies 50 Mhz (6 meters) and up, including 144-148 Mhz (2 meters), 222-225 Mhz (135 cm), 420-450 Mhz (70 cm), 900 MHz (33cm), 1200-1300 Mhz (23 cm), AND all amateur frequencies higher than that. Modes: SSB, FM, CW, AM, Data including FT8. Note: No use of repeaters permitted!
- III. Commonly used frequencies:
- a. 6m: 50.125 Mhz USB; 52.525 Mhz FM Simplex; 50.090-50.100 CW; 50.313 FT-8 b. 2m: 144.200+/- Mhz USB; 146.52, 146.55, 146.58, 146.61 Mhz FM Simplex; 144.200+/- Mhz CW
- c. 135cm: 222.1 Mhz USB/CW; 223.5 Mhz FM Simplex
- d. 70cm: 432.1 Mhz USB/CW; 446.0 Mhz FM Simplex
- e. 33cm: 902.1 Mhz SSB/CW; 902.1, 903.1, 927.5, 927.6 Mhz FM Simplex
- f. 23cm: 1296.1 Mhz SSB/CW; 1269 Mhz FM Simplex
- IV. Typical antenna polarization:
- a. USB/CW/FT8 = horizontal
- b . FM = vertical
- c. NOTE!! Use whatever antennas you have available, even if not of the preferred

polarization! (Old adage: a poor antenna is better than no antenna!)

V. A Valid QSO requires exchange of full callsigns, grid locator, & acknowledgement. (Note: Almost everyone in Connecticut is in Grid "FN31")

VI. Scoring:

a. QSOs: 1 point per QSO on 6/2 meter bands; 2 points per QSO on 135/70 cm bands; 4 points per QSO on higher bands b. Multiplier: Total of all Grids worked on each band

VII. Log Submission:

a. Use: http://b4h.net/cabforms/ arrlyhfian cab3.php

b. Please submit also to the 3830 reflector for contest score rumors: The form for reporting your score to the 3830 reflector will be available as soon as the contest starts at >>>><u>www.3830scores.com</u><<<<;

ARRL Board of Directors Commentary de K1IR – Jim Idelson, YCCC member

from the YCCC Reflector

I am among those ARRL members who feel that the way our ARRL operates must change to meet current and future challenges. Basically, the form of governance that was appropriate for the League a hundred years ago is no longer working. The world has changed. In 1915, with just 600 members nationwide and no tools to communicate and manage an organization in a directly democratic way, the founders chose a purely representative democratic model, empowering a Board of Directors to make all decisions for the organization. It was a compromise, and appropriate at the time. Today, though, with 150,000 members, a strong desire on the part of the membership to be directly involved in defining the future for ARRL, and a readily-available set of modern, powerful tools for instant and effective communication, it is possible - and expected - that ARRL should be a much more member-involved and member-driven association. But, thinking that way and actually making it happen are not the same. A new approach must be defined, codified and implemented. But, remember, putting more power in the hands of the Membership means erosion of the powers of the Board. Our ARRL Boards have clearly enjoyed their exclusive hold on authority and are not likely to easily relinquish such powers. So, we need to influence our existing Directors to adopt this dramatic new perspective and/or seek out new Directors who believe in modernization through reform of governance. Unfortunately, until these reforms are implemented, the only way changes can be codified is by a two-thirds (or three-fourths) majority of our Division-Elected Board members. So, for this purpose, your Board member is my Board member. I need to help elect ten or more who will vote to take us into the 21st century. Please see my video Open Letter to Rick Roderick

If you worked digital modes in the <u>January ARRL VHF Contest</u>, know this about your log: 'For Cabrillo file mode definitions, Digital modes can be represented as "RY" (all things digital) or "PH" as digital modes are transmitted via Phone audio.' See the <u>January VHF Contest web page</u> for more information.

The log submission deadline for the 2018 January VHF Contest is 0359 UTC February 1, 2018.

Reminder: The log submission deadline for most ARRL Contests is now FIVE DAYS after the contest end.

Mark, K6UFO, NAQP RTTY Contest Manager, notes that February's NAQP RTTY is coming up February 24-25, 2018. The July event will be held July 21-22, which is a correction to previously published dates for this contest. This correction will also appear in NCJ: The National Contest Journal.

The 44th annual Eastern

VHF/UHF/Microwave Conference will be held Friday through Sunday, April 20-22, 2018, in Manchester, Connecticut. Of particular interest to UHF/VHF contesters may be two of the scheduled talks: "WSJT-X MSK144 and VHF Contesting" by K8ZR, and the "222 MHz and Up Distance Contest Forum" moderated by W9JJ. There are plenty of other talks, and the location of the event makes it easy to combine with a visit to ARRL Headquarters beforehand.

During the January ARRL VHF Contest last weekend, FT8 was the elephant on the bands. Some lauded the mode's ability to make a contact when it wasn't possible on alternative mode; others scoffed at the time wasted making FT8 contacts when conditions would have supported higher rates with SSB and CW. Most agree that the recent contest reflected an uptick in VHF activity. There's quite a discussion occurring on the VHF Contesting reflector, one place to start would be with this message from Duffy, KK6MC.

OPERATING TIP

Changing A Window Location to Avoid a Pain In the Neck

This tip was prompted by a story appearing in the Northern California Contest Club's (NCCC) <u>December</u>

2017 <u>JUG newsletter</u> (PDF): Sometimes just moving a window on the screen of your monitor can change your posture enough to reduce or eliminate operator pain or fatigue. Hank, W6SX, experienced neck pain after a RTTY contest, which he solved by changing his screen layout. He moved his logger's RTTY decoding window to a location higher on this computer monitor, which changed his neck position, and got rid of the ache.
