February CARA Meeting Flashback:

Hurricane Maria Hits Puerto Rico & K1MJM explained how Hams responded:

CARA was honored to have Michael Miciukiewicz – K1MJM, of Trumbull, at the February meeting to present his images and summary of his experiences as a volunteer with the ARRL-sponsored amateur radio communications team deployed for *three weeks* to Puerto Rico in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria, which ravaged the island on September 20, 2017.

Hurricane Irma did major damage to Puerto Rico's infrastructure with heavy winds and torrential rain. Several days later, Hurricane Maria hit with sustained winds of 155 mph, gusts to 195 mph, and even heavier rain than Irma. Maria completely wiped out any power and communications that Irma left behind. The combined forces of these two storms destroyed thousands of buildings and caused mud slides and flooding throughout the island. Immediately following, the American Red Cross prepared to deploy several hundred disaster relief volunteers.

Knowing that all communications systems were gone, they asked the ARRL to provide 50 volunteer amateur radio operators. Twentytwo hams were sent there in the first wave. In just a couple of days, the hams had set up a well distributed HF communication network across the entire island and were providing VHF communications for Red Cross mobile units.

Mike was fortunate enough to deploy to Puerto Rico with that first wave of volunteers from all over the United States. He was there for three weeks. It was truly an experience of a lifetime that he was pleased to share with us.

During Mike's talk, he discussed: Travel, living conditions, logistics, weather, medical concerns, organizational structure, radio gear, pre-existing resources, radio procedures, and much more.

He welcomed and answered our questions throughout the presentation and discussed what was of interest to us – especially those ARES members in attendance.





Offset Attenuator Building Session at N1NRP's QTH de N1NRP & W1QK Photo Credits: N1NRP



After lunch Joe-KC1IBQ, pulled a name out of the box for the drawing.


Jeff-KB1MZL, won a brand new dual-band HT. Congratulations Jeff.

The KC9ON Offset Attenuator Kit:



So - just what is an offset attenuator? Joe explains it on his "Homing in" site as:

An RF attenuator is a device that goes between antenna and receiver to reduce the signal strength down to within the range that the receiver S-meter can handle. Without one, you may think you're close to the fox when you're still far away. You won't be able to get close enough to a camouflaged hidden T to identify it. The amount of attenuation should be adjustable so that you can add just a little when your S-meter first pins,

Special ARDF receivers used by champion foxhunters have electronic attenuation built in, but ordinary handitalkies don't. Adding it would require major micro-surgery in the HT.

Fox Hunt Offset Attenuator

When your closing in on the fox you may find the signals to be strong enough you can no longer find a peak or null with your antenna. Sometimes the signal is so strong that the RF will leak straight into the radio, connections and other equipment making the antenna useless. The solution is to use an offset attenuator. The circuit consists of a small RF generator, in this case 4MHz. which will mix with the incoming fox signal (such as 146.52MHz) and produce new signals at plus and minus the fox signal (142.52Mhz and 150.52Mhz), A potentiometer on the board changes the injection level of the RF generator which in turn attenuates the incoming mixed signal to your radio to a level where tracking can continue.

ARRL Receives Byrd Antarctic Expedition Morse Key, Historical Materials

ARRL has received from Lynn Burlingame, N7CFO, the donation of a Kilbourne & Clark Morse key that the late Howard Mason (1ID, 7BU, and K7QB) used to let the world know that Rear Admiral Richard Byrd and his crew had overflown the South Pole for the first time during Byrd's 1928 – 1930 Antarctic expedition.

Mason and his 80 colleagues were awarded Congressional Gold Medals for their efforts in establishing the Antarctic outpost "Little America," the first of a series of bases bearing that name.



Mason was a lifelong radio amateur from Seattle who was an active ARRL National Traffic System participant and manager. In 1923, he relocated to Connecticut to serve as an editor of the ARRL's journal, *QST*.

Mason's first polar experience was as a radio operator with the Wilkins-Detroit News Arctic expedition that traversed the North Pole by air in 1928. This led to his selection by Byrd to be a radio engineer with his first Antarctic expedition. Mason was co-operator of Little America's base radio station, WFA, used to keep in contact with the rest of the world.



Mason continued to use the key in his ensuing and varied endeavors. Prior to his death in 1996, he gave the key to Burlingame of Bellevue, Washington, a collector and biographer who generously donated it to the ARRL Heritage Museum.

The museum plans to display the key as part of an exhibition tentatively scheduled to open on April 15. The exhibition also will include a large wooden key, engraved with "WFA" and bearing the signatures of some expedition members.

Also, on display will be a first edition of Admiral Byrd's book *Little America: Aerial Exploration in the Antarctic, the Flight to the South Pole* and an album of contemporary newspaper clippings, both part of the Burlingame donation.

A complete narrative will be posted to the Heritage Museum Section of the ARRL website.

The key and the Little America radio operators can be seen in action in an <u>original</u> <u>film</u> available on YouTube, which offers a first look of the towers erected there (at the 15:00 mark). —

NEWS, PRESS RELEASES, AND GENERAL INTEREST

During the ARRL International DX Contest, CW & SSB, some Puerto Rico Amateurs were sending zero, usually using the cutnumber 'T', as their power. Why? To raise overall awareness that significant portions of the island are still without commercial electrical power even now, and that recovery operations are still continuing in the aftermath of September's Hurricane Irma and Hurricane Maria.

For a limited time, the CQ WW Contest Committee <u>has made available a new tool</u> for examining logs in the CQ WW Contest. With this Tableau-based tool, different metrics of various logs can be examined and compared. This is **not** a 'GO/NO-GO' type of tool. It is a visualization and data exploration tool that can assist in analyses of various aspects of logs to identify areas for further investigation.

OPERATING TIP

Always include a Space at the end of your RTTY messages

It's accepted practice to put a space at the beginning of RTTY messages to separate

valid characters from any spurious decodes preceding them, and to take advantage of the **Unshift on S**pace (USOS) feature of many modern RTTY decoders. It's also wise to put a space AFTER each message, so that any subsequent spurious decodes are separated from the messages. This improves readability and makes copying message text by mouse movement or clicking easier for the receiving operator. **Bonus**: Don't use too many LINEFEEDs which can cause the other operator to chase the text around the screen. (Inspired by Dave, K2YG, and others via the <u>RTTY email reflector</u>)

Dave, NK7Z, has added a second chapter on finding and identifying RFI sources using SDRs to his website: "<u>RFI Site Survey - Part</u> <u>II, Interpretation</u>." Dave discusses his setup, and provides real-world examples of certain types of signals that can be found, including over-the-horizon RADAR, switching power supplies, etc. (Jim, K9YC, via RFI mailing list)
