Club of the Year

The Nashua Area Radio Society (NARS) is Dayton's Hamvention 2019's Club of the Year.

The ARRL Special Service club in southern New Hampshire focuses on mentoring and youth outreach to bring newcomers into the hobby and help them to get on the air.



The club has raised more than \$8,000 to enable its Amateur Radio mentoring and outreach activities.

The club offers Technician, General, and Amateur Extra-class licensing classes twice yearly and has helped more 210 individuals earn a license or to upgrade with a success rate exceeding 90 percent.



Field Day provides members with ample opportunity to develop practical emergency communication skills, station-building expertise, and on-air operating skills.

The club holds a monthly "Tech Night," in which members provide hands-on training to help new and experienced amateurs build stations, develop technical skills, and try new activities. NARS holds Amateur Radio Youth Expos at local events including the New England Division Convention, NEAR-Fest, and local schools and libraries.



The club has partnered with four local high schools and middle schools to develop and deliver STEM learning programs based upon Amateur Radio.







Through the Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) program, NARS partnered with Hudson Memorial School to help students speak via ham radio with astronaut Serena Auñón-Chancellor, KG5TMT.





One such project provides 14 hours of classroom presentations about Amateur Radio and high-altitude balloons.

You strain to listen to them work two maybe three other stations so you can pull out the call and grid so you know you've got them right and them make your call. You may have to call them several times before they pull you out of the noise but when you've completed the Q and you are proud of your abilities to listen into the noise pull out the info, and repeatedly call them until you make the exchange.

Hello everyone interested in this topic: The essence of legacy contesting is "spin the dial and turn the antenna" and hope that you can find someone to work. Legacy contesting (HF contesting) is all about how you find stations not about how you work stations. This is only a workable solution, because there is a seemingly endless parade of little stations to work on HF--think 100W and a dipole on 20M or 40M.? In the world of weak signal VHF, especially where the digital modes are concerned, you can "spin the dial and turn the antenna" and you will not find anyone to work(or at least very few).

JT65 digital EME signals are VERY weak, most of the time. If you can actually hear a signal with your ear, it is a strong one. You can tune the 2M EME band and hear one or two stations, but if you let WSJT "look" for signals, there might be dozens of stations there. What I am trying to say is that "spinning the dial and turning the antenna" will not do very much.? Actually, in the case of EME, you know where to point the antenna. The EME chat room(s) will let you know who is on, what frequency they are on, and what sequence. This is critical information for stations that are quite workable, but below the noise level.

Meteor scatter signals are often somewhat stronger than EME signals.

But they are completely random in time. So, you can "spin the dial" and you will not hear anything, so you continue up the band. A few seconds later, a big burn occurs, but you are now not listening on the

frequency where the burn happened. The same can be said for turning the antenna.

You may be pointed out west and then decide to turn the antenna slowly to the east. That is when a ping will occur out west. The situation

for meteor scatter is somewhat better than EME, because by agreement there are now established "watering holes" where folks hang out for digital meteor scatter, at least for 6M and 2M.? Still, it really helps

to know that W7XYZ/R is in DN12, calling CQ on 50.265MHz.

FT8 is somewhat similar to digital meteor scatter (MSK144). Signals are weak, often below what can be heard with the ear. So, "spinning the dial and turning the antenna" is not going to work.? Only because we have the agreed upon watering holes and the chat rooms can we figure out where anyone is....and what sequence they are on.

Several years ago, the ARRL removed the legacy HF type rules from VHF contesting. The result has been a renaissance in VHF contesting. The contests are much better now than under the old, restrictive HF type rules. The rovers are MUCH happier as are the smaller stations who now have a chance to maximize the potential of their stations. There were numerous problems with the old HF style rules for the VHF contests. I don't know of any problems now. Unless some serious problem can be found, LEAVE THE RULES ALONE! Don't try to fix something that is NOT broken.

SB QST ARL ARLB021 ARLB021 Ad Hoc Legislative Advocacy Committee to Meet with Lawmakers

ARRL's Ad Hoc Legislative Advisory Committee will meet with several members of Congress later this month in Washington to introduce new Committee members, reacquaint the lawmakers with Amateur Radio's most-pressing issues, seek their input on the best ways to achieve ARRL's objectives in Congress, and request their continuing support.

Committee members have completed a comprehensive analysis of Amateur Radio Parity Act deficiencies for dissemination to Amateur Radio's backers on The Hill. The panel now is following up on this process with the meetings later this month.

The Committee has contracted with The Keelen Group to provide advice and recommendations regarding ARRL's legislative relationships. Keelen Group advisors also will aid in organizing and guiding the meetings between ARRL representatives and key congressional allies in support of Amateur Radio initiatives.

On June 12, the Legislative Advisory Committee held the first of a series of meetings in DC with ARRL Washington Counsel David Siddall, K3ZJ, The Keelen Group, and a small contingent of radio amateurs associated with various governmental and nongovernmental partners to solicit their perspectives and assistance in charting a future course of action. Pacific Division Director and Committee Chair Jim Tiemstra, K6JAT, described these individuals as "critical allies in ARRL's efforts to achieve its legislative objectives."

The process of analyzing and clarifying ARRL's aims began when the Committee was reconstituted with new members at the ARRL Board of Directors' January meeting. The Board had determined a need to "review, reexamine, and reappraise the ARRL's regulatory and legislative policy with regard to private land-use restrictions," with the aim of renewing, continuing, and strengthening ARRL's effort to achieve relief from such restrictions.

"There seems to be no countervailing policy that could justify arbitrary conditions, covenants and restrictions," Tiemstra said. "Indeed, public policy should clearly favor the needs of the Amateur Radio operator."

Amateur Radio's role in public service and emergency communication will be the Committee's strongest argument in seeking relief from private land-use restrictions that limit amateurs' ability to operate effectively.

The Committee will analyze the outcomes of this month's meetings and draft a report with recommendations for the ARRL Executive Committee to review and consider at its October 12 meeting. The full Board is expected to take up the issue at its January 2020 meeting.

ARRL and International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) President Emeritus Larry E. Price, W4RA, of Statesboro, Georgia, died on September 10. An ARRL Life Member, he was 85.

A native of Little Rock, Arkansas, Price was first licensed as WN5TIA at age 16 and subsequently held several other call signs before becoming W4RA. After earning BSEE, MBA, and PhD degrees, he was commissioned as a 2nd lieutenant in the US Army Signal Corps and honorably discharged with the rank of captain.

Price spent most of his career as a professor of finance and economics at Georgia Southern University. Upon retirement, he was named emeritus professor and emeritus head of the Department of Finance and Law.

Elected as ARRL Southeastern Division Vice Director in 1973, Price became Director later that year and was elected as an ARRL Vice President by Board of Directors in 1980. In 1983 he became First Vice President following the death of ARRL President Vic Clark, W4KFC, and was elected President by the Board the following year.

He served four 2-year terms as ARRL President, serving simultaneously as IARU Secretary from 1989 until 1992, and continuing as IARU Secretary and ARRL International Affairs Vice President until his election as IARU President in 1999, a post he held for 10 years. The IARU Administrative Council named him President Emeritus upon his retirement in 2009. The ARRL Board named him ARRL President Emeritus in 2011.

In 1973, Price was one of three incorporators of the ARRL Foundation and served for several years as Secretary and Director.

IARU Secretary and retired ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, enjoyed a 46-year relationship with Price.

"As a young ARRL staffer, I had the good fortune to be asked to serve as Assistant Secretary of the ARRL Foundation in 1973 and worked closely with Larry from that point on," Sumner said. "His accomplishments as President of the ARRL and the IARU are too many to list, but neither organization would be what it is today without his vision, dedication, and hard work. We all owe a great debt to Larry and his family for their many sacrifices on our behalf."

IARU President Tim Ellam, VE6SH, recalls his many years of association with Price. "The Amateur Radio fraternity has lost a valued colleague today," Ellam

said. "Larry Price was the Dean of the IARU, and under his leadership the organization not only achieved great success for the Amateur Radio services but the respect of those we work with in the International Telecommunication Union (ITU). His work and tenacity on a number of issues gave the IARU the admiration of many administrations and senior leadership at the ITU, which we continue to enjoy today."

Ellam said Price was "an excellent mentor to me and many others" over the years, and that during his 10 years as IARU President, he's tried to maintain the ideals that Price instilled in the organization.

In 2014, Dayton Hamvention honored Price as Amateur of the Year. At the ARRL Centennial Convention that same year, Price was awarded the ARRL Medal of Honor.

Price's wife, Barbara Ann Parke Price, died in 1990. He is survived by their three children and several grandchildren.




Great Memories - de WA1JGA:



My first rig was a home brew one tube 15-watt transmitter for 80 meter CW only. I used a light bulb to tune for maximum output power. Still have it!



Then I borrowed a 30 watt Heathkit AT-1 CW Transmitter from Ray Feeley- K1CSB (SK). The CW Key had high voltage at the key terminals....ouch!!!!! (Plate voltage power – Editor)



My first antenna was approximately 150 ft long wire. No coax... I just stuck the end of the wire

into the center of the SO239 connector! It worked!

Then I put up a normal 80 meter wire dipole fed with RG-58 coax.

For 15 meters, I built a 3 element 15-meter beam with a transmatch on one element. It was in QST. It was a Doug DeMaw's design. He was great. He had articles in QST that you could easily build!



Got my Novice license on March 1, 1968 - WN1JGA. My first contact was with Joe Feeley – W1ADW, my mentor and one of CARA's cofounders.





My last regular Novice contact was with WA3HUT/1 (became WA1KRG, now W1QK – Editor) on Nov 15, 1968.




But the next day, I worked CW Sweepstakes.

I worked WA3HUT/1 on Nov 19, 1968.




This Time I used my Knight-Kit model T-150 transmitter at 150 watts! 3.69 MHz with the built- in VFO!

Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont Peak Season

You will find that New England Fall foliage peaks from the top of New England down the states in order. Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont peak foliage season around the last week of September through the first week or two in October.

Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island Peak Season

In this area of New England, the Fall foliage peaks around the three-day holiday weekend of Columbus Day. While this can't be guaranteed, overall that should be the best time to take a New England Fall foliage road trip in these three New England states.

Maine Fall Foliage Road Trip

Route 17 is a great route to check out New England Fall foliage in Maine. You can visit Grafton Notch State Park near Richardson Lake and Bigelow Preserve to witness the most beautiful Fall foliage in the state. Route 27/16 is also another good route for a Fall foliage road trip in Maine.

New Hampshire Fall Foliage Road Trip

The best place to take a Fall foliage road trip in New Hampshire would be the Kancamangus Highway (route 112) which goes from Lincoln to Conway. This is the White Mountains area where you can see mountains full of colorful Fall foliage around the start of October.

The Green Mountain Byway which is also known as Vermont Route 100 has the best views of Fall foliage in the state. Massachusetts Fall Foliage Road Trip

Travel through the artsy towns of Williamstown and North Adams when you take Route 2 to follow the Mohawk Trail through the Berkshires. Included in this Massachusetts Fall foliage road trip is a 160-foot long covered bridge on route 8A, which always makes a gorgeous Fall foliage photo opp.

Connecticut Fall Foliage Road Trip

The lower Connecticut Valley on Route 9 is your best option at checking out the New England Fall foliage this year. Take a trip on the Essex Steam Train to experience Connecticut Fall foliage in a whole new way. This scenic train ride will allow you to see more pretty leaves than you may see on your car road trip.
