December 13 CARA Monthly Meeting Minutes

Meeting called to order at 8:00 pm by President Marcus Swearingen.

Pledge of allegiance was recited.

Round Robin introductions were given with 12 people in attendance.

A motion was made to accept the meeting minutes as published in CAPERS. The motion was seconded and was passed by unanimous vote.

Charlie KC1IBR gave the treasurer's report. The opening balance was \$6888.18 and the closing balance was \$6906.30. The report was accepted by unanimous vote. Charlie mentioned how responsive and helpful Jim Ritterbusch (WO4X) has been when having to get items on the website and this was seconded by club president Marcus AB1WV.

Repeater Committee Report – Gregory WR1Z gave a recap of the repeater status from the planning meeting. John Morelli W1JGM talked about the 220 machine which was removed from the mountain previously. It was determined that the machine is not worth using. John presented a possible replacement machine for consideration. If we don't get a new repeater on the mountain we will lose our coordination with the CSMA. John also mentioned that the 6 meter machine needs some "elbow grease" to get it on the air. Another goal is to tie the Motorola 2 meter machine into the ARES system. John made a motion to buy all equipment needed to get a new 220 machine. A discussion followed to address John's motion. The vote was held and the motion passed 8 in favor and 3 against.

It was determined that the ongoing efforts to "perfect" the Membership list is no longer needed since a new membership list will be started in January for 2020. Charlie KC1IBR presented the idea of pro-rating by quarters members 65 years old if they turn 65 during the calendar year. John Ahle-

W1JMA made a motion making all dues one price for any and all members regardless of age etc. starting in 2021.

Christmas party recap. It was agreed by all that the party was really nice and the food was very good.

CARA website update. Dan Fegley W1QK is still working on getting a replacement for Jim KD1YV to maintain the CARA website.

YCCC Dual Meeting. Bud W1NSK is trying to get the YCCC to come to one of our meetings and do a presentation on the YCCC and contesting in general (April?)

Reviewed the list of people who have committed to do presentations in 2020. Bud W1NSK volunteered to do a presentation on "boat anchors".

The new meeting time could not be voted on due to a lack of a quorum.

CARA Repeater Committee Chairman's Report

9 December 2019

Re: State of the CARA Repeater System Report – Dec 2019

Greetings from Gregory G. Davis WR1Z, CARA repeater committee chairman 2015-19

CARA exchanged the Yaesu DR-1X UHF and VHF repeaters purchased in July of 2015, with the upgraded Yaesu DR-2X UHF/VHF repeaters in August of 2018. These repeater units are currently sited on Spruce Mountain as follows:

1 Yaesu DR-2X repeater configured:

447.775 MHz /-5 MHz PL100; OPERATIONAL & ON AIR

1 Yaesu DR-2X repeater configured:

147.300 MHz /+600 kHz - PL100Hz; OPERATIONAL & ON AIR

An Arcom RC210 Link controller with the external PL decoder has control of both repeaters, allowing for remote control via DTMF tones transmitted on frequency.

The 2m repeater has been operating with a Diamond HA500 since 2010. The 70cm repeater has been operating with a donor 8 bay folded dipole since 2015.

1 Maggiore Repeater configured:

223.960 MHz / -1.6MHz PL 91.5; OFF the air, awaiting repairs or replacement

The 1.25m Maggiore repeater equipment was malfunctioning. The unit is off the

mountain, waiting to be repaired, or replaced. WR1Z will not personally invest the time to repair the Maggiore, and recommends the purchase of a new repeater. Any other CARA member is welcome to repair the unit.

1 GE MASTER II Repeater configured:

53.130 MHz /-1 MHz PL 100; OFF THE AIR Until Spring 2020

CARA hired the services of Base Station Suply KA0JQO Kevin Magloughlin (717) 342-9031 krmjqo@earthlink.net to rebuild, configure, and test the CARA 6 meter GE Master II repeater.

The work was completed in Feb 2019. The Repeater has been placed on Spruce Mountain, but has not yet been connected to the existing duplexer & antenna on Spruce Mountain.

CARA has invested in repairs on a MSF5000 2m repeater, and purchased an MSF5000 UHF base station for use as a link radio. These units are currently stationed at Spruce Mountain, and will likely be moved to the New Fairfield Company A Firehouse site for additional configuration and testing for possible deployment.

There will be expenses involved to accomplish the work ahead, and will proceed as CARA is able to authorize the expenditures.

I can look at Sweepstakes results back in 1957, or a keyer article in 1969, or a transmitter construction article from the 1920's. WITHOUT having to keep a bunch of moldy smelly old QST's on the shelf in the basement.

Now there is just a little awkwardness in some of the online tools and organization. For example, archives of articles from 1915-2011 are viewable/downloadable as PDF, and articles since 2012 are in the proprietary pagesuite format that use the proprietary pagesuite viewer. This is a minor gripe for me, compared to having all this stuff online and searchable. I am hopeful that the ARRL will consolidate and streamline electronic access going forwards.

I have encouraged, and will continue to encourage, ARRL to make electronic archives and electronic new editions for both QEX and NCJ available. NCJ from the 70's and 80's really is a treat to read. Back before E-mail reflectors, NCJ was where the most hardcore contesters and world's best ops shared their stories and tales of station construction/operation.

Who can pass up the opportunity to brag/complain about their Novice rig?

Mine was the Walter Ashe kit, regen receiver, 6AG7-6L6 transmitter, TR switch by knife... 60 ft end fed wire at 25 feet. That was in Darien, CT in 1954 at age 14. Replaced the regen receiver with a shiny new National SW54, yeah, the one with no bandspread.

Had my first serious lesson in

high finance that year too. My Elmer, Guy W1DHO, called to say he had a BC-312 available for \$40. My 16 year old neighbor now with his driver's license called to say his idle "fancy" 3 speed English bike was available for \$40. I had \$40 to my name, what to do? Obviously I tried hitting up parents; their response was "get a job". I passed on the BC-312.

But the person who bought it sold it to me a year later for \$20... Had that receiver until 1965 when I upgraded and built the SB-100 transceiver and SB-200 amp.

My first rig was a Viking Adventurer transmitter and a Hallicrafters SX-96 receiver. They originally belonged to my Dad, who was licensed as a teenager in NYC and went on to teach radio and Morse code as a first lieutenant in the U.S. Army for six years during WWII. I thought he did his basic training at Ft. Dix, NJ and taught code at Ft. Monmouth, NJ, but Whitey's post makes me wonder if it was the other way 'round. Dad didn't have much time for ham radio after the war, but he did put up a "doublet" in the backyard of the first house my parents bought in TN in the mid-1950s. I think he built the Viking Adventurer, but don't know what he may have used for a receiver before the SX-96 arrived. My mother gave it to him for Christmas one year, soliciting donations from all our relatives for what was then a super-expensive radio listing for \$249. Dad setup a station in a walk-in closet in the basement, but having recently started a business manufacturing wheel weights, he had almost no time to use the radio equipment. Anyway, one of my strongest childhood memories was as a 5 or 6 year-old stealing into the closet and playing with the knobs and flipping switches on Dad's radios, pretending I was flying an airplane. I was also fascinated by Dad's Vibroplex bug.

That was my introduction to ham radio, and because of that memory, I always wanted to be a ham, just like Dad. And like him, it was all about CW for me. After years of dreaming about getting a license, and finally living in a house where I could set up a station, I met W1ECT (ex-WA3ECT), who became my Elmer. Mike pointed me in the right direction to learn CW and taught me a lot about ham radio. Got my ticket in December 1983 at the age of 30, licensed as KA1LBW (was that really 36 years ago???) Still a lot of nostalgia when I think of that call: "di-dah-di-dit dah-di-di-dit di-dah-dah" or "Lima Bravo Whiskey!" for the rare SSB contact -- never dreaming that my 10minute meter would hit 350/hr from 8P in CW WW SSB (but I still hate Phone...) I had previously setup a Cushcraft 5-band vertical in the side yard for SWLing, so I was able to get on the air shortly after the ticket arrived. A long wire from the house peak to a tree for 80m followed, later replaced by a Carolina Windom. My first QSO was on Christmas eve 1983 with KB4ETQ in NC on 21.113 MHz CW. No QSO

has produced a greater thrill than that first one, though many first-country, DXpedition contacts and tough mults have equaled it. First DX was with VE3OFM three days later. First QSO with EU came in mid-January 1984 with ON8DU. I was in heaven.

There followed a long succession of rigs, about half of them tube-based, and most of them acquired and sold at hamfests. And there have been many upgrades to the antennas over the years. When we finally owned a home with enough space for decent antennas, I built a station for my first passion, DXing. That's where I learned to tune, listen and pounce.

But as I started to run out of countries to work, my interest shifted to contesting and stayed there, especially after I experienced the thrill of running pileups. Now I was the DX! Consequently, more and more aluminum, wire and steel found its way onto our property and a lot of equipment, wiring and switches found its way to my shack. Mike used to say that DXers build solid, reliable stations capable of working the world, while contesters push the envelope by putting as much metal in the air as they possibly can, always on the hairy edge of something breaking, just to squeeze out an extra dB. Sound familiar?

My log now has nearly 200,000 QSOs, the vast majority having been logged during contests over the past 20 years since I joined YCCC. I only wish I had started when I was much younger!

(NB: Unbeknownst to me at the time, N1MM worked at my Dad's wheel weight factory in TN while on summer vacation from MIT in the late 60s or early 70s (forget which.) That's an amazing coincidence, as I was to meet Tom for the first time through YCCC here in New England in the early 2000s.

About 10 years later, we discovered the connection after a random comment about living in TN one of us made in a reflector post. Turns out our parents were very close friends in TN. Tom says working in my Dad's factory was the worst job he ever had and that it convinced him to stay in college and get his degree. I have no doubt! I remember hauling 70-lb lead ingots around that place. Glad I got into software instead...)
