After a few minutes of trial and error in the use of the ZOOM program, we started the meeting. There were 10 members present at the start of the meeting.

First order of business was to have Pres. Marcus Swearingen, who was the host of the meeting, mute all present. This was the first real attempt of a video meeting. All were informed that you must raise your hand to be recognized as next to speak.

Ball Pond Fire Company was brought up to give a letter of thanks for use of the building for our Winter Field Day. Charlie has a letter of thanks for this and will see to this. There is a need for a 220 MHz base antenna to be used for testing of our repeater that is presently at John's home. His greatest pleasure was his family. Paul and Louise rarely missed a grandchild's event, following them around the state to watch soccer, baseball, a school concert or


an awards ceremony.

# <u>Preview -- CARA Meeting</u> <u>Presentation April 17, 2020:</u>

The fast-changing FAA Rules for Recreational sUAV Flyers.

Just the acronyms can be confusing:

**UAV** - Unmanned Aircraft Vehicle Or

**UAS** – Unmanned Aircraft System

**sUAV** – Small Unmanned Aircraft Vehicles

sUAS – Small Unmanned Aircraft System

OR... more commonly "Drone".

Having been a recreational UAV flyer for five years I've had some thrilling photographic experiences while operating within existing FAA framework in effect at the time. I obtained a DJI Phantom 3 Standard as my only uav it is the viewpoint from which I hope to relate my experiences.

I hope to share some video previews of area scenes some of which may soon become much more difficult or nearly impossible to film due to tightening of regulations and waivers required, especially for the recreational flyer.

I'd say the "drone" fever reached its peak in 2015-2017 with Christmas sales estimated in the hundreds of thousands. Consumer Technology Association points out that 2.4 million personal drones were sold in the U.S. alone in 2016, more than double the 1.1 million sold in 2015. Of course any sophisticated device requires study and knowledge--- something the Christmas shoppers just were not thinking about!

In my opinion most of the consumer sUAVs sold during those holiday periods quickly became relics on the top shelves of youthful clothes' closets. Parents came to realize that registration became a reality and all too late realized that there are restrictions, rules and risks! Ohh... Let's not discount the amount of UAV's that crashed or hit trees, lying in disrepair in the basement.

Cumulatively the FAA estimates that by 2020 end, seven million drones are expected to be sold. FAA further points out that the pace of registration in 2018 slowed considerably compared to 2016 and 2017. Monthly owner registration now stands at half of what was observed a year ago.

https://www.faa.gov/data\_research/aviation/aero space\_forecasts/media/unmanned\_aircraft\_syste ms.pdf From the outset, different FAA drone regulations for commercial use and for recreational use created some discourse and confusion. With early rules, the recreational users having permission to fly at night and the commercial users had to apply for waivers! Today, the rules are almost reversed... the recreational flyer restrictions apply.



The FAA site can be intimidating and at times seemingly contradictory when it relates to recreational flying.

Near-real-time system of approval for flights has been rolled out...the Low Altitude Authorization and Notification Capability (LAANC) system, which began authorization in May 2018. LAANC is designed to allow considerable flexibility in sUAS operations and facilitate non-modelers' use of the NAS. Currently however, LAANC access for recreational flyers is not fully implemented. This is highly limiting the casual flyer.



While most of the near-term growth in non-model sUAS will continue to come from consumer grade (over 90 percent), we anticipate a significant part will come from professional grade non-model sUAS as well

FAA Part 107 rules now address commercial sUAV regulations. Commercial use requires a FAA Remote Pilot license. website <a href="https://faadronezone.faa.gov/#/">https://faadronezone.faa.gov/#/</a> provides a clever interface for Part 107 (commercial or Public safety drones <55 lbs) and a separate subinterface addressing the "exception for recreational flyers". The FAA has been developing a Aeronautical and Safety Test for recreational flyers, it appears as though there have been major delays in this however. FAA at <a href="https://www.faa.gov/uas/">https://www.faa.gov/uas/</a> is a root location for most-all uas operations.

The <u>FAA's Reauthorization Bill</u> introduced new rules for how, when, and where you can fly your drone for <u>recreational purposes</u>. (H.R. 302 Section 44809).

Public Service flying that was once basically unregulated is now captured under the Part 107 rules requiring Remote Pilot Licenses.

Some memorable solid pillars of operational practices:.. Fly at or below 400 feet, Visual Line of Sight Only (VLOS). Use a VO (Visial observer) to assist you when flying if available. Yield to manned aircraft at all times.

More sessions are planned in the future and you should get ready to participate. It is remarkably interactive - when someone speaks, his video feed jumps to the foreground so you can see him while he is speaking. It is possible to share your screen with the group, so I see lots of presentations/demonstrations in our future. Please do the following:

- 1. Install Zoom on whatever computer you have that has a webcam. A laptop in your shack would be best, but lacking that, install it on your tablet or phone. This way you will be ready for the next meeting.
- 2. Think about what you might be able to present to the group. Screen sharing works well. I am interested in doing a live presentation on the spectrum display, but I don't yet know how well it can work. Google says that zoom can share Youtube videos, so I am very hopeful that this will work.
- 3. Think about what presentations you would like to see, and forward your requests to W1UE, or post them in this thread. Zoom is capable of breakout sessions, so we could have multiple presentations happening at the same time and members could choose which one to participate in. Think about what presentations you would like to give and forward them as well!

Note that Zoom is VOX actuated, so that if you have your mic on, and you speak, you will jump to the foreground. Turn your mic off if you don't want to interact for a while.

I was so pleased to see and hear some members who were experimenting with something new for them. Congrats to those who might have been a little skeptical or apprehensive, but decided to give it a try.

Dennis also noted that about a third of the participants in last night's meeting were seldom seen at in-person meetings. Seems like taking distance and driving out of the picture is a real opportunity to equalize access to club activities for all our members, no matter where they live.

Is it ok for a ham radio club to have Zoom meetings, not just on-the-air meetings? Is it ok to use non-ham technology when we could be doing it on-the-air? Are we in some way betraying our own roots by taking this step?

I think it's fine, and a net positive for the club. My view of the ultimate ham is one who understands communication in many ways - many modes; in all its nuances. Much of what we do uses the RF spectrum provided to us on an exclusive or priority basis. But, going outside that 'RF box' allows us to experience and come to understand 'adjacent' communication capabilities. This makes us better communicators.

Nothing prevents us from, and many of us do participate in on-the-air get-togethers like the weekly YCCC DMR net. That is a lot of fun, too, and it does give me an extra bit of satisfaction knowing we're using our own technologies to make it happen.

If this is still a barrier to acceptance, maybe it will be helpful to know that there are analogous situations out there. Think about film photographers. They practice an art that's been greatly impacted by digital photography. They continue to do their thing despite the fact that film is scarce and costly and film camera technology has been frozen in time for decades. But, this hasn't isolated or crippled these practitioners. On Facebook, for example, there's a group called 35mm Film Photography. The group has 75,000 members. Everyday, they discuss the art and science of film photography. Instead of getting together in person and showing each other hardcopy prints, they share digital scans of images they captured on film. They advance their art through the use of modern echnology. Here's a picture posted in that group today for online review. The poster asked, "Do you like this pic or is it just weird? Canon EOS Elan Ile, Rokikon 14mm, Proimage 100, lab dev+scan"

And, 3830, which used to be a real post-contest score-sharing net on 75m, has long since moved to online community at 3830scores.com. In the online implementation, 3830 has become more accessible and much more complete in delivering score information and color commentary about the contest.

After last night's call, Dennis and I briefly discussed the future for on-line meetings for YCCC. He's currently thinking that we can and should do the April meeting online (this is not an announcement; nothing is finalized). We will discuss that and consider an online-appropriate meeting agenda.

"Necessity is the mother of invention." I hope it can also be an inspiration for long-term change. With our collective acquisition of this new experience and skill set in the area of online meetings, we have an additional tool to make our club better for the long term. Hope we do it.

I've heard a lot of reports about groups where attendance went \*up\* when the meetings went virtual. Churches, community groups, clubs, whatever. I think the big question is what happens when the novelty wears off. But that's true for anything. Give people a reason to come (like a good program, and we had one last night), and they'll do it. Zoom worked really well for me, and I didn't even use my good microphone... (hope the audio was OK). (My mic situation is sort of insane--I have the whole range from absolute crap to high end studio stuff. And the mic I used was definitely on the crap end of the spectrum.)

For my 2-ele array on 40m I use hardware store angle AL cut into 4 12" pieces bolted together to form a square.

a square.

SS nuts & bolts. Multiple teflon coated AL radials crimped onto each ring terminal. About 90 radials per element.

Cheap, easy to source, easy work with. Have been on the ground under the leaves for years & years and shows zero corrosion.

On 160m I use a low budget radial plate for my Inv-L with 8 raised radials. It won't win any design elegance competitions but this antenna rocks.

Flat AL plate maybe 4"x4". SO239 chassis mount through the center. SS nuts/bolts On each corner, ring terminals each holding 2 radials Very inexpensive, easy to work with. It's been up for years & years and shows next to no corrosion. I took the ring terminals off this Fall and brushed up the contact areas with emory cloth. Took 5-minutes.

point:

strainer. \$2.34 each

Punch out the plastic post and center and you'll find a perfect 5/8" diameter hole to mount an SO-239 or similar. You will be using the strainer upside-down, so place the SO-239 into the strainer so the coax connection is inside the strainer and the solder end points up Solder a 4 " to 6" piece of stranded wire to the SO-239 and a similar piece onto your radiating element. In my case, its copperweld.

Holes in the strainer will accept #8 screws. Get #8 Phil Pan head SS screws and #8 SS KEP nuts. (That's a nut with an attached external tooth washer.)

Widen two holes along the outer row of holes of the strainer and position the points of a thimble pointing up toward the radiating element. Use 18" of Phillystran and two wire clamps (u-bolt and saddle) as a strain relief to prevent the radiating element from disconnecting from the SO-239 in the sink strainer. Keep the one wire clamp nearest to the thimble and away from the SO-239.

Keep the 2nd wire clamp on the radiating element, but above the stranded wire you've added. I use an electrician's wire nut to join the wire from the SO-239 to a flexible stranded wire from the radiating element, this way you less likely to have to solder outdoors if this comes apart.

I just bought 200 3/4" #8 SS screws and 200 #8 SS Kep nuts for \$22 at my local fastener distributor. (located 1500 feet behind my swamp - convenient) Total cost for 8 feedpoints for two 4-squares: ~\$60.00 plus eight SO-239. = \$100.

As reported last issue, in response to the coronavirus emergency, Hamvention 2020 has been canceled, along with all other related events. That weekend the World Wide Radio Operator Foundation (WWROF) is sponsoring the Hamvention QSO Party, a "12 hour fun event" 1200 to 2400 UTC Saturday, May 16, 2020. Everyone works everyone, 160 meters through 10 meters. The exchange is the first year you attended Hamvention, and if you've never attended use "2020." W8BI, the call sign for the Dayton Amateur Radio Association, hosts of Hamvention, is a bonus multiplier on each

band. No logs will be collected, post your scores on 3830scores.com.

Less than 24 hours after the announcement of the Hamvention QSO Party, Nick, NA3M of the *N1MM Logger+* Development Team had developed an *N1MM Logger+* UDC (User Defined Contest) for the event. The UDC complies with the rules, exchange, and scoring for the one-day contest. Readers can visit the *N1MM Logger+* website for details.

After the Hamvention cancellation announcement, Tim, K3LR, announced the cancellation of Contest University, Top Band Dinner, and Contest Dinner. Go to the respective websites for details on how to get refunds if you had been signed up. Look for Contest University 2020 to go allonline via Zoom on May 14. The schedule will be posted soon on the Contest University website. (Tim, K3LR) K3LR also points out that "Even though Ohio is shut down - DX Engineering (essential business) is taking orders and shipping 7 days a week."

Don't forget that pandemic rules about physical distancing apply, even when working on radio projects. If you need help to get that antenna in the air, troubleshoot a rig, or any other reason where others are needed to be physically present, it's best to wait for now. Even for outdoor projects.

Radio clubs are moving club meetings online using services such as Zoom. For example, the Portage County Amateur Radio Service's April Radiogram announced "On Monday April 13, 2020 we WILL HAVE a PCARS meeting! And you won't have to leave your house to attend. This will be our first 'Virtual Meeting' and will be held on the ZOOM platform. Very easy to use and participate. As we get a little closer I will send you all the information you'll need to get logged in. BOTH Jim Storms, AB8YK,

and Michael Kalter, W8CI, will attend online as our featured speakers to talk about the David Kalter Memorial Youth DX Adventure program. You won't want to miss it."

Just like it takes a little practice to learn how to use a computer logging program, expect the same with using any type of video conferencing technology. A "pre-meeting meeting" for video conference novices is a good way to get ahead of any problems Chris, NX4N, submits: "The 2020 Florida QSO Party is being held 1600Z April 25 to 2159Z April 26. Be sure to mark your calendar and join in the fun during the next Florida QSO Party (FQP).

We will have a total of seven special 1x1 call sign stations whose suffixes spell LOVEBUG. Contact all seven of these 1x1 stations to earn this award. These stations will be on both modes full-time and should be very accessible. QSL these 1x1 calls active in FQP via KU9C direct or via bureau. Please visit our website for rules. results, records and more information. We're having a party, and you're invited! See you then! 73/OJ! -- The Florida Contest Group, FQP Sponsor" I asked Chris, "Why LOVEBUG?" and he said, "Florida is overrun with Lovebugs right around FQP time." You can see a few pictures of Lovebugs on the Wikipedia site.

The RSGB <u>announced</u> that for HF and VHF contests, they'll "no longer allow any entries from stations operating from portable or alternative addresses or from multi-operator stations" due to the UK Government's restrictions on movement due to the coronavirus pandemic. In the US, some multi-multi efforts are now all-remote, so the operators at some multi-multi can be sheltering in place while still participating as a team.

You say Nancy, I say November: Phonetics have been a popular topic of in internet discussion groups of late. The problem from a technical perspective is that people using different words to indicate particular letters are in effect using different signal constellation diagrams. From the human perspective, there are multiple considerations around what might be the best alphabet to use. This article found by K1DG and relayed via N0AX, explains some of the human issues. The contest sponsors have a Planned Activity page, so you can see if your friends are participating. Groups of operators can register as a team for an additional level of competitive fun. Any log achieving a certain number of contacts will be in the running for a door prize. Two T-shirts can be earned for working multipliers: An SSB **Sprint Worked All States T-Shirt** for those that manage to work all 50 states in the 4 hours, and an SSB Sprint Worked Canada **T-Shirt** for those that manage to work all 13 Canadian multipliers in the 4 hours. (Bob, KW8N)

In discussions about how younger people can get involved in radio contesting, "making it more appealing to the younger generation" comes up as a goal. E-sports is an oft-cited competitor for the attention of the younger set, and is usually seen as a competitor to our hobby. Auto racing took advantage of e-sports when facing a potential canceled racing season due to the pandemic. They went online with real drivers in "sim races" - virtual racing -- and were immediately able to capture sizable viewing audiences. They pit real-world racers against one another and added some well-known virtual-only racers, demonstrating that many of the skills in sim and real racing are comparable. 

# A post from Betsy, K1EIC:

What Everyone's Getting Wrong About the Toilet Paper Shortage. It isn't really about hoarding. And there isn't an easy fix.

Aound the world, in countries afflicted with the coronavirus, stores are sold out of toilet paper. There have been shortages in Hong Kong, Australia, the United Kingdom, and the United States. And we all know who to blame: hoarders and panic-buyers.

Well, not so fast.

Story after story explains the toilet paper outages as a sort of fluke of consumer irrationality. Unlike hand sanitizer, N95 masks, or hospital ventilators, they note, toilet paper serves no special function in a pandemic. Toilet paper manufacturers are cranking out the same supply as always. And it's not like people are using the bathroom more often, right?

U.S. Health Secretary Alex Azar summed up the paradox in a March 13 *New York Times* story: "Toilet paper is not an effective way to prevent getting the coronavirus, but they're selling out." The president of a paper manufacturer offered the consensus explanation: "You are not using more of it. You are just filling up your closet with it."

Faced with this <u>mystifying phenomenon</u>, media outlets have turned to psychologists to explain why people are cramming their shelves with a household good that has nothing to do with the pandemic. Read the coverage and you'll encounter all sorts of fascinating concepts, from "<u>zero risk bias</u>" to "anticipatory anxiety." It's "driven by fear" and a "<u>herd mentality</u>," the BBC scolded. The libertarian Mises Institute took the opportunity to blame <u>anti-gouging laws</u>. The *Atlantic* published a short documentary harking back to the <u>great toilet paper scare of 1973</u>, which was driven by misinformation.

Most outlets agreed that the spike in demand <u>would</u> <u>be short-lived</u>, subsiding as soon as the <u>hoarders</u> <u>were satiated</u>.

No doubt there's been some panic-buying, particularly once photos of empty store shelves began circulating on social media. There have also been a handful of documented cases of true hoarding. But you don't need to assume that most consumers are greedy or irrational to understand how coronavirus would spur a surge in demand. And you can stop wondering where in the world people are storing all that Quilted Northern.

There's another, entirely logical explanation for why stores have run out of toilet paper — one that has gone oddly overlooked in the vast majority of media coverage. It has nothing to do with psychology and everything to do with supply chains. It helps to explain why stores are still having trouble keeping it in stock, weeks after they started <a href="mailto:limiting how many a customer could purchase">limiting how many a customer could purchase</a>.

In short, the toilet paper industry is split into two, largely separate markets: commercial and consumer.

The pandemic has shifted the lion's share of demand to the latter. People actually do need to buy significantly more toilet paper during the pandemic — not because they're making more trips to the bathroom, but because they're making more of them at home. With some 75% of the U.S. population under stay-at-home orders, Americans are no longer using the restrooms at their workplace, in schools, at restaurants, at hotels, or in airports.

Georgia-Pacific, a leading toilet paper manufacturer based in Atlanta, estimates that the average household will use 40% more toilet paper than usual if all of its members are staying home around the clock. That's a huge leap in demand for a product whose supply chain is predicated on the assumption that demand is essentially constant. It's one that won't fully subside even when people stop hoarding or panic-buying.

If you're looking for where all the toilet paper went, forget about people's attics or hall closets. Think instead of all the toilet paper that normally goes to the commercial market — those office buildings, college campuses, Starbucks, and airports that are now either mostly empty or closed. That's the toilet paper that's suddenly going unused.

So why can't we just send that toilet paper to Safeway or CVS? That's where supply chains and distribution channels come in.

Talk to anyone in the industry, and they'll tell you the toilet paper made for the commercial market is a fundamentally different product from the toilet paper you buy in the store. It comes in huge rolls, too big to fit on most home dispensers. The paper itself is thinner and more utilitarian. It comes individually wrapped and is shipped on huge pallets, rather than in brightly branded packs of six or 12.

"Not only is it not the same product, but it often doesn't come from the same mills," added Jim Luke, a professor of economics at Lansing Community College, who once worked as head of planning for a wholesale paper distributor. "So for instance, Procter & Gamble [which owns Charmin] is huge in the retail consumer market. But it doesn't play in the institutional market at all."

Georgia-Pacific, which sells to both markets, told me its commercial products also use more recycled fiber, while the retail sheets for its consumer brands Angel Soft and Quilted Northern are typically 100% virgin fiber. Eric Abercrombie, a spokesman for the

company, said it has seen demand rise on the retail side, while it expects a decline in the "away-fromhome activity" that drives its business-to-business sales.

In theory, some of the mills that make commercial toilet paper could try to redirect some of that supply to the consumer market. People desperate for toilet paper probably wouldn't turn up their noses at it. But the industry can't just flip a switch. Shifting to retail channels would require new relationships and contracts between suppliers, distributors, and stores; different formats for packaging and shipping; new trucking routes — all for a bulky product with lean profit margins.

Because toilet paper is high volume but low value, the industry runs on extreme efficiency, with mills built to work at full capacity around the clock even in normal times. That works only because demand is typically so steady. If toilet paper manufacturers spend a bunch of money now to refocus on the retail channel, they'll face the same problem in reverse once people head back to work again.

"The normal distribution system is like a well-orchestrated ballet," said Willy Shih, a professor at Harvard Business School. "If you make a delivery to a Walmart distribution center, they give you a half-hour window, and your truck has to show up then." The changes wrought by the coronavirus, he said, "have thrown the whole thing out of balance, and everything has to readjust."

While toilet paper is an extreme case, similar dynamics are likely to temporarily disrupt supplies of other goods, too — even if no one's hoarding or panic-buying. The CEO of a fruit and vegetable supplier told NPR's Weekend Edition that schools and restaurants are canceling their banana orders, while grocery stores are selling out and want more. The problem is that the bananas he sells to schools and restaurants are "petite" and sold loose in boxes of 150, whereas grocery store bananas are larger and sold in bunches. Beer companies face a similar challenge converting commercial keg sales to retail cans and bottles.

It's all happening, of course, against the backdrop of a pandemic that makes it hard enough for these producers to keep up business as usual, let alone remold their operations to keep up with radical shifts in demand. If there's any good news, it's that we can stop blaming these shortages on the alleged idiocy of our fellow consumers. "I'm absolutely convinced that very little was triggered by hoarding," Luke said. Even a modest, reasonable amount of stocking up by millions of people in preparation for stay-at-home orders would have been enough to deplete many store shelves. From there, the ripple effects of availability concerns, coupled with a genuine increase in demand due to people staying in, are sufficient to explain the ongoing supply problems.

In the long run, the industry is still optimistic that it can adapt. "We've got fiber supply, we've got trees," said Georgia-Pacific's Abercrombie. "It's just a matter of making the product and getting it out."

In the meantime, some enterprising restaurateurs have begun <u>selling their excess supplies</u> of toilet paper, alcohol, and other basics. Last week I picked up takeout at a local restaurant with a side of toilet paper and bananas. The toilet paper was thin and individually wrapped. The bananas were puny. They'll do just fine.

downloaded client and via your Google Mail
screen. As with Skype, you can make free calls to
any other Google user with the appropriate
service. You can also call landline and cellphones
for a small fee. These Google services require
Mac and Linux users to install plugins for their
browsers, as the desktop client works only on
Windows machines. Talk and Voice also work only
for U.S. users, but do allow you to call people
outside the country if they use an Extensible
Messaging and Presence Protocol (XMPP) format.
