Please be part of the club that moves this forward.



Meeting called to order at 7:30pm by Pres. Bud Kozloff

Pledge of Allegiance was recited. There were 4 people present thru Teams and 12 in person. This meeting was held face-to-face at Stony Hill FD with some attending thru Microsoft Teams.

A Round Robin was the first order of business with all giving their callsign and location.

Minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as printed in the CAPERS. This was made a motion seconded and passed.

Treasurer reported an opening balance of \$4587.56. We have an ending balance of \$4597.99.

Repeater Committee reported that coordination is underway to make the trip to the top of Spruce Mtn. now that the weather and temperature is working in our favor. This will probably come about in the latter part of September.

John asked that a Font size needs to be addressed to make it easier for some to be able to read the content. Possibly a color other than grey would be more legible. The links that are shown are not very distinctive. The calendar is not, at this time, the same as our Teams calendar. Stef will look into changing this. She was shown the certificate of Appreciation that was generated for the numerous hours that she has put in to get our site back up and running. As she was attending by way of Teams, she will receive this at a later date. A Round of applause followed.

Bud listed the various standing committees and the members listed on these committees. There was mention of a Development Committee that has not had a Chair or members stepping up at this time. There is a good probability that there will be upcoming Grants that we

may be able to have access to. This is money for programs that will promote Amateur Radio and its membership. These our monthly meeting. committees and activities are always receptive for more members and help.

Membership Committee reported 5 new members in the last few months. Some of these are licensed and others working on getting their license. Our membership is around 60 members at this point.

He has spoken with Ray Novak from ICOM who is sending a box of things to be distributed. John has a layout of the PAL building and how the proposed setup will occur. He has planned out 8X10ft areas per vendor. Most vendors should be inside the building. There are a few spots for tailgating. All vendors will be required to bring their own tables and chairs as needed. There will need to be attendants at both the entrance to the vendor area as well as the main doors to the building. We will have the use of the concession area for food distribution. With the ticket stubs from previous years, we will be able to send out email to all who have signed up for our door prizes. John (W1JGM) has written up an extensive sheet outlining most of the personnel needed as well as various signs, tickets, sound systems, banners, etc.







Great analysis, Marko. And I'll concede the point. When I was running you might not have called me if you weren't SO2R, I assume S&P with the second radio. (I've never had to wait for you in any event.)

So from a macro standpoint, that is correct and on balance the occasional wait may be offset by the extra Q's which the population active in that contest receives from the increased rate. I've also acknowledged that stuff occasionally happens with the very best operators so I will never make a specific complaint.

From a micro perspective, if one assumes an unlimited supply of callers regardless (VP5M running in CQWW CW or ARRL DX CW for example), or a limited time scope (1 hr CWT), then a wait does have a negative effect on the rate of the run station having to wait.

The end result is probably not a major factor in any event. Sort of like in traffic the car in front of you not moving immediately when the light turns green. Come on! Come on!. Seconds seem a lot longer when there's some active adrenalin ③

The issue has been addressed at Contest U and by others, but I wonder if you have developed any specific techniques you can share for preparing physically and mentally for those long, gruelling contests where sleep and mental fatigue become factors and long unbroken hours in the chair are potentially detrimental to one's health? You

appear to have minimized the effects. Is it coffee or Red Bull?

Maybe that's an entirely separate subject, but as the contesting population ages, one of the major considerations for increasing scores as many have pointed out, is BIC time and it's not always simply Unlike Bud, I sit in a chair for probably 11 - 12 a matter of personal motivation.

I exercise daily, and I mean daily. My regime is an 8 (indoors on a treadmill) or 8.6 (outdoor) mile aerobic walk. My resting heart rate is in the mid-50's. I track my steps using a Fit Bit device.

I do not consume alcohol or caffeine.

I typically get 7 hours of sleep a night. I take a nap on the afternoons prior to the 48 hour events.

I hope this helps.

 - o Each station shall determine their respective operating mode
 - Stations shall change operating bands each hour, example:
 - First hour of operation: station 1 on 40m; station 2 on 20m; station 3 on 15m; etc
 - Second hour of operation: station 1 on 15m; station 2 on 40m; station 3 on 20m; etc
 - Third hour of operation: station 1 on 20m; station 2 on 15m; station 3 on 40m; etc
 - Repeat
- Use this activation as a means for new or inexperienced hams to get on the air!
