July 10 CARA Monthly Meeting Minutes de N1GSA



Meeting started ~19:37 hrs.

Sixteen in attendance, see roster at end.

Bud W1NSK, new CARA President, offered praise and thanks to Marcus AB1WV for his serving as club president for the past years, and Jim WO4X for his Webmaster duties round of applause followed.

Minutes of previous meeting as printed in Capers ... Motion to accept passed. Gary N1GSA was unable to attend tonight's meeting due to a power failure in his area.

Treasurer Report Charlie KC1IBR Begin balance \$5311.08, end balance of July 9 \$5331.08. Two members' dues were collected, one WACC (Worked All Connecticut Counties) certificate revenue \$6.00. Zoom fee paid.

Asset committee of Charlie KC1IBR and Harlan W1QH, month. has started a database and solicited the membership for input.

John W1JGM reported on 365 office progress, continues to attempt to contact a certain individual with much difficulty, setup fees quoted were \$450. Mike W8ZY said new fiscal year at Microsoft just started and non-profit benefit procedures is now streamlined. Would go faster if we did not need initially setup new email addresses. Discussion on email domain with Jim WO4X ensued. Mike (W8ZY) suggests if we do not have a ".net" domain we should buy it and then use that to setup office 365. He further added it would need two members to maintain the 365 platform/access. Many advantages were discussed, software, storage space, presentations, Teams collaborations. Mike would be assisting on this.

Repeater Committee Chairman Greg WR1Z reports Budget next to zero except for what has been approved, Arcom link controller, case, power supply \$900 or John W1JGM says \$450 alone otherwise nothing. Funds were previously approved, no new funding anticipated other than incidentals, like cable, connectors, etc. Repeater assets lists in progress. John began approximately 9:00 p.m. W1JGM says he has the 220 at his house.

Hamfest Chair John W1JGM outdoor COVID regulations occupancy limit 100 we draw 400 to hamfest. We have the permits. Motion made by John W1JGM and seconded for \$35 to reimburse Bill Webb for Hamfest permits that had been obtained (\$25 of which is refundable). John W1JGM stated he will check on the return of our deposit from last year and call. When asked if vendors were enquiring on the hamfest status, John said he has had no correspondence from vendor enthusiasm. Motion made/seconded/passed to cancel hamfest due to COVID-19 and look at other concepts of fund raising.

New business

Migration to groups.io met with skepticism and is perhaps a moot point since MS 365 is in works. Bud W1NSK wanted to concentrate on one thing... MS 365 and to table groups.io. We can always bring up next

Monthly presentations discussed, nothing scheduled for next month. YCCC for September Zoom meeting. OCT & November open.

Bud brought up budget structure and fundraiser. It was generally agreed to project expenses for the year and the aspect of a formal budget would be cumbersome and it would not be necessary to tie a formal budget to the constitution or Policies and Procedures. The term forecast of revenue and expenses would be more valuable, commented John Α.

Another idea expressed was a \$5.00 member assessment due to COVID-19 impact on our revenue. Ideas on increasing member benefits to justify increase in dues... e.g. set up a club station.

John W1JGM mentioned 4 new members joined and we are now at 51 members.

Marcus AB1WV expressed a round of tribute to former Director Dan W1QK for his long service to the club a round of applause followed.

There were 10 people present

had some inquiries about the Hamfest. He is planning on sending out an update to ensure that all know about this. The ARRL was notified and their website was updated the next day.

We do need to be thinking of some type of revenue fundraiser.

There can be a raffle held that will comply with our Non-Profit status. We must find something that will interest the largest group of people. Ham Radio items calendar as well as other updates. We do need a new will restrict this to a relatively small group. John mentioned that his gun club just did a similar event and they made some \$4400 after expenses. Are there a woman in Brookfield that he has contacted, that is Grants available that may help with our finances? Then we would need someone that has experience with investigating and applying for these.

We do need a basic budget prior to either fundraising effort. This would show what our expected needs would be. We have spent \$1200 on repairs thus far for the 220 repeater.

Charlie mentioned that we had \$4400 prior to last year's Hamfest. After the event \$6700. Today we have \$5300.

There was a point brought up about a mailing to generate interest in becoming members of our club. Gregory spoke on the success of this with the NARA club. The ARRL has a service that will locate all licensed operators in each zip code. The only cost for us would be for the cost of the card and postage. He mentioned that a postcard was costing \$.37 each. While this is good public relations is it NOT cost effective looking at cost vs gain in membership.

Dan spoke about listing in Capers the Standing Committees and their Chairman. This could hopefully generate interest and participation in the necessary positions.

Bud spoke about the gear and equipment that Sandor had. It is believed that this is a Go-Kit and an HF radio. This is all up for sale. There are also 2 tripods and vertical antennas that need to be taken down. He will Bud reiterated that the Hamfest is cancelled. John has send this out to the membership to see if there is interest in purchasing this. This could also be purchased by the club and available for use by a member on a loaner basis.

> Bud spoke about future programs and how little response there is from the Section Manager. He has had no emails, phone calls, or other return communication from him.

John spoke about updating the website with a new webmaster to fill the position left vacant when Jim Ritterbush resigned. Dan will forward contact info for willing to help.

John has started a spreadsheet listing our assets. This will probably also need to be supplemented by photos for verification for insurance purposes. We may want to consider insurance for our equipment. This cost is believed to be about \$1.40 per \$100 of replacement value from ARRL's vendor.

Bud again mentioned the need for an actual budget.

Microsoft 365 is still a work in progress.

Dan mentioned about lining up presentations for the upcoming months.

There are awards for activators (those who ascend to the summits) and chasers (who either operate from home, a local hilltop or are even Activators on other summits).

SOTA is fully operational in nearly a hundred countries across the world. Each country has its own Association which defines the recognized SOTA summits within that Association. Each summit earns the activators and chasers a score which is related to the height of the summit. Certificates are available for various scores, leading to the prestigious "Mountain Goat" and "Shack Sloth" trophies. An Honour Roll for Activators and Chasers is maintained at the SOTA online database.

Glenn Johnson, WØGJ

Glenn grew up near Marshalltown, Iowa.

After getting a degree in Forestry at Iowa State University, he then received his M.D. degree from the University of Iowa. After an internship in Seattle, and residency at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, he spent five years in the Air Force in Anchorage, Alaska.

He returned to practice orthopedic surgery in Minnesota and after 30-some years has returned full circle back to lowa.

For the last 10 years Glenn has been working parttime for the Mayo Clinic Health System. In 2012, he and Vivien, KL7YL, made the move permanent to a "perfect" retirement QTH between Decorah and Calmar on top of the highest hill in Winneshiek County, in the very northeast corner if Iowa.

Glenn's interest in amateur radio started as a youngster listening to his grandfather's short-wave radio. He was licensed at age 15 and within three months had worked all 50 states with a homemade crystal transmitter...with three crystals, one for 80M, two for 40M, one of which worked on 15M.

He has always been interested in contesting and working DX. He has achieved #1 Honor Roll, 5BDXCC and 5BWAZ awards.

He has seven First Place World scores in the QRP category in the ARRL 160M Contest. He has co-led four major DXpeditions to #2 Most Wanted areas (Kingdom of Bhutan in the Himalayas (2000), Lakshadweep in the Arabian Sea (2007), Desecheo (2009), and Navassa (2015)). His first DXpedition was to Heard Island (1997) He was on the 2004 Andaman Island VU4AN DXpedition, the 2012 Malpelo DXpedition, and 2016 Palmyra Island in the Pacific and the most recent, 2018 Bouvet attempt near Antarctica. All of these DXpeditions (except Bouvet) were awarded DXpedition of the Year.

In 2003, Glenn was inducted into the CQ Magazine Amateur Radio Hall of Fame. In 2012, he was inducted into the DX Hall of Fame. He has been a director of the Northern California DX Foundation for the past ten years. He is currently secretary of NCDXF.

His wife and four children are all licensed hams and competed in ham radio contesting from their home. They have traveled to many countries, some quite remote, for contest activities. He and his wife have home-schooled their four children, all which have left home. Melissa, K1MJ, and husband Rolly, KO0LRH, who live in Kasson, MN. Mark, N0MJ, and his wife Emily, K4ON, live near Baltimore, MD. Paul, W0PJ, lives in Decorah, IA, and Carrie, N0CMJ, lives in Louisville, KY. Glenn & Vivien have six grandchildren.



Glenn has been a practicing orthopedic surgeon for over 44 years. He is currently works for the Mayo Clinic Health System in Minnesota and Iowa. His interest is in Minimally Invasive Surgery and he has developed a highly regarded practice specializing in outpatient partial knee replacement surgery and anterior hip replacement surgery.

His other area of interest is teaching orthopedic surgery in third world countries. He is a member of Orthopedics Overseas. He has spent a lot of time at a crippled children's hospital in Bethlehem, Israel, and has had four tours of duty in The Kingdom of Bhutan in the Himalayan Mountains. In addition to teaching medicine he also brought amateur radio into Bhutan. He taught the first group of hams licensed in the country and in later years helped establish club stations in several high schools throughout the country.

For this work he received the prestigious 2004 ARRL Humanitarian of the Year Award. The Kingdom of Bhutan recognized Glenn with a lifetime callsign of A51B. He is returning to Bhutan to work in the near future. After retirement at the end of 2019, Glenn plans to return to Bhutan quite often.

Glenn loves working on towers and building antennas. He spent four years of research in designing and building his current contest/DX station and antennas. TCDXA Grayline Newsletter recently featured Glenn's move from Minnesota to

Glenn has many other interests including beekeeping, wood working and building furniture, draft horses and carriage driving and flying both a float plane in the summer and a ski plane in the winter.

He also holds a commercial helicopter rating. He is also very active in local community affairs and in his local church.

He is looking forward to getting his grandkids licensed and into DXing!



August 4 Storm Aftermath & CARA Repeater Restoration

Skywarn Net & CARA Repeater Update

de W1QK:

I was notified via cell phone alert about the tornado warning issued by NWS on Tuesday afternoon at approximately 1:45 pm.
After moving to my basement station for shelter with my XYL and our three boys (cats), I listened to the CARA 2M repeater and heard no traffic.

My first transmission was to announce the imminent threat of a tornado, which may be near the Norwalk area and was predicted to travel

north along the path of Route 7 to the Greater Danbury area by 2:13 PM.

I decided it was appropriate and necessary to begin an ARES Skywarn net on the CARA 2M repeater. Several area operators checked into this net and provided ground-truth evidence of high winds and multiple downed trees, and power lines down.

At that point, I was still able to watch NBC – CT and WTNH – ABC from New Haven, both of which suspended normal daily programming to provide live weather updates and radar data.

I asked John – W1JGM in New Fairfield to act as



a back-up net control in the event that I lost power and announced that if the 2M repeater went down, we should continue the net on the repeater output frequency and 146.52 simplex. Within 5 minutes of making this

announcement, I lost power and needed to deal with some issues at my house. I understand that John did carry on the net, and later learned that within 5 minutes, the CARA repeater went off the air, with the 440-repeater remaining on back-up battery power.

Thank you to the following operators who checked into the Skywarn net and provided ground truth information while I was net control:

KC1IBR, W1JGM, N1GS, N2OHH, KB1WUR, K1RHH, K1RFD, W1HBR, N1RV, KD5PIE and KB1PCL.

Skywarn net log from W 1JGM

August, 4, 2020

I took net control from W1QK when he lost power.

Operated on the CARA repeater until the repeater was damaged in the storm. 

FYI By the time I got within sight of NM High school torrential rains had ensued all the way into Danbury for several minutes. DXR recorded 2" of rain in one hr!

Summary:

I was traveling southbound on Route 7 in New Milford, CT. Upon exiting McDonald's at 20:12 hrs (48 Danbury Rd/ Route 7., New Milford CT 06776), I was immediately struck by the most unusual orange colored cloud stretching west to east crossing Rt. 7 basically what appeared to be overhead. The majority of the sky was blue and clear on both sides of this cloud. It was sunny with a brief rain. It was impossible not to notice the unusual ambient orange colors which enveloped the area.

When exiting the McDonald's and turning southbound onto Route 7 it became apparent to me that I was observing something I had never experienced in all my When are contest managers going to dump the 68 years. The west to east horizontal orange/gold colored cloud led to a darker cloud that trailed off to the east appeared to be a funnel off to the East some distance. The attached photo listed as -215721 hrs which is showing the hrs I saved/captured the photo from video off phone after editing it with color/contrast/brightness only. I edited it to display more accurately what I observed.

As I traveled southbound on RT 7 about a mile or so it became apparent that the orange/horizontal cloud led to a dark funnel shaped cloud further off in the distance to the East/southeast which appeared to stretch to the horizon. This funnel cloud becomes apparent in the later pics. I would crudely estimate that the funnel cloud was a few miles to the Eastsoutheast of the Stop & Shop on Danbury Rd, New Milford. Looking at a map it would possibly been in the area of RT67.

meaningless 5NN/59 exchange?

This issue has been on my mind for a long time. Sending a 5NN or 5/9 signal report in contests and even in casual QSOs seems to have become a traditional and obligatory habit. It's a carry over from the old days when contesters realized it was more efficient to send 5NN or 5/9 on ALL QSOs to make exchanges faster and less prone to error for logging and scoring credit.

Giving real RST/RS signal reports on CW and SSB are subject to personal interpretation and physical location, in addition to the quality of the operator's equipment and receiving antennas. So their value is highly relative. But requiring ops to send real signal

reports for every QSO nowadays, especially in contests in simply out of the question. At least on most digital modes like FT8, the software determines the signal strength sent and received, not the operator.

If the goal in contesting is to work as many Qs as fast as possible for the highest score, it seems to me that simply dropping the RS/RST part of the exchange would offer an advantage. Especially for the high rate

possessed crowd. Some contests like Stew Perry have already done that.

Or......heaven forbid, contests could substitute the RST/RS part of the exchange with QSO serial numbers like some contests have always done. That would make things a bit more challenging for everyone, but the rate possessed and old school ops that don't like change would no doubt be outraged at such a suggestion.

CWOps has some clout and might consider making this appeal to the ARRL, CQ and other major contest sponsors to at least consider and maybe even propose this overdue modification in their rules.




Map your contest QSOs july 8, 2020 by dan kb6nu

Shortly after Field Day ended, Bill WC3B posted a map of the contacts he made on Twitter. "How cool," I thought, and asked him how he'd done it. As it turns out, the map was a function of the N3FJP Field Day logging program. It then occurred to me that there must be mapping programs on the web. I did a quick Google to find two websites that would allow me to generate a map of my own: LogView by EI8IC and Log2Map by ON6ZQ.

Log View

LogView is a free, post-contest log-visualisation tool. It plots the QSOs in a Cabrillo-format contest-log on to one of 8 different maps by finding the position of each QSO from an

online database of about 1,100,000 W/VE callsigns. Here's the map generated by Log View:



This tool can do more than just produce a map. It's worth checking out if you want to analyze your contest logs.

Log2Map accepts both Cabrillo and ADIF files and generates a map like the one shown below:



I kinda like this map better than the LogView map, but I wish that I could change the marker. I think the marker is a little bit big for this kind of map.

I found a couple of other mapping websites, but many of them wanted the log to contain the latitudes and longitudes. I didn't know how to do that quickly, so I just moved on. There must be others out there that I didn't find. If you know of any others, please comment below.

What's So Funny?

Something new hams need to be aware of is a less-than-obvious bit of old-timey ham-speak still in use.

You may hear a ham say, "hi or "hihi" over the air or in person or in writing, and, curiously, their particular use of the term, "hi" is not in context of a greeting.

In ham-speak the term "hi" means laughter. Often doubled (hihi), it's a ham's way of expressing a humorous response. So when a ham says, "hi" (s)he is laughing at something. Kind of like saying LOL in a text message or web post.

Where did this come from? In the early days of amateur radio, CW was the only mode so all communications were in Morse code. The word HI in Morse is dit-dit-dit-dit dit-dit, (•••• ••) which sounds like an electronic chuckle. Quickly adopted, hams have been using "hi" for laughter decades after voice and other modes were added to our radio amateur repertoire.

We'll wrap up with a ham joke:

Candlewood Lake, Danbury



Topping the list of Connecticut's most beautiful lakes to visit is Candlewood Lake. The largest lake in the state, this manmade beauty is 16 miles long and 8.4 square miles in size. It lies within both **Fairfield** and **Litchfield counties**.

Technically a reservoir, this Danbury Lake was created by Connecticut Light & Power in the late 1920s. They built the hydroelectric **Rocky River Dam** to increase the amount of electricity they could produce by pumping water from the **Housatonic River** into Candlewood Lake.

With 86 miles of useable shoreline, 10 marinas, and multiple boat launches, the lake offers plenty of spots for visitors to set up camp for the day.

One of the most popular activities (behind swimming, sailing, and fishing) is scuba diving. Despite the murky waters, many explorers try to find the lost city of Jerusalem, which was flooded to create the lake.
