
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

## **PASTOR'S MESSAGE**

#### WHY DO ARMENIANS CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS ON JANUARY 6?

"Armenian Christmas," as it is popularly called, is a culmination of celebrations of events related to Christ's Incarnation. Theophany or Epiphany (or *Astvadz-a-haytnootyoon* in Armenian) means "revelation of God," which is the central theme of the Christmas Season in the Armenian Church. During the "Armenian Christmas" season, the major events that are celebrated are the Nativity of Christ in Bethlehem and His Baptism in the River Jordan. The day of this major feast in the Armenian Church is January 6<sup>th</sup>. A ceremony called "Blessing of Water" is conducted in the Armenian Church to commemorate Christ's Baptism.

It is frequently asked as to why Armenians do not celebrate Christmas on December 25<sup>th</sup> with the rest of the world. Obviously, the exact date of Christ's birth has not been historically established—it is neither recorded in the Gospels. However, historically, all Christian churches celebrated Christ's birth on January 6<sup>th</sup> until the fourth century.

According to Roman Catholic sources, the date was changed from January 6<sup>th</sup> to December 25<sup>th</sup> in order to override a pagan feast dedicated to the birth of the Sun, which was celebrated on December 25<sup>th</sup>. At the time Christians used to continue their observance of these pagan festivities. In order to undermine and subdue this pagan practice, the church hierarchy designated December 25<sup>th</sup> as the official date of Christmas and January 6<sup>th</sup> as the feast of Epiphany. However, Armenia was not affected by this change for the simple fact that there were no such pagan practices in Armenia, on that date, and the fact that the Armenian Church was not a satellite of the Roman Church. Thus, remaining faithful to the traditions of their forefathers, Armenians have continued to celebrate Christmas on January 6<sup>th</sup> until today.

In the Holy Land: January 19<sup>th</sup>:

In the Holv Land, the Orthodox churches use the old, Julian calendar—which has a difference of 13 days with the Gregorian (or "Western") calendar in use today-to determine the date of the Accordingly, the Armenians religious feasts. celebrate Christmas on January 19th and the Greek Orthodox celebrate on January 6<sup>th</sup>. On the day before Armenian Christmas, January 18<sup>th</sup>, the Armenian Patriarch together with the clergy and the faithful, travels from Jerusalem to the city of Bethlehem, to the Church of Nativity of Christ, where elaborate and colorful ceremonies take place. Outside, in the large square of the Church of Nativity, the Patriarch and his entourage are greeted by the Mayor of Bethlehem and City officials. A procession led by Armenian scouts and their band, advance the Patriarch into the Church of Nativity, while priests, seminarians and the faithful join in the singing of Armenian Christmas hymns. Afterwards, church services and ceremonies are conducted in the Cathedral of Nativity all night long and until the next day, January 19<sup>th</sup>.

## **BOARD OF TRUSTEES NEWS**

We would like to thank everyone in the community for their unconditional support for our Church this year. So many of you have played a critical role in caring for and supporting the vision and mission of St. Gregory. Some of this year's highlights include:

*Website* - Our church will finally enter the 21st Century with a new website. The website is scheduled to launch soon. Website domain name was secured as saintgregoryarmenianchurch.org. ## WHERE DID MADZOON COME FROM?

It is interesting to note that the word *mazoon* appears to mean "rain-making clouds" in Arabic, and an Armenian eye would be surprised to note that the name "Mazoon" belongs to a dairy company from Oman and that they sell yogurt with their name on it.

But that is where the connection between Arabic *mazoon* and the Armenian word  $\mathbf{U}\mathbf{\psi}\delta\mathbf{n}\mathbf{L}\mathbf{U}$  (*madzoon*), our name for yogurt—a word of Turkish origin—ends. The root of *madzoon* is the Classical Armenian verb  $\mathbf{U}\mathbf{\psi}\mathbf{\delta}\mathbf{u}\mathbf{U}\mathbf{h}\mathbf{L}$  (*madzanil*), which means "to glue, to join, to adhere, to condense" and was derived from the Proto-Indo-European root \* m(e)hĝ ("to knead, fashion, fit"). This root, incidentally, is the source for a series of well-known English words such as "make," "macerate," "amass," "mass," "mason," "magma," and others.

Authors like Grigor Magistros (eleventh century) and Hovhannes Erznkatsi (thirteenth century) had already given the correct explanation to the meaning of *madzanil*.





Incidentally, if you come across Greek *masoni*, Russian *matzoni* and *matzun*, Turkish dialectal forms *mazun* and *mazın*, and especially Georgian *matsoni*, rest assured that all these have been borrowed from Armenian.

The origins of "madzoon" are disputed: Central Asia, Mesopotamia, Armenia are among the candidates. Armenian immigrants to the United States started selling "madzoon" in the 1910s, and the most famous case was that of the couple Sarkis and Rose Colombosian, who started Colombo and Sons Creamery in Andover, Massachusetts, in 1929. They originally delivered "madzoon" under the Armenian name, but then they changed it to "yogurt" for commercial reasons, since the name was well-known beyond the Armenian realm. The Colombo brand was the creator of the "fruit on the bottom" and existed successfully for eight decades. After the company was sold to General Mills in 1993, the brand was discontinued in 2010.

No doubt that "madzoon" has crossed borders. You may go to *madzoon.net* and find out that "Madzoon" (Armenian for yogurt) is... the finest Greek style yogurt available in the Philippines at the most affordable price. From Armenia with Love!"
