Sermon: II Cor 5:18-21

It is impossible to publicly admit your Christian faith in Somalia, and "church life" is non-existent. Islam is considered a crucial part of Somali identity, and if any Somali is suspected of having converted to Christianity, they are in great danger. Members of their family, clan or community will harass, intimidate or even kill them. Women may be raped and forcibly married.

Christians are also in danger from al-Shabab, a violent group that advocates Shariah (Islamic law) as the basis for regulating all aspects of life. Christians from a Muslim background are considered a "high-value target" by al-Shabab, who have often executed believers on the spot, when discovered.

If a Christian man is killed or abducted, his whole family suffers, as the man is usually the breadwinner. The remaining family are often left unprotected and seen as a stain on the community. (opendoorsusa.org)

I. We Have a
If we are reconciled, we have a ministry. The very word, ministry, is wide open to possibilities. We actually get the word "deacon" from the Greek word diakonos (diakonoV). There are multiple possibilities for ministry but it involves two components: and As a fully devoted follower of Jesus Christ, having a ministry is not optional.
There's also one other matter involved here. Notice the text says "the ministry of reconciliation." A ministry's focus, its purpose is reconciliation. We must understand that God left the church on the planet, primarily, for two things: worship and Ephesians 4:11-12. If this is true, then every single thing that Emory does must have its foundation and laser focus or the worship of the Great High King of Heaven and
One other thing the text tells us is that He has within us the of reconciliation. If we have been given the ministry and word of reconciliation, then, consequently,
II. We Are
An ambassador serves the One who appointed her. She never speaks on her own, never shares her own opinion.

She is both the messenger and the representative of her King. She deliver's His message and that message is "Be reconciled to God." That message should reverberate throughout everything we do. Notice the two other words connected with ambassador, of Christ. The phrase could mean that I am an ambassador that is owned by Christ, focused upon Christ, a Christ-kind of ambassador, an ambassador appointed by Christ.

III. We Have Become the Righteousness of God.

Paul explains here what reconciliation really is. God, in His mercy, does not "charge" us for our sins. In fact, God "charged" our sins to the account of Jesus and declared the transaction reconciled. Jesus was _____ that we might be _____. We receive righteousness, eternal life, hope, grace, love, mercy, ministry, purpose, the fellowship of the saints, while Jesus received our sin.
