Matthew 18:21ff. The slave mentioned here owed

an incomprehensible amount of money to the king.

The king had mercy on him and forgave the debt but
________. You'd think this
king's graciousness would have captivated this slave
but it didn't. His self-centeredness led him to throw
someone owing him very little in debtor's prison. If
that slave truly understood his incomprehensible
indebtedness and what it took to be forgiven, do you
think he would have responded differently?

John Stott: "Once our eyes have been opened to the enormity of our offenses against God, the injuries which others have done to us appear, by comparison, extremely _______. If we have an exaggerated view of the offenses of others, it proves we have minimized _____."

Back in Matthew 6, the word "trespasses" in verses 14-15 is different than the word "debts" in verse 12. Trespasses can refer to any act where ones falls to the side, off the right path, a blunder. The word implies recklessness, even a willful act.

Here's the problem: if the debt was \$5k, we'd find the money to keep us out of prison but the debt is more like \$5 trillion and we're not raising that. It is so great it takes another to pay it. We *always* view

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ourselves owing the \$5k and not the \$5T but we also view the other person owing the \$5T when they've offended us.

So, what does that mean? It's pretty uncomfortable. Refusing to forgive someone else for their trespass against us makes us the unforgiving, ungrateful slave in the Jesus' parable.

When you and I deeply understand our own sin and what it took to redeem and forgive us, we will
be willing to forgive someone else.
