Paul finishes his thought here before the new heading of living in the Spirit. Life for people not living in an attitude of love for others is graphic picture. This graphic picture is of wild animals, snapping at each other, eating them like prey.

"Bite" satisfies the feeling of _____ while the "devouring" is proof of savagism. In this scenario, mutual destruction occurs and no one wins. Paul is painting a picture for us and warns that this environment, set inside a local church, can destroy the spiritual life of a congregation.

Sadly, this happens in churches, in homes, in marriages every single day. Doctrinal error tends to be the difficulty in these environments.

Was this happening in Galatia? Was the apostle warning what could happen? It's possible that the prejudice between Jew/Gentile, Greek/Roman, between the races had not completely been eliminated by the gospel.
