A few years ago Betsy and Tom Salm opened their home, the former family home of the Pratts, for the Interlaken Historical Society's Covert tour of homes. Now we are very fortunate once again to have Betsy Salm share with us how her love of art, history and family life helped her bring forth a bit of history few of us know about.

Please join us as Betsy discusses her book, *Women's Painted Furniture: 1790-1830* and her journey to rediscover a style of early American decorative art.

In the book, Betsy tells of the socioeconomic, cultural, and aesthetic history of the form, which includes such items as sewing and work boxes, face screens, and tables.

Treating these objects as documents of women's daily lives, she shows the close relationship between painted furniture motifs and those of needlework and other decorative arts of the period.

Women's Painted Furniture presents a comprehensive collection of images, most of which are not available elsewhere. Thanks to her scholarship, this art form may now receive the recognition it deserves in the broader genre of American women's art.

Please join us to share insight into the creation of this wonderful document of early American art.

The program is free and open to the public. The Town of Covert Municipal Building, 8469 South Main Street is the former American Legion Building. We welcome visitors to this event, and refreshments will be served. For more information please contact the Society at 607-532-9227.

The buildings shown in the photograph on page 1 were torn down around 1906 and the Case Block was built shortly thereafter.


Volunteer Thank You, December 7, 2010
