
Maps of the Town of Covert January 23, 2017 7:00 pm, 8396 Main Street, 2nd floor

Bob Kibbee, the now-retired Map Librarian at Cornell, will engage us in a discussion of the history and geography of Covert.

We'll use historical maps to see Covert through the eyes of the Iroquois and a succession of colonial powers, and to review the Revolutionary War period and the distribution of land after the War.

Throughout the 19th century there were many maps drawn of Seneca County all with a different point of view and purpose. We'll examine as many as possible and end with a glance at modern maps and digital mapping.



A story in photos: a few weeks ago we posted several photographs on the Historical Society Facebook page under the heading of "In this season of colds and flu...," showing buildings where several of the doctors and dentists worked. These included their homes, and their offices in or above other businesses.

Dr. L A Gould's Sanitarium on Main Street. It would later become the Lake Crest Hotel.




Dr. Thompson was one of the local dentists, and in 1939 his office was on the second floor of the Robinson Hotel. To escape the February 16^{th} fire he had to exit his office through a window and climb down a porch post. The picture, showing the ice on the walls, was taken the day after the fire.





Dr. Slocum was one of the early 1900 dentists in the village and had his office in the Bennett Bros. Drug Store building. That building would later become Storaths.

Did you have a physical at Dr. Folts' home on West Ave? The sign was left on the stairs when the doctor was out on special calls.
