The Wells Barn Legacy Project

With no formal training as an architect, John Talcott Wells, Sr., a native of Wheatland, New York, patented an innovative arched truss system in 1889. The ultimate problem-solver, Wells constructed soaring, cathedral-like barns with open, uncluttered interior spaces. Freed of the obstacles previously presented by post and beam construction, farmers could roll their hay wagons directly inside a Wells Barn, drastically improving their efficiency.

Between 1886-1942, The Wells Family constructed over 100 barns, spread mostly throughout Western New York. Today, fewer than fifty Wells Barns are still standing – serving as "sentinels of the past" and silent testaments to the ingenuity and craftsmanship of John Talcott Wells, Sr. and his sons.

The Wells Barn Legacy Project's goals are to bring about greater awareness to the history and architecture of J.T. Wells and Sons and the need to document and preserve the remaining barns. Barb Chapman will provide historical background and biographical information about the amazingly talented J. T. Wells. Katie Andres will use vintage photographs and original Wells drawings to describe in detail the structure of the barns and the construction process. And Dick Thomas will use his beautiful barn photographs to illustrate the importance of Wells Barns in our agricultural heritage and rural landscapes.

The day starts at 10:00 a.m., the parade of equipment is at 12:30 p.m. with plowing up the lane to follow. At approximately 2:00 p.m. there will be a quilting session.

Inside and all around the barn are displays, food, animals for young and old. Parking will again be at the Elementary School with bus transportation to the Barn.





Honoring their Memory, World War I

The eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, 1918. One-hundred years ago on November 11th the Armistice was signed, ending the "Great War." Twenty-five years ago, I wrote an article for the *Interlaken Review*, A Tribute to Interlaken's WWI Veterans.

It had been my plan to reprint much of that article here as a reminder that these men could not be forgotten. During the war it had been the policy of The Interlaken Review to send each young man a copy of the weekly hometown newspaper. In September 1918 and again in January 1919 The Interlaken Review printed a list of these young men. It was noted in one reference that, "Two men were noted as having died in the war: Orlo Scott, 1919 and W. Earl Sutphen, August 1918." Both died overseas. Before going on with the list of names it is right that more of their story be included; a task much easier done today than 25 years ago. A search at www.fultonhistory.com provided the rest of the story.

Resolution of respect, in memory of **Orlo Scott**, who died February 12, 1919, in Coblenz, Germany.

Again, death has entered our ranks and summoned a brother Odd Fellow from our Lodge to the Great Beyond. He has completed his work in helping to minister to the wants of the afflicted, the widow and orphan, and in carrying out our principles of Friendship, Loyalty and Truth. Sad, that indeed, it was that after having given himself to the war to the close of it that he should be stricken with that dread disease, Influenza, and be called from Time into Eternity. Sad indeed, that his body now reposes in a Foreign Field.

Therefore, be it Resolved, That North Hector Lodge, No. 930, I. O. O. F., of Valois, N. Y., in testimony of its loss, be draped in mourning for thirty days and that we tender to the family our sincere sympathy in this, their deep and untimely affliction and that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family.

The October 2, 1918 *Watkins Express* had an informative article about W. Earl Sutphen, and as a reflection of what the war, and the soldiers, meant to the communities in this area.

OUR FIRST GOLD STAR

The first gold star has been added to our county's service flag, and it stands for W. Earle Sutphen of Valois. Some of us knew him personally, some knew him only by name, and some had never heard of him until word was flashed across seas to the little hamlet in Hector where he was born and grew to manhood, that he had been killed in action. But whether we knew him or not, the fact remains that he was in France fighting your battle and my battle; defending your flag and my flag; your country and my country. The fact remains, and no one will gainsay it, that this young life was snuffed out in a foreign land and thousands of miles from home and kindred, that you and I might remain here in peace and security and in the enjoyment of the fruits of our labor.

No tears can bring him back. No words of sympathy can assuage the anguish of the mother who will never see her boy again, but her sorrow has become our sorrow; her burden has become our burden, and the son who has made this great and noble sacrifice, is now ours as well as hers.

Earl Sutphen is dead, but the star upon our service flag that stands for him shall never fade, and we for whom his life was given, shall keep his memory forever green.

But this is not all. By this death a new duty and a weightier obligation have come to us. By this blood sacrifice our vision has been clarified, and the fires of patriotism stirred to a warmer glow. The living as well as the dead are calling to us from beyond the sea. For every heart throb on the battle front there must be an answering throb on this side of the Atlantic. If we cannot stand shoulder to shoulder with our boys in France and Flanders, we can at least back them with our money and resources, and this we must do to the last penny if need be, and there is no time like the present.

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
