Researching at Antarctica Monday, April 22, 2019 7:00 pm

Few of us will travel to Antarctica, so plan to join the Interlaken Historical Society on Monday, April 22nd at 7:00 pm as we hear from Tim Mullen about his three trips to the McMurdo US Research Station. He returned in February from his third trip where he was a member of a traverse team to the South Pole

The McMurdo Station is a United States Antarctic research center on the south tip of Ross Island, which is in the New Zealandclaimed Ross Dependency on the shore of McMurdo Sound in Antarctica.

Tim is from Waverly, and older brother to Jen Persoon, one of our hosts for the Plowing Day events. His background includes heavy equipment and gravel plant operation.

Father of four and grandfather of three lively boys, he enjoys riding motorcycles with his sons and spending time with his Saint Bernard.

The presentation will be held in the meeting room of the Interlaken Masonic Hall, 8396 Main Street, Interlaken, located above Hubbard Heating and Plumbing.

Allan went on to be one of the founding fathers to get the Backbone Ridge History Group organized and chartered. This led to many hours of work and many public

When The Good Humor Man Came To Interlaken

The Good Humor Company was founded in 1922 with the unique concept of doorto-door delivery of products. The bells would bring children running to get their favorites. The company owned all the ice cream trucks and hired drivers on a commission only basis. In order to make a decent living, drivers worked up to 80 hours per week and the turnover was very high. As a result of a lack of drivers during the second World War and the aging of the trucks, the company started to shift from the door-to-door market to selling through retail stores. Many of the trucks were sold for scrap or use in landfills.

As he prepared to retire from teaching at South Seneca Central School, village resident Charles (Chuck) Bosman was looking for something to keep him a LITTLE busy. While attending a car show in Pennsylvania, he saw a 1969 Good Humor truck in fair condition. Purchasing it, he brought it back to Interlaken and with the help of Carl McLaughlin of Cayuga Street and mechanics Larry, Mike, and Kenny of Interlaken *The Alsheimer Children Getting Ice Cream*



Auto, it was put back in road worthy condition. New signs were added and contact was made with the Good Humor Company to get original products. GOOD TIME CHAR-LIES ICE CREAM was born.

Chucks intent was to engage in something small to keep him a LITTLE busy. At first he did some door-to-door selling and would set up at local events on weekends, such as Interlaken Old Home Days, Fairs at Trumansburg and Hector, and gatherings at local wineries. He also served at some birthday parties and even provided his treats at a few wedding receptions! The truck was a hit at local senior homes, where the residents received free ice cream and got to ring the original bells.

With original Good Humor products featured, such as Chocolate Éclair, Toasted Almond, and Candy Center Crunch Bars as Klondike Bars, Creamsicles, well as Fudgesicles, and Snow Cones, it was not surprising that Chuck's concessions were bound to grow. The first major expansion came when the contract was obtained for the spring Little League baseball games at Cass Park in Ithaca. This later expanded to include the fall Soccer and Lacrosse games. Because the fields were so spread out, a push cart and trailer were added to the 'fleet.' While Chuck would go to the outlying fields, his wife Marsha, manned the truck.

Continued growth brought the truck to the New York State Park system. First it was for the Saturday night concerts at Taughannock Park and later to the Cayuga Lake Park camp grounds. With over 250 campsites and the addition of ice delivery, this was a MAJOR expansion, far above the original intent of a small hobby business. The truck had no door on the driver's side for safety reasons. It was not unusual to make over 250 stops at the camp sites each day which was a strain on Chuck's 65 year old back!!!!

And yet there was MORE. A second truck (a 1965) was added and placed at the Outlet Mall in Geneva. The truck was semipermanent; hauled to the mall in the spring and returned home in the fall. Thus, the staff increased with the Ganoung ladies, Nancy and Carrie (with some help from Roger) manning the truck. Deliveries from the company had necessarily increased to twice weekly and so, a walk-in freezer was added. The Interlaken operation received more deliveries of ice cream product than any other retail outlet in the Finger Lakes during the summer months.

The business had grown far beyond any retirement expectation. After a total of 10 years, Good Time Charlie had sold over one hundred thousand bars of Good Humor Ice Cream Bars. In 2006 the trucks were sold to a museum in Pennsylvania where they still can be seen today. *The GOOD HUMOR ICE CREAM MAN was again gone from Interlaken, leaving a legacy of fun, good cheer, and great ice cream. *Upon occasion, our ICE CREAM MAN still served Interlaken. "We used the ice cream cart for a few Old Home Days and summer festivals after we sold the trucks. We left Interlaken in the spring of 2017 – at that time I gave my ice cream cart to Keith Jay for use in his State Parks and I believe

he has used it at Old Home Days, but not with GOOD HUMOR ice cream."
