Interlaken, and really all of Seneca County and the whole Finger Lakes region, has long been a stronghold for upstate New York dairy farms. With several dairy farms around the Interlaken community, for many years Cronks helped those local dairy farmers bring their milk to market.

Cronks had a milk processing plant that included cottage cheese packaging. However, it had much more than that. It also offered International truck sales and service as well as a Greyhound bus stop. It featured a soda fountain with ice cream and dining and banquet facilities. There was also Minor's hardware store at the corner of Main and Cayuga streets.

Mr. Cronk bought Brook Farm from the Ushers around 1950, and Howard and Helen Bassett rented the land to farm.



Cronk's Dairy continued from page 1

Cronk built buildings on the south side of Lively Run for his business. Chester, a man who worked for Cronks, had geese in the barnyard and would bring leftover vegetables to feed them. The deep well pump used to blow fuses, so pennies were used instead, which melted them.

Several local people remember working at Cronks as well as spending time there. Jayne Thompson worked with Mrs. Cronk and learned the proper way to butter bread. Ed Compton worked the ice cream stand in the summer, and things got really busy when the Greyhound bus pulled in. Sandy Reynolds recalled the soda fountain being a teen hangout after school and sports games. On December 29, 1956, the dining room hosted its first wedding reception for Wanda Beardslee Flood. Various wedding receptions were held in the dining room.

Duane Waid helped out with the advertising for the business, and Jim Close played the piano inside the dining room. Pearl Grant and another waitress, Hazel Dew, would get a five-cent tip for a cup of coffee from a schoolteacher customer and they would swap back and forth for the tip. Roberta Ward worked at the soda fountain and was instructed not to be out front when busloads of Air Force recruits would stop in. Stanley Brown was a mechanic for the International truck sales. -gallon milk cans to the south side of the plant, where the milk was pasteurized and cottage cheese cultured. Roger Ward worked with the manufacturing of the cottage cheese. Two or three trucks would take glass -bottled milk, cottage cheese in cardboard containers, eggs, and ice cream for delivery to Interlaken, Trumansburg, Lodi, and Romulus. Later, the route expanded to include Sheldrake and Kidders. Residential deliveries were made to a metal box on peoples' porches. They exchanged full bottles for empties. Bills and coupons were left in the metal boxes. Deliveries were made even when payments were owed. It was said that Cronk had a kind heart for people in need. Some debts never got paid.

Cronk died in the 1960s from major health problems. We are thankful for his many endeavors that enriched our community.

My memories of Cronks Dairy Plant By Naomi Craft Brewer

My father, Carl Craft of Sheldrake worked as a carpenter in building The Seneca Ordnance Depot. This was early 1940s and when that job was finished, he went to work for Leslie Cronk driving the milk delivery trucks. He delivered in Sheldrake, Kidders, Interlaken and Lodi at one time or another.

Mr. Cronk had bought land at the north end of the village of Interlaken. He and wife, Beulah, bought and lived in the house across the road (Route 96). That house was a tavern and Post Office in the early days before it became a residence. And that was where they lived.

At the front of the dairy plant was an office then a long room with a counter and equipment for a restaurant. These were the years of Sampson Naval Base, then Sampson Air Force Base. The Greyhound Bus traveled through and made their stop at Cronks. It made for a busy place with travelers all wanting something to eat in a hurry and lines for the restrooms.

In the north end of the building was the dining room. It was very nice and many banquets were held there. Showers for weddings and Babies and Graduates and more. A cook and waitresses. Brown who was the mechanic and other drivers who delivered milk, cream and cottage cheese to Ovid and Romulus. There may have been other areas that I have forgotten.

There was Hobart (Hobby) Stapleton who was Mr Cronk's handyman. He ran errands and helped look after Mrs. Cronk who wasn't well. There was also a lady who came to live with them and take care of Mrs. Cronk who had suffered a stroke.

Carl Craft was promoted to manager of the milk plant. One could go in and sit at the counter and look through a big long window and watch how they processed the milk that farmers brought there. Many times he caught me sitting at the counter having a milkshake!

The Cronks had no children but I remember he had an Uncle Myron from Trumansburg who came to visit at the plant.

Mr. and Mrs. Cronk were good friends of my Father and Mother and we had good times with them. Early in 1959 Carl Craft had a heart attack and passed away. Not long after that Leslie Cronk passed away.

Lots of good memories and workers there. I, by then I was working as a Telephone operator. The office was on Main Street, across from the Bank.

That's another story


