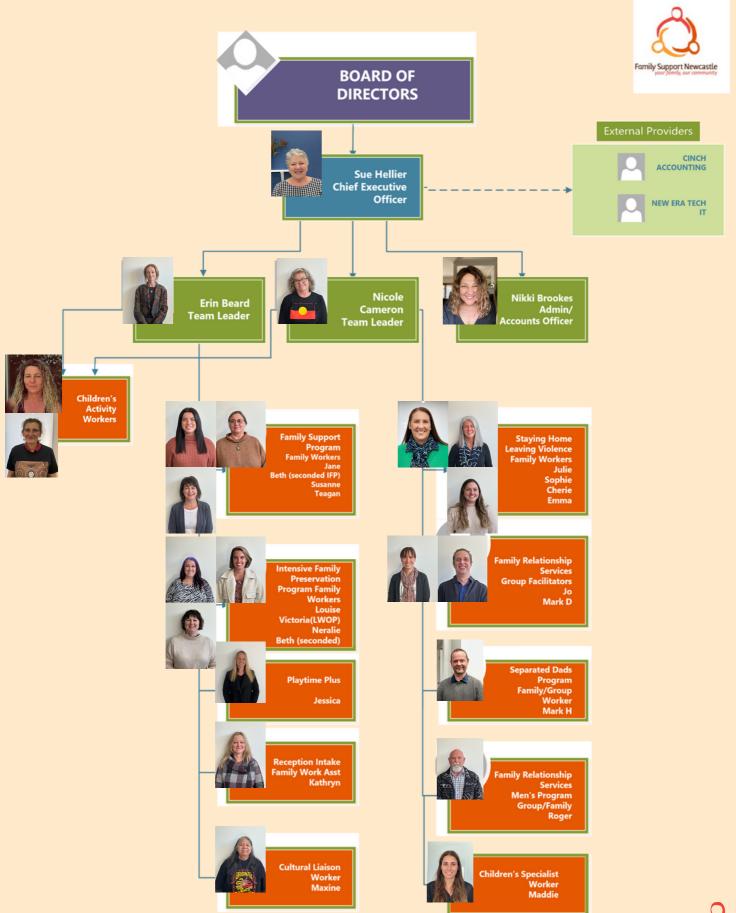

REPORT FROM JOSHUA COMYNS, CHAIRPERSON

I am pleased to present my report for the year ending 30 June 2023.

This is my fourth year on the Board and it has been a great honour to serve in my capacity of Chairperson.

During this time, we have been through the Covid-19 pandemic, relocated locations (from Joy Cummings Centre to Orlando Road, Lambton), measured and adjusted service offered for families, and there were times we all faced many challenges. We have survived this, adapted where necessary and managed to make a profit the last couple of consecutive years. We have reviewed policies and procedures, implemented changes in HR processes and procedures and, accounting and IT processes. Changes in structure were made to increase available funds for service delivery. We now have increased responsibilities around governance and accountability to ensure best practice. We, as the Board, take these responsibilities seriously and are supportive of first and foremost, FSN staff and the families, thus systems and processes have been continually reviewed and updated to ensure we



are not only compliant but strive to ensure a high level of staff satisfaction.

We have recently finalised a new strategic plan to ensure the long-term viability and future for FSN, which we look forward to implementing over the years to come.

I would like to thank the diligent efforts of Sue, Erin and Nicole in particular, for their hard work, dedication, and genuine passion for helping families and staff during this period.

Thank you, Board members for your input and support, and to Kerrie for not only her secretarial duties but also her support at times when we came to together to ensure a healthy and safe workplace for FSN staff, when we prioritised the health and well-being of FSN staff.

REPORT FROM SUE HELLIER, CEO

I am excited to be reporting in this celebratory year; Family Support Newcastle has been operating for 45 years! In addition, we are launching the 2023-2027 Strategic Plan, excerpts of which are included in this report. I would like to acknowledge Sophie's creative work in developing the design and presentation of the Strategic Plan – Thank you Sophie, you did a magnificent job! There's more; it is five years since I commenced as CEO of FSN.

Preparing this report has provided a good opportunity to reflect on the past five years. Over this period, we have progressed through development and stabilising; changing and fine-tuning





processes and systems; e.g. upgrading technology (new mobile phones, surface pro's for all staff, outsourcing our IT work to New Era, changes to the governance structure and Board, raised our profile and increased our engagement with other services, outsourced financial management to Cinch, become more child focussed in our practice, refurbishment of the Waratah Family Centre including new play spaces, improved program accountability, embedded CSNet a client management system, moved from the JCC to our Lambton office, introduced more evidence based and evidence informed practice and group work and developed our knowledge and skills around Domestic and Family Violence with the introduction of the Safe and Together model. The Cultural Liaison worker position was introduced, as was the Yandin Malang Katai Mariyang Committee which is part of FSN's commitment to Aboriginal people. The Hunter Domestic and Family Violence Consortium was also established. FSN enhanced staff conditions by introducing external supervisors, an improved EAP process, Domestic Violence Leave, Parental Leave, streamlined timesheets and leave processes (enableHR), and, improved individual safety processes for staff.

Due to identifying a gap in recognising the impact of DFV on children, we have shifted our focus to be able to give more support to children who have experienced the trauma of domestic and family violence, with the introduction of a Children's Specialist Worker Position.

It has been a huge five years!

FSN has welcomed some new staff; Cherie & Emma (SHLV), Mark D. (FaRS), Neralie (IFP), Teagan (FSP), to backfill for Beth (IFP) who is filling in for Victoria while she enjoys a well-earned break. These staff are skilled, experienced, qualified, with values that align with FSN and are eager to learn, develop and contribute.

What else did 2022-23 bring?

- Waratah Family Centre internal refurbishment completed
- The demountable was completely refurbished and now accommodates the IFP team
- A new bike track and turf
- Finishing the play area in the front space
- Nikola Brookes commenced as the Administration and Accounts Officer in August 2022. Nikki hit the ground running and is providing great support to me and to FSN. Nikki was responsible for introducing more efficiencies with streamlined systems, taking on more of the accounting work.
- Fabulous FSN t-shirts!
- Erin, Maxine and Julie celebrated their 15-year anniversaries at FSN; Susanna celebrated her 25th anniversary. Congratulations!



What are we looking forward to in 2023-2024?

- All positions are filled; stable teams
- Finalising fully reviewed policies and procedures
- Sourcing opportunities for the growth and development of FSN
- Implementing the 2023-2027 Strategic Plan
- Developing and growing our practices
- Families and other stakeholders feedback project; hearing in greater depth what difference support from FSN has made for families

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to Erin and Nicole, team leaders. They lead their teams with professionalism, respect, empathy and diligence. Nicole and I were fortunate to be able to attend the FRSA Conference in May. I presented a paper on our Children's Specialist Worker Program.



ERIN BEARD- TEAM LEADER

Erin is a social worker, and line manager for the staff of the following programs:

Playtime Plus: A group at our Waratah Family Centre on a Thursday morning during the school term, with the aim of supporting parents and their pre-school aged children; e.g. developing socialisation skills, parents connecting with other parents, craft and play activities, skills development for children and just fun playing, singing and stories. This group has diverse attendees and over the last term has had up to 40 participants each week!



Family Support Program: Parents/carers needing additional support who have children 0-12years; FSP provides all eligible referrals with an intake and assessment appointment, information and referral support. Where appropriate, case management will be provided, including home visiting to support with challenges to parenting, such as mental illness, child development concerns, social isolation, family and domestic violence, poverty, and drug and alcohol use.

Intensive Family Preservation Program: Families residing in the Newcastle/Maitland areas who have the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) involved; FSN family workers will visit regularly to provide support, information and assistance to the parent/s to develop goals to keep children safe, refer to other relevant services, 24/7 telephone access to support, practical parenting suggestions. Referrals are received from DCJ only.



Waratah Family Centre: During this past year refurbishment continued at Waratah; Erin had oversight of this project which included internal upgrades and furnishings, external in the back play spaces, creating a staff space on the side veranda and the upgrade of the demountable. This was a huge task that took almost two years to complete partly due to delays in materials and labour. The end product was well worth the wait.



NICOLE CAMERON- TEAM LEADER

Nicole is a social worker, and line manager for the staff of the following programs:

Staying Home Leaving Violence (SHLV): Support to women and children in the Newcastle area, who have left family and domestic violence and either remain in their family home or home of their choice. Women and their families may be assisted with obtaining orders to exclude the perpetrator from the home, keeping the family safe in their home by improving home security, support to children and emotional support. Support is provided by referral and intake assistance, information



& advice, advocacy, case management or case coordination. Due to SHLV expansion funding received from the NSW government we are pleased we can support more eligible women and children and our team has grown in order to do so. We now have five part-time workers, including a Children's Specialist worker, which SHLV partially funds.

Family and Relationship Services: There are two delivery streams for this program within this service: Family Skills and a Men's Program. The Men's program; a male worker who supports men who reside in the Lower Hunter and Port Stephens, and are experiencing challenges in their relationships with their children aged 0-18 years. Support is provided by an intake and assessment appointment, can include home visits and centre based visits, information and referrals to other services and group work. The Family Skills program offers a variety of evidence based (e.g. Tuning into Kids, Shark Cage, Tuning into Teens) and evidence informed groups (e.g. Self-Compassion, Great Minds, Little Fish) in collaboration with other services in and around the Lower Hunter and Port Stephens. The groups are delivered in school terms and focus on parenting and family relationships; the groups offered are based on the identified needs of the community. For some of the groups a separate children's activity is provided to non-school age children and supported by Children's Activity Worker.

Separated Dads Program: A program in partnership with Interrelate; a male worker who supports dads who live in the Hunter and Port Macquarie areas, with children 0-18 years who may have had contact with a family mediation service. Support is provided by an intake and assessment appointment, short-term face to face, telephone or online therapeutic support around issues impacting on coparenting or mediation. Support may include referrals to other services including FSN. Evidence based and evidence informed group work programs are also delivered and some groups are delivered in partnership with other organisations. Nicole has been integral in the development of the Men's Forum that provides information about Men's work in the DFV space. The Forum's occur in or around the 16 Days of Activism.

STAFF TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

It is important at FSN to support staff in their work and development, as part of this development a group supervision model was introduced. This group supervision (or Sharing of Practice) is based on the Minnesota model and occurs at least monthly. We meet for Shared Practice as a whole of organisation and also in teams.

2022-2023 was a time of many training opportunities; FSN had some surplus funds, some additional funds and free training available, and additional funds; some training was on line and some face to face.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES

Our programs are delivered primarily from our Waratah Family Centre, alternatively in the family home or other appropriate venues. The majority of our group programs are delivered in partnership with other organisations, either at the Waratah Family Centre or in a community space.

We provide our services in a context where we understand there is growing inequality between the most disadvantaged and the most advantaged members of

our society. We believe that this is harmful to everyone including the most advantaged. The structural disadvantage that is experienced by the families that we come into contact with must be addressed for us to make a lasting and significant difference to the outcomes for our most vulnerable children. The families that we work with are more stretched than ever before. Affordable housing is virtually non-existent. Domestic and family violence is significantly impacting the lives of large numbers of mothers and their children. Income support for those who have limited abilities to participate in the work force is completely inadequate and the associated conditions and penalties are demeaning and draconian. We recognise that some or all of these impacts the families with whom we work and that we need to recognise the larger context that impacts on families.

Our services are free, respectful, accessible and accommodating of people with varying levels of ability. Families and staff are given opportunities to engage with the Family Support Newcastle community and to participate in decision making. We strive towards ensuring our work is evidence informed with the skills and practice to reflect this approach. Over the next few pages there is data and detail about the services and the people we support with those services.

SERVICE DELIVERY DATA

Across all FSN programs a total of 2,132 (comprising 855 families) have had contact. This does include where an individual or family has received support from more than one FSN program. This data indicates that some families are receiving 'wrap around' supports, receiving different types of support within the one organisation; an organisation with which they are familiar. This data reflects the adults and children who have contact with FSN. For example, a mum and child could attend playtime, they and other family members might be supported by the Family Support Program, with dad connecting with one of our men's workers and also attending a parenting group.

Further, FSN workers made 9,909 contacts in 6,357 sessions; some contacts were with more than one family member. In our data collection 'Referral and Intake' is included. Where ever possible we provide someone seeking support with an Initial Assessment, which determines their needs leading to which program might best meet their needs. If FSN is unable to meet their needs we will refer the enquirer to other services. Referral and Intake (for all FSN programs) supported 488 adults with 411 children from 306 families.

FSN's FARS (Family Skills and Men's) groupwork programs (which is included in the above data) provided support to 197 families, (199 adults and 66 children), over 309 sessions. Groups comprise one-off, and four (4) – eight (8) sessions.

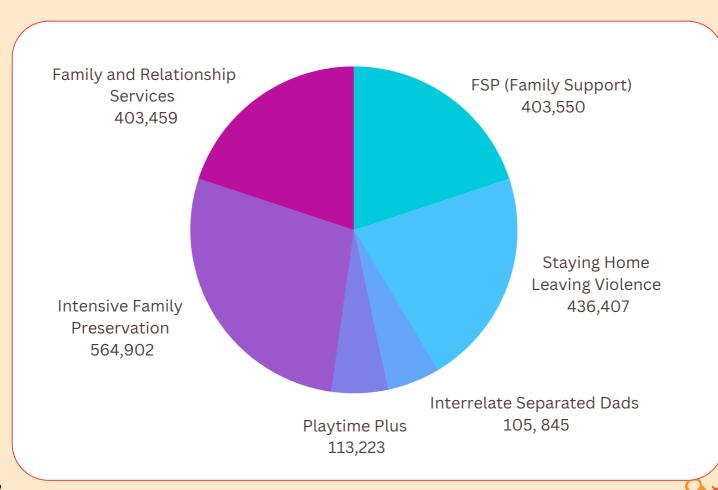
Playtime provided fun, creative and developmental activities for 163 families (165 Adults; 219 children) over 40 sessions (one per week in school terms).

It felt like a very busy past 12 months and the data certainly verifies this. I would like to congratulate the team leaders and staff (including our supportive administration, intake and accounts staff) for providing consistently empathic, professional, child focussed and creative supports to the families and their children of the Newcastle Hunter region. 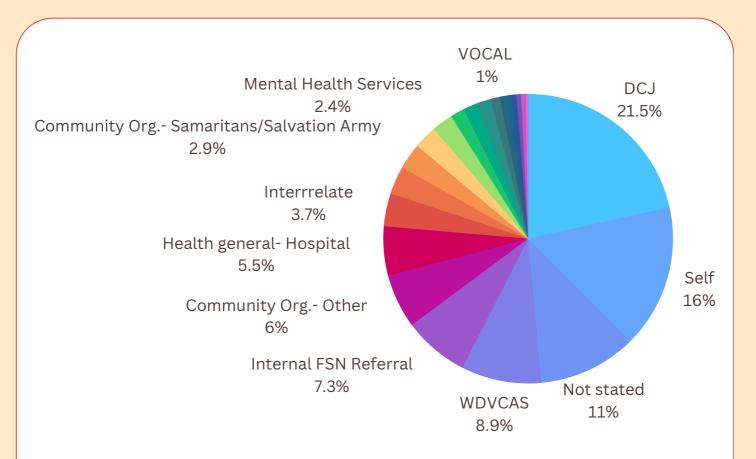
FAMILY SUPPORT NEWCASTLE FUNDING

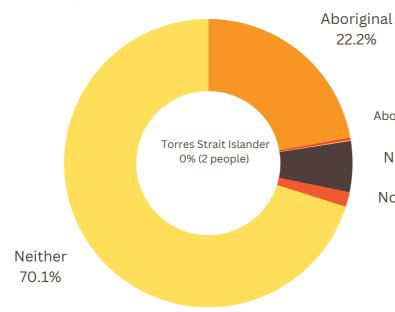

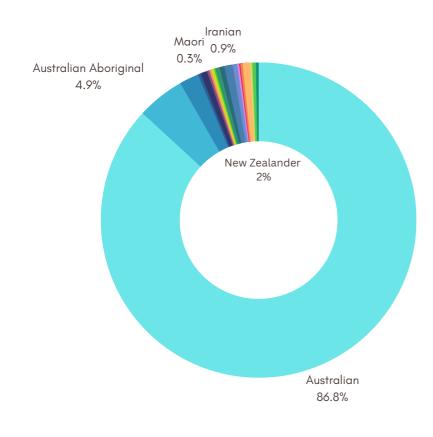

FSN GROUPS

Once again FSN has offered and collaborated on a large number and variety of groups. Our group facilitators are highly skilled, they are required to balance content, creative presentations, trauma informed practice, inclusive and empathic approaches, while making space for participants to process information, to feel safe to contribute their ideas and experiences within the allotted timeframe.

Groups are provided through our FaRS Groupwork (Family Skills); FaRS Men's; Separated Dads; Family Support; SHLV; Children's Specialist Worker; Intensive Family Preservation Programs and of course Playtime Plus. Many of these groups are offered in collaboration with our various partners: Hunter Women's Centre, CALM, Gan Gan, Thou Walla, Koe Nara, FirstChance and Maitland Family Support.

Nature Connection with Kids – feedback examples

Goal: Learn more about Awabakal culture and spend time outdoors with my child; Outside time and Aboriginal connection What have you liked best? Learning language; Sense of community, feeling at home in the bush, exploring walk to climbing tree; Enjoying the calming and no pressure environment.

How has the group helped you as a parent? How to be more creative outside with my child; Safe place for toddlers to explore; Spending time technology free and engaged with my child.





Start Today Again – for Dads The Impact of Family Domestic Violence on Children - feedback examples

- Letting parents/carers know how their child was during the group
