### Minister's Corner

I have belonged to a Prayer Group with four other women for many years that meets on the last Wednesday of the month, usually in Burlington. This week we were praying for one of our own members who is seriously ill in the ICU on a respirator, with multiple infections involving several areas of her body.

After the prayer directed at her healing, another member asked – but what if it is not God's will that she recover? This is such a difficult question. On the one hand, we see the example of Jesus the night before he was crucified, where he asked that "this cup be taken from him, but that it was not his will, but the will of the Father."

We pray most earnestly for healing and recovery to occur, and it is important that we voice what it is that we are asking of God. (Jesus asked the blind man, what did he want, and the blind man replied, "to see.") Jesus tells us to "ask and it shall be given unto you." However, in the case of healing, there can be something larger at play than we can see.

And the second question that arises leads us to ask, Is it God's will that someone should die at a specific time and thus God does not choose to intervene? We

experience miracles in many ways. Why should I receive a miracle and not you? Would that mean I was more favoured? The mysteries of the Divine abound. Does prayer work? It certainly seems to. But not all the time, at least not the answer that we sincerely hope will occur.

I had a special moment during an airplane flight just before our son Andrew died, when I was given the warmest and most intense feeling that "all would be well." It was a peace beyond explanation. Yet, our 22-year-old son, Andrew, died from cancer a few days later. I have since learned to accept that "all would be well" had nothing to do with the physical world I was experiencing, and more to do with the world we enter beyond. It was not a promise that he would be cared for and still go on, outside of my line of vision.

We develop our relationship and trust in God because God, in wisdom, knows what is best and we experience that love again and again. May you continue to pray in trust and gratitude even when you do not get the answer in the way you asked. One day we will see more clearly.
