Seasonal Burning



Seasonal Burning:

In the spring we understand people will want to begin spring cleaning and this may include burning of some yard waste.

The Akisqunuk First Nation asks that you exercise extreme caution when doing this. Although with the recent snow melt and the rain things may seem like the fire will not get out of control. With some of the dried out materials on the ground they will dry out again very quickly and the fire can get out of control very easily.

Anyone doing spring burning must make sure they are taking the steps to be prepared. This will include having an\adequate water supply, shovels, or other adequate tools. Only burn when it is not windy and staying on site to monitor the fire until it is completely out.

Some Burning Facts

- Burning releases hydrocarbons, pollutants, dust and ash, which are health hazards.
- Burning household garbage and plastics releases very harmful dioxins, some of which are linked to cancer.
- Burning will not rid fields of weeds; the seeds have already established themselves in the soil.
- Burning will not get rid of knapweed. In fact, knapweed thrives in poor soil, especially in previously burned areas.
- Burning grass in the spring results in the loss of important soil nutrients, especially when done year after year.
- Burning grass around your home is an unnecessary precaution in the forest fire season, as grass fires rarely damage homes.

Open Burning Smoke Control Regulation

The Open Burning Smoke Control Regulation sets out conditions that must be met in order to conduct a legal open burn. The following points below are the most common conditions that <u>must</u> be met prior to conducting an open burn.

Check with your municipality or regional district, and the Ministry of Forests, for local burning bylaws, restrictions and permits.

To obtain a <u>burn reference number</u> call the Ministry of Forests, at 1-888-797-1717.

You must make sure the weather is good for smoke dispersion. Check the Ventilation Index for your area:

Your fire must be at least 100 metres away from any adjacent homes or businesses.

Your fire must be at least 500 metres away from any schools in session, hospitals or extended-care facilities.

Open burning can affect air quality on a small scale – your neighbourhood, your community – and on a much larger scale, polluting entire valleys and beyond.

Other Considerations

- Is the smoke from my fire going to harm my neighbours?
- Exposure to the particulate matters and gases in smoke quickly becomes a health hazard especially for the elderly, children, and people with heart and lung problems.
- During the winter months it is advisable to find other methods of disposing of land-clearing debris as the Ventilation Index is rarely "Good" or "Fair."

Some prohibited materials include (but are not limited to):

- asphalt and asphalt products
- construction waste
- fuel and lubricant containers
- household garbage
- paint & paint products
- plastic
- rail tiesrubber
- styrofoam
- tar paper
- tires
- treated lumber

The burning of prohibited materials causes pollution and as such is a violation of the *Environmental Management Act*, Section 6(4).



Avoid disposable items; buy products in bulk; look for products with less packaging.



Repair, sell, or donate used or unwanted items. One person's trash is another person's treasure!



Contact your town, city or regional district office to find out about composting, recyclable materials or drop-off locations.

Below was an note from Vivienne's teachers in Windermere Elementary School to her parents and they wanted to share.


Hi Kathy and Lorne,







Subject: FREE Water Quality Monitoring Training using the CABIN protocol

Dear ?akisqnuk First Nation,

Friends of Kootenay Lake, as part of our Kootenay Lake Watershed Monitoring Project (KLWMP), is again offering free training in the nationally standardized Canadian Aquatic Biomonitoring Inventory Network (CABIN) water quality monitoring protocol. Participants of this 2-day workshop will receive their CABIN Field Assistant certification and will be reimbursed for the online modules to upgrade to Field Technician. After receiving their Field Assistant certification, participants can sign up to help monitor one of ten creeks included in our KLWMP, thereby gaining real-world experience. Year three of this project will add to and build on an existing body of data on Kootenay Lake tributaries.

Friends of Kootenay Lake is one of many grassroots organizations joining a network of environmental professionals training everyday people to be active stewards in their watersheds. This free CABIN training is a great opportunity to grow your skillset, especially for environmental students or professionals who want to keep their skills relevant.

This free training opportunity is available to all Kootenay residents over the age of 19. However, preference will be given to persons representing First Nations, environmental non-profit organizations or societies, stewardship groups, or environmental professionals. Preference will also be given to those living within the Kootenay Lake Basin with a demonstrated vested interest in stewarding freshwater resources (e.g., a concerned landowner with a water intake in a local creek).

Free training like this one is rare and in high demand, so don't wait to register. Apply today!




