






Welcome David Bach as our Fiscal & Economic Development Director

ABOUT THIS PROGRAM

The Health Career Access Program (HCAP) is a paid work and training initiative for individuals seeking an entry point to employment in health. New hires will start as a Health Care Support Worker (HCSW) providing non-direct care at a long-term care, assisted living or home heath site and receive paid training to become a Health Care Assistant (HCA) upon successful completion of the program.

The HCAP typically requires six to 12 months of full-time post-secondary education. Through HCAP, the province will pay for your post-secondary education while helping to place you in an entry-level job within the care sector. You are required to sign a 12 month Return of Service Agreement in exchange for this funding.

A Day's Ride to the North East By Troy Hunter

?a‡akit translates into English to scout for game. I like to think that we are all ?a‡akit from time to time. Having spent Canada Day and the long weekend in Edmonton, I have much to tell including having spotted some, kamququku‡ ?iyamu (bison).

First of all, on July 1st at Alberta's Legislative Assembly grounds, I was greeted with Indigenous performers that did sacred dances (i.e. hoop dance and jingle dress dance). I remember growing up as a kid and watching our late beloved "sister" Katu (Kathy Joseph) doing the hoop dance and I understand she learned it from her dad Napoleon Joseph (Nap). Then the Jingle dress dancer came and was introduced as Qiana.

As I sat there watching this young lady with the orange jingle dress that her mom made, I was happy to be there in the moment, and to appreciate what it is she was doing for the people. Qiana's mother spoke into a microphone and told how she fasted and had a vision to make that dress. It has everything to do with the children that went to residential schools including those that never made it back home.

The following day I had brunch at Fort Edmonton Park. I had noticed a sign that said something about Indigenous Peoples' Experience and I looked forward to seeing it. After I boarded a steam train, it stopped a while later and my wife and I stepped off the train in our rain gear. We started to make our way down a forest path and there were lots of traditional medicines and I could see a fort through the trees with some teepees in the distance. It was a sight to see in the pouring the rain a teepee with smoke billowing from the top, oh how I wanted to go inside and get cozy with the fire. But before I could, I also noticed a new building and it seemed inviting, almost like it was calling us to come inside.

After taking off the wet rain gear, we entered the best Indigenous museum exhibit I have ever seen in my life. I have to say that my undergraduate education in the university system is in cultural resource management and I was the person that first setup the Ktunaxa Kinbasket Interpretive Centre after years of becoming prepared to do so. So, I have traveled around the globe and studied museums a fair bit and this one is the best to my knowledge. What blew me away was everything. The building had just opened in 2021 and I knew nothing of the Indigenous Peoples Experience at Fort Edmonton Park, until I arrived that day. In a way, it reminded me of the Van Gogh exhibit which featured images on screens but this one on Indigenous peoples was way better. It had moving images and sounds, it was projected on screens, the walls, and even on the teepees inside. Also, there was so much information, so many quotes from the Elders and the staff were all so helpful. They were quick to tell me that Elders have been part of their journey in designing the museum from the get go. There were a few sacred items and information about the spiritual including the sun dance. I thought that was very important that they told their stories in their own way and by themselves. There were also sections on Metis history, colonization, and a very special showing about the tragedy of residential schools. Overall, the Indigenous Peoples Experience is a must-see and it is a honour to the resiliency of the Cree, Dene, Anishinaabe, Nakota, Blackfoot, and Metis peoples. The next day was spent at the Ukranian Heritage Village which sits on the east side of Elk Island National Park just 30 minutes east of Edmonton. Again, I was taken back by the excellent portrayal of their heritage, culture, and even their language. On site interpreters spoke with heavy Ukranian accents telling about their buildings and their roots. They had three churches and numerous buildings, all of which were brought to the site from faraway places. Those buildings were preserved and stand to tell the story of their history in rural Alberta. It was quite interesting to see the earliest buildings made from clay, trees, and grass. We Ktunaxa might learn a thing or two about affordable housing from them.

The early Ukranians arrived on the land and made it their home, they built from what they had using knowledge from their homelands in Europe. The community hall resembled very much what I remember of the community hall at Aqam when I was a kid for there was a stage and even a place for the choir to sing above the entrance. I really liked how all those different buildings were brought together at one place and it made me think that the Ktunaxa could do a similar type of display, starting

from teepees and then moving into trapper's cabins and then into the Standard Indian Residence built by the Department of Indian Affairs in or around the 1950s. We still have some of those buildings here and there on the reservations and St. Eugene's might be a good place to recreate a Ktunaxa heritage village.

After departing the Ukranian village with a full belly of perogies and borscht, we then arrived at the Elk Island National Park. Isnapped a photo of the bison on the south side of the highway but it being a long weekend and all, the park was already full and we were turned away. I later found out that the bison at the National Park originated in part from the Salish Kootenay Indian Reserve down in Montana after Canada purchased the herd of 800 head of bison. They also acquired some bison from Wood Buffalo National Park so they actually have two major strains of pure kamququku‡?iyamu. As it turns out they are disease free and have a healthy reproduction rate. The National Park does provide Indigenous peoples with transfers and to request a transfer the First Nations have to contact the Elk Island National Park.

I wanted to share this story with the Ktunaxa Nation and all of the members in the hopes that we can revive our traditional treks throughout amakis Ktunaxa. I know our ancestors travelled as far as Fort Edmonton and they also had first contact with Europeans at Kootenay Plains in 1792. Our Ktunaxa ancestors travelled far and wide, we were the first to bring horses to the Prairies as we got them from down south. We travelled to places like Walla Walla and Kettle Falls on the Columbia River. We also traded salmon with the ?aq‡smaknik people such as the Blackfeet Indians at Lethbridge. We hunted buffalo at least three times a year up until around mid-1870s.

It's sad that our main staples of our ancestors, the buffalo and salmon are both no longer available to us like they were to our ancestors. However, we can make our own bison conservation areas and we can bring the salmon back using technology. As Ktunaxa we were given a sacred responsibility to look after the land and I believe that includes those that need our help such as salmon and buffalo.

I recommend visiting Kootenay Plains, Fort Edmonton, the Indigenous Peoples' Experience, Elk Island National Park, and the Ukranian Heritage Village. Maybe there are things we can learn from those places, maybe bring some of those ideas home, share our history and culture, and revive what it is that our ancestors enjoyed so much. It's only a days' ride to the North East and with gas prices, it's probably best to not venture too far off on the Powwow Trail.

There is one more thing, the Pope will be in Edmonton July 24th and free tickets to see him will be issued on July 6th. The tickets are free and will go live at papalvisit.ca at 10:30 a.m. Mountain Time. Our ancestors welcome the Catholic religion into our ways of being and there has been a lot of pain resulting from residential schools. If only we could get a bunch of tickets and hire Big Chief Bussing to take our members there to see these things. Also, there is the largest spiritual gathering of Indigenous people in North America, it is the pilgrimage to Lac Ste Anne just West of Edmonton. I do believe there is camping and the pope will be there on the 26th but people have to be pre-registered. Here is the information for that part:

Note that the pilgrimage will be open to registered participants only on July 26th with limited access by Park & Ride busses ONLY. To allow enough room for the Papal Visit on Monday the 26th, camping and/or parking is NOT allowed on the site until the morning of Tuesday, July 27th. Participants will need to arrange camping at other locations before then. No exceptions:

Camping at Nakota Crossing Camp Site: July 22-26

Passes purchased at Nakota Crossing Site will remain valid and will transfer to Lac Ste Anne Site. All campers must exit Nakota Crossing Site by July 27, 2022

Camping at Lac Ste. Anne Pilgrimage: July 27-29
